OIL TARIFF AND PRICE OF GASOLINE

Independent oil operators and representatives of oil producing states, in Washington to work for a tariff, an embargo or both, are being called upon to show that a tariff on imported crude petroleum will not affect the price of gasoline to the consumer.

Independents have figures to show that crude oil prices and gasoline prices do not fluctuate in any sort of fixed ratio to each other. "Crude oil looks backwardto its source. Refined gasoline looks forward-to its market.


The most simple answer to the question is that there has just been seen a decline of 84 cents a barrel in the price of crude without appreciable effect on the price of gasoline.

MOB "JUSTICE"

People who do not think are always dangerous. And mobs seldom have any sagacious thoughts chasing themselves around their heads. They are willing to play followthe-leader and the more exciting the game he suggests the more eagerly they crack the whip or go in for tag. The very fact that a large number of other people are in on the plot, whatever it is, seems to relieve each member of the group of any presonal responsibility.

A recent example was at Schafer, N. D., where a mob broke into the jail and took charge of a man who had he would have to leave. Eddie was confessed that he had killed a family of six people. Certainly no one would plead any leniency for Charles Bannon. But the law was looking after him in a perfectly orderly, trustworthy way. He was going to be given the punishment he deserved.

But a mob got busy. Not one of the men could claim that he was merely out to do his duty for there was no need of that. That queer half-savage spirit that comes wen, Ec the front when mobs gather wanted a play ... one with bloodshed and horrors, the kind that go best at night. Here was an excuse for one. So they took the prisoner, put a noose around his neck, fastened the other end of the rope to the bridge railing, and pushed him off. There was a queer strangled sound in his throat, then silence. A dark silence with a wind stirring along Cherry Creek, and men hanging their heads a little sheepishly because of what they had done. For such an act always demoralizes a community. It lowers the standards of those who take part. They can never be the men that they were before. Not after having given vent to a bestial notion. No one would criticize the group for its reaction to the murderer. He probably received the medicine he deserved. But when we have duly constituted agencies which will disperse justice in approved doses it is too bad that for that was that there was some others interfere. Bernstorff at the same time.

Butler's Speeches Have

Caused Him Much Trouble

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.-General Smedley Darlington Butler rose from the ranks and became covered with medals for acts of persona heroism and other brilliant achieve nents

But although he carried out his orders ably and intelligently, he never learned to suppress his strong personal opinions in the interest of expediency.

Today he is both the most valuable officer in the U.S. Marine corps and the general who faces a court-martial because he made a speech to a Philadelphia club in which he attacked Premier Benits Mussolini of Italy.

Otherwise, the most interesting facts about Butler are that: The marines who have served under him have always accorded him hero-worship because they re gard him as a square-shooter, con siderate of their interests, demo cratic to a degree, able to attain a high standard of discipline without becoming a martinet and as brave as any of them. The marine corps, you, will find, is divided into two distinct classes: those called "But ler men" and those who haven't had much contact with him.

He is a "bundle of nerves," a some of his friends say, full of a remarkable driving force and an extraordinary ability to think things out and get things done. In speech he resembles a machine-gun, hi sentences often spattered with allusions showing him to be widely read and informed. And his conver sation, in private at least, is as frank as ever came from the lips o any man in uniform.
