SHIPS LEAVE EL PASO PORT IN SEARCH OF MISSING CADET

LOST ON WEDNESDAY MORNING

Eleven Cadets Land Safely at Army Post There

EL PASO, Feb. 5. (UP)—Four army flyers left Fort Bliss field today to hunt for Cadet Earl Donnelly who has been missing from the squadron since 10:30 yesterday morning.

Donnelly had not been heard from since he left Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He is the only one of 11 cadets who failed to arrive at El Paso on schedule.

FOUR IN JAIL ON CHARGES

Two Men Charged in Alanreed Bank Robbery

By The United Press. Four men were in Texas jails today charged with the robbery of the Alanreed State bank, in which \$2,100 was taken, and the attempted robbery of the Oakwood State bank.

Roy Stephenson and Shorty McGee were arrested last night near Pampa in connection with the Alanreed robbery. M. D. Jacks and Fred Grayson were captured by a posse yesterday afternoon in connection with the Oakwood attempt.

PAMPA, Feb. 5. (AP)—District Attorney Raymond Allred today filed charges of robbery with firearms against Roy McGee and Roy Stephenson in connection with yesterday's robbery of the Alanreed State Bank at Alanreed.

Officers last night recovered the loot hidden under a house.

KUYKENDALL WELL STANDING 2,000 FEET IN FLUID

Deep Rock Oil company No. 1 Kuykendall, Andrews county wildcat which has monopolized Permian Basin interest for several days after striking oil, stood 2,000 feet in fluid last night at 4,259 feet. Drilling was going ahead.

Local oil men said today that the hole looked good for from 50 to 75 barrels a day. Gravity of the oil was placed at slightly higher than 32.

Gas estimated at 250,000 cubic feet had been showing from around 4,285 feet.

The well is in section 24, block A-26, public school land, Andrews county, 2,310 feet from the south and west lines of the section.

First showing of gas was at 4,208 feet, with increase at 4,245. Oil showings were encountered from 4,245-68 and from 4,268-85.

CITY WINS A STEP IN GAS BOUT

Gas Company Waives Payments Until Later Date

The West Texas Gas company, following a meeting this afternoon among the mayor, members of the city council, a city engineer and officials of the gas company, announced that it will voluntarily waive payment of gas bills payable February 10 until a detailed examination by the city of Midland can be completed and a subsequent report made.

It was understood from the announcement that, in case it is proved the gas company has been in error relative to what has been termed here as "excessive" bills, that an adjustment will be made by the gas company proportionate to the volume of impure gas found in the analysis now being made.

It was further understood that gas bills are not to be paid by consumers here before the consumers are informed by the city council that the protest has been settled. Such notification will be made and consumers given 10 days in which to pay the bills without penalties.

Two Boys Sought By Sheriff's Office

Two boys who allegedly said they were nephews of A. W. Thomas, Midland rig building contractor, and who were reported to have given checks on him in Midland are being sought by the sheriff's office.

The two youths went to the Purity bakeshop on North Lorraine and ordered a birthday cake for Mrs. Thomas. They asked for a check book but were told Thomas' credit was all that was necessary for taking the order and delivering the cake.

EXPECT TO SET DATE FOR TRIAL

Woman Attorney Is Here to "Take Charge" Defense

Buck Jones was arraigned at 2:18 this afternoon before District Judge Charles L. Klapproth. The case, State vs. C. B. Jones, was set for 10 o'clock, Feb. 23, following the reading of the indictment by County Attorney W. R. Smith and to which the defendant pleaded not guilty.

A special venire of 108 was asked in a motion of the district attorney for the case, Defense Attorney Sam K. Wasaff joining in the petition.

C. W. Haslett, who claims to be a brother of C. B. Jones, was in the courtroom.

Wasaff and Haslett denied outright the reported connection of a woman attorney in the case.

Bond for the defendant was set at \$7,500.

Manuel Brown, charged with shooting to death Sonny Sneed, negro, was arraigned and trial set, the same day as Jones. His bond was set at \$5,000.

Plans for arraigning Buck Jones, indicted by the grand jury in district court here Monday for murder in connection with the fatal shooting January 24 of W. L. Russell, at 2 o'clock this afternoon were announced by Judge Chas. L. Klapproth today.

