City Favors Action On Paving Highway Through Town

Possibility of construction of a 20-foot paved road through the city of Midland, from the east to the west limits on the Broadway of America, has loomed again with the promise by the state highway department to pay one-third of the cost if the city and county each will pay one-

The state has had its highway engineer make a survey of the project, which would be about two miles long, and has worked out with city officials a plan to reduce the elevation of the highway to that of the city streets, eliminating the steep grades at a number of street intersections. The grade could be either 30 or 40 feet wide without additional cost.

The estimated cost of the entire project has been reduced approximately \$9,000 from figures given several weeks ago when the state offered to pay one-fourth of the cost.

Would Cost \$45,000 The city council has authorized Mayor Leon Goodman to include the city in paying its one-third on the job, the total to run approximately \$45,000, or \$15,000 each to the state, city and county. Mayor Goodman said today that city officials are fully aware of the danger to traffic with the highway through Midland in its presents condition and are anxious to do anything to



All over the country children are measuring their stockings so they will be sure to hang the longest ones by the bedposts where Santa Claus can find them. And there isn't one heart that doubts that the benevolent old saint will climb down his chimney or use a pass-key on his door. Perhaps he didn't come last year, they understand. But that is all the more reason that he will be there this

Letters are going to the North Pole every day, and switchboard operators are telling countless children that the shining workshop where the master toy-maker lives is too far to be reached by the longest long distance.

But when Christmas morning comes thousands of these same starry-eyed little boys and girls will find that their stockings are cold and flat, unless the rest of us understand how disappointed a little child can be when he is left out of the Christmas feast.

We accuse the innkeeper who would not make room for Mary the night that the Christ child was born. But we who wound a little child by making him think that he has been forgotten break trust with life just as surely.

It takes such a little bit to make a child happy. There are enough toys which aren't being used in our homes to make every child in the country wake up on the magic morning with a feeling in his heart that life is good and Santa Claus still comes.

Grown people have had experience enough to understand the reasons underlying things when their dreams don't come true. Children can't do this. They only know that Santa Claus has stood on the corner and in the toy shops, asked them what they wanted him to bring . . . and then forgotten them. They are puzzled, and their bruised hearts don't know how to understand a giver who can be so generous to some children and so thoughtless of

If we would keep alive the children's belief that life is good and dreams come true, we must not fail them.

They won't talk about the gifts that they didn't get, these boys and girls who are going around the streets with such shining eyes today. But they will have a dull little pain in their hearts if Santa Claus breaks trust with them. And nothing in all the world is so pathetic as a child who was left out.

#### ADVICE TO THE JOBLESS

When a man cannot get work in his own town, his first impulse usually is to go on to some other city in the hope that conditions will be better there. When any business depression is purely local in character, this is a good thing; but J. Rogers Flannery of Pittsburgh, president of the National Association of Travelers' Aid Societies, points out that conditions now are so nearly alike everywhere inat the roving unemployed workers simply make things worse for himself and for others.

"Men and women out of work," says Mr. Flannery, need all of the resources that come from friendship and residence that are not available to the drifters into strange communities, each of which is concerned with the problem of its own people. The kindest advice that can be given to men and women out of work today is to remain, if possible, in their own communities—to stay in their own





Americans' Direct Foreign Investments Total Seven and One-Half Billion Dollars - U. S. Corporations Own Twice as Much Property in Canada as in Any Other Country

WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.-Americans directly own five and a half billion dollars worth of factories mines, oil wells, public utilities, plantations and other property outside of the United States in this hemisphere and about two billions worth in Europe and the rest of the world. Our total direct investment of \$7,478,000,000, according to the Department of Commerce, is less than half the total private American investment abroad which also includes large holdings in foreign securities American foreign properties are

distributed as follows in value: Canada, \$1,960,000,000; South America, \$1,548,000,000; Europe, \$1,353,-000,000; Cuba-West Indies, \$1,054,-000,000: Mexico-Central America \$917,000,000; Asia, \$395,000,000; Australia- New Zealand, \$149,000,000 and Africa, \$102,000,000.

After that she must work, and before that she must work.

"While the mother is working, then, the children are in the communal nursery - and, by the bye, there was a whole flock of children at this Lenin-American Commune. They seemed quite happy, well-fed

and neatly dressed. "But they are away from their mothers all day. At night, parents nursery and keep them in their own apartment. But the fathers and mothers are usually dead tired in the evening, after a hard day's work in the field, and many of them do the nursery. The result is that the family is practically wrecked."

This procedure also applies in every factory in Russia. The workers in each factory have their commune, with separate sleeping quarters, but with a common dining hall, kitchen, nursery and the like It should be added that there are also communal reading rooms in all of these institutions, and much of the worker's spare time is spent there, with books, checkers and chess and a radio to while away the time and provide recreation. Two-Thirds of Peasants

#### Are Now Communized

the communizing of the farms has not proceeded as rapidly as the communizing of the city workers. Many peasants have not taken kindly to the change. As a result, some peasants have been permitted to retain their old individual homes and work their small farm plots, just as they did in the old days. However, the Communist program calls for the establishment of collectivized farms everywhere, and every effort is being made to push the program through. Already two-thirds of the peasants have been communized.

Factory workers, Dr. McWilliams found are paid a wage that averages about three roubles a day. The rouble—firmly "pegged" at a steady price by the government—is worth about 50 cents in American money so that the average daily wage in Russia is \$1.50. This is approximately the same wage that is paid the workers on the communized farms.





> Caramel Cookies One cup butter, 2 cups brown sugar, 1 cup sour cream, 2 eggs, 5 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teapoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Cream butter and sugar, Mix and sift flour with salt and add one cup to first mixture. Mix thoroughly and add eggs well beaten. Add half remaining flour and mix well. Dissolve soda in sour cream and add to mix ture. Stir until smooth and add remaining flour and vanilla. Mix well and form into a roll about as thick as a rolling pin. Chill in the icebox over night. When ready to bake cut in thin slices and bake in a hot oven for eight minutes.

Date Ice Box Cake 2 cups (1 pkg.) dates (cut)

1-4 cup milk 1-8 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla

1-2 pint cream (whipped)

1-2 lb. graham crackers (rolled) 1-2 cup nut meats (cut) 2 cups (1-4 lb.) marshmallows Crush the graham crackers with

rolling pin. Cut the dates and marshmallows into small pieces with wet scissors. To the cut dates, add the milk, salt and vanilla. Add nuts and marshmallows. Mix well. Add graham crackers. ### **BAYLOR CAPTAIN IS** NAMED ON ALL-**AMERICAN**

Any all-star football team select ed in the Southwest Conference for the 1930 season will offer conclusive proof that throwing the bull and tossing a Texas steer around by the horns are two entirely different form of diversion.

There is an old adage to the effect that a calf, if given sufficient rope, will become veal cutlets. It is evident, then, after one glance at the Southwest's honor roll, that a Texas longhorn is a far more intelligent critter than the ordinary offspring of the genus Bossy.

The naming of six University of Texas players on the first team and a seventh on the second clearly indicates the superiority of the Steers over the remainder of the conference schools. After losing the first loop game to Rice by a 6 to 0 score the Longhorns went on a stampede that carried them to victory over Southern Methodist, Baylor, Texas Christian and Texas Aggies, giving championship. They scored 72 points in five conference tilts and held their foes to 13. All this was the reof ball carriers.