It was expected that date for the trial would be set this afternoon. No other court had been held here today.

Reports at the court house this morning said that a Mrs. Shaw, Oklahoma City attorney, arrived here today to "take charge" of Buck Jones' case. Jones has been held in the Midland county jail since being arrested at Stanton a short time after the shooting.

He, through his local attorney, Sam K. Wasaff, had waived examining trial, the case having been turned over to the grand jury Monday morning.

Judge Klapproth, in his charge to the grand jury, gave specific instructions that the party at which the shooting is alleged to have taken place be investigated thoroughly, and that the grand jury return indictments against everyone found to have violated the law, either felony or misdemeanor, including the one who did the shooting, the "boot-legger who sold the liquor," those who may have carried pistols and those who were intoxicated.

The indictment of Jones was returned on the opening day's procedure of the grand jury.

First criminal cases to be tried in this term of district court have been set for the week of February 16.

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Reward Offered for Light Breakers Here

A \$25 reward for arrest and conviction of persons who have been breaking street lights in Midland has been authorized by the city council.

Numerous complaints have been made of this practice, and the city council took the matter up at its regular weekly meeting.

Strict watch will be kept over all districts to guard against repetition of the offense and guilty parties will be brought into court and given the maximum penalty if arrested.

All Midland citizens have been asked to aid the city police in watching for offenders and to telephone immediately any such cases.

New Mexico Plans Protective Bills

Legislation to protect the state of New Mexico in the event of litigation over oil leases on state lands producing oil royalties is sought in the New Mexico house as an emergency measure. The new legislation is designed for immediate protection of the state in suits amounting to nearly \$1,000,000 now in the courts. These suits were brought by lease holders contesting the right of the Midwest Refining company, and others to oil royalties from land to which the state reserved the sub-surface right. The bill would instruct the state treasurer to set up a suspense account separate from the permanent fund till suits could be settled.

Chickens, Dogs Must Be Kept Penned up

Over-running of premises by chickens, livestock and hogs has caused a series of complaints lately in Midland, and the city council has asked that cooperation of residents be given in stopping this negligence.

Unless fowls and brutes are kept up it will become necessary to enforce the law to the limit, causing owners to pay licenses on dogs and allow persons to dispose of dogs and chickens of neighbors as they elect.

COMMERCE COMMITTEE ENDORSES

Would Limit Imports Of Crude; Stop Oil Products

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5. (UP)—The senate commerce committee voted nine to six to report favorably to the senate on the Capper bill limiting imports of crude for three years and prohibiting imports of petroleum products.

Follows Conference

Action of the senate commerce committee follows the visit of a hundred or more delegates from oil producing states to Washington for a conference beginning January 15. B. H. Blakeney of Midland was one of the 25 Texas representatives.

Facts and figures to show the actual status of the petroleum industry, how the importation of cheap crude from other foreign countries was hurting the cause of independent operators and the industry as a whole were given to the commerce committee of the senate and to senators from all states.

Blakeney, while in Washington, conferred with the senators from some of the southern states in person and expressed the belief, on his return here, that legislation favoring an embargo and a later tariff seemed probable.

The Capper bill was in line with recommendations from the delegates visiting Washington and from independent petroleum organizations.

New Pipelines to Build Into Hobbs

Three pipe lines, one of the eight, another of 10 and the third 12 inches in diameter are to be constructed from the Midwest town well near Hobbs, N. M. to the Phillips gasoline plant, according to information received in Hobbs. The lines are to be built by the White Deer Pipe Line Construction company and gang foremen have already been ordered to report at Hobbs, the report says.

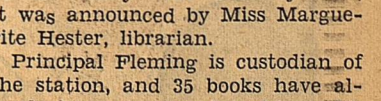
Library Locates Another Station

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'You and I' Is Comedy Read by Miss Lolley At Play Readers Club

The comedy, "You and I," was read by Miss Frances Lolley at the Play Readers club meeting at the home of Mrs. R. M. Lavender Wednesday afternoon to a large attendance of club members and guests present.

Mrs. Eileen Bayer, member of the club, has reviewed the play which follows:

"This is another comedy, but with a human heart throbbing through it that makes it almost sure fire as a production. It centers most of the action around two couples, Maitland White and his wife Nancy, his son Ricky and his fiancée Veronica Duane. Maitland as a youth had cherished a great desire to be an artist but he fell in love with Nancy and had to give up the ideal of the lady, so he took Nancy and went into business and became a very successful man of affairs, with a charming home and two very nice children. Nancy became even more lovable as the years went on, but the audience is aware of the fact that Maitland has never quite gotten over his first love, his Art, and his pent up longings are released when Ricky announces that he is engaged to Veronica, but that he will have to give up his own ambition to be an architect, as there is not enough money for him to marry Veronica and study architecture in Paris as the family had planned for him to do, in fact, all the arrangements had been made for his sailing in three weeks. His father and mother both renege with him, even plead, but his mind is made up, and he goes into business with the same firm his father is in. While Maitland has been begging his son to give up the idea of any early marriage and go on with his architecture Nancy has been thinking, and she immediately insists that Maitland give up his work in the firm and take to painting for a year. No repressions for Nancy, you see, or perhaps she decided that twenty years was long enough for them. At any rate she persuades Maitland to try this and there you have most of the situation.

The play has a very apparent charm, and all the characters are appealing. There are no villains in this play. The part of Maitland is played with restraint and yet with a very great depth of feeling. You sense his longing to follow his inclination toward the life of an artist, and yet he is perfectly loyal to Nancy, and their love for each other is quite as important to his happiness as the other. I think the reason it was such an immediate success, aside from the cleverness of the lines, was because it struck a cord that every listener in the audience responded to. "Most men lead lives of quiet desperation" is one of the key lines, and shows you how human the whole thing is.

After so many plays on the sex theme, and the expounding or sorridness and back alley realism, this comes as a welcome relief, and a breath of wholesomeness."

THE SUNDAY DINNER By Oscar of the Waldorf

Shrimp Cocktail Julienne Soup Chicken Fricassee, New Waldorf Mashed Potatoes Baked Tomatoes Hearts of Lettuce, French Dressing Apple Float Coffee

Chicken Fricassee, New Waldorf Prepare and cut a chicken up as for a fricassee. Slice an onion and a carrot, put them in a large stew pan with six ounces of butter, and fry for five minutes, stirring constantly. Put in the chicken and one saltspoonful each of salt and pepper and stir over the fire for five minutes longer; then work in three tablespoonfuls of flour, stir for two or three minutes, add three or four tomatoes cut in pieces and a pint and a half of broth.

Stir over the fire until boiling, then move the stew pan to the side and simmer for half an hour. Take a pint and a half of mushrooms

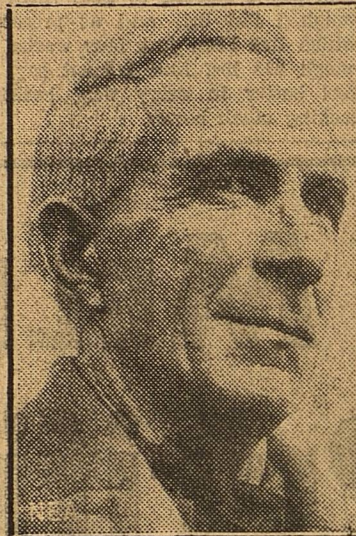

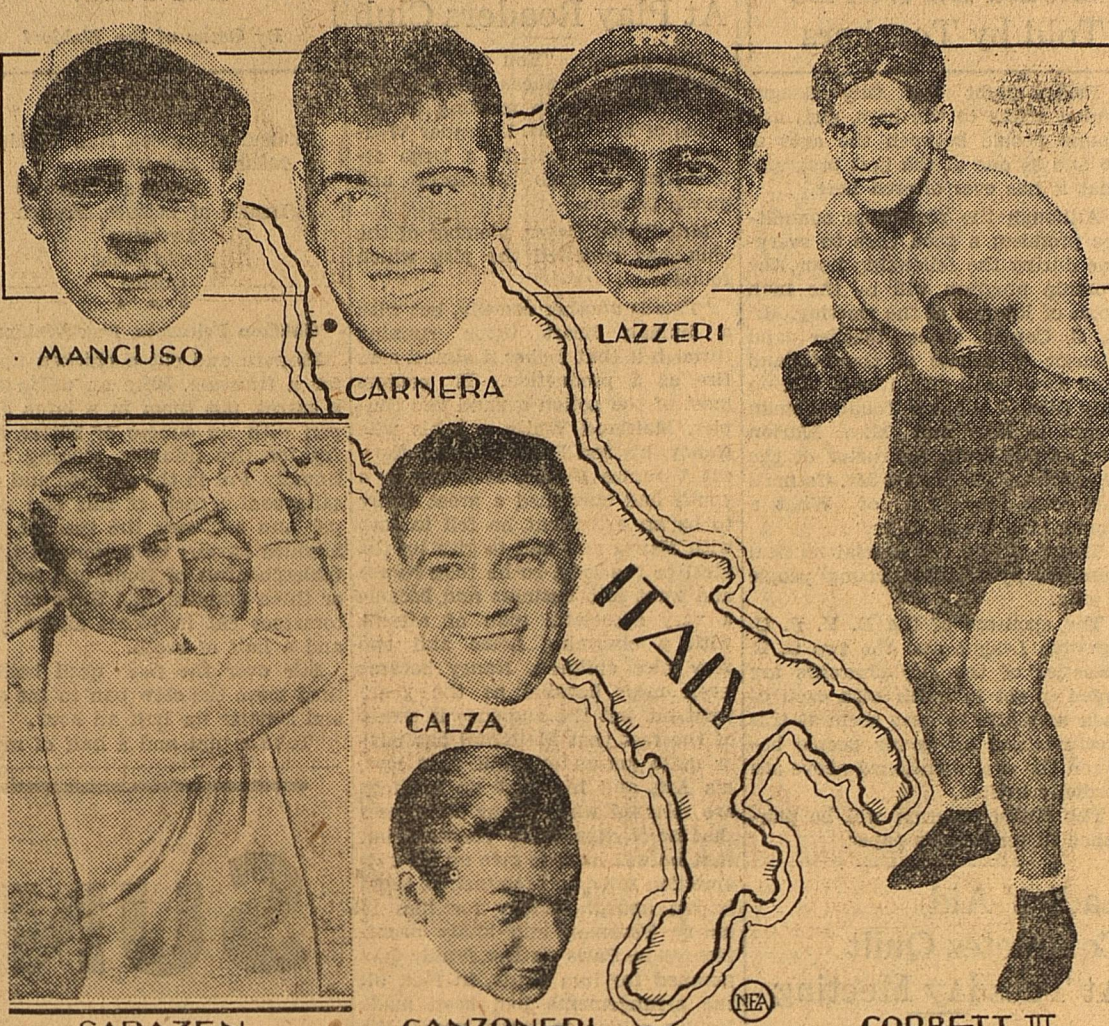
Give it to the Italians.

and Sammy Mandell and Rocky Kansas, rulers of the lightweight kingdom within the last five years.

Much of the present day popularity of bowling is due to the Ruthian efforts of Jimmy Smith, Milwaukee's Italian pin-topping star. Auto racing prouly points to youthful Peter De Paolo, nephew of that old speedway king, Ralph De Palma, and some more. Georgetti leads the bike racers who circle the boards in six-day stretches. And Italy has practically pinned Grecian shoulders to the wrestling mat.

Could Notre Dame have captured national football honors these past two years without the mad touch-down jaunts of Jumpin' Joe Savoldi and the never-failing conversions from the educated toe of a Carideo? Maybe.

LONDON.—England is rapidly completing a new light cruiser, the "Leander," details of which are on the Admiralty's "confidential list" and which have been kept entirely under cover. It is known, however, that it will have a displacement of about 6700 tons, carry 4 fourteen-inch anti-aircraft guns, 8 six-inch guns and be equipped with 6 twenty-one-inch torpedo tubes. It is said that the ship will do more than 35 knots an hour.

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FAMOUS DIAL RANCH SUIT BACK IN COURT IN HUTCHINSON COUNTY; WAS WORTH THIRTY MILLION AT ONE TIME

AMARILLO, Texas, Feb. 5. (AP)—The now famous Dial ranch suit, involving oil lands in Hutchinson county once valued at \$30,000,000, is back in litigation, the seventh court of civil appeals, Amarillo, having reversed the lower court in denying the claims of Mrs. Gertrude A. Dial and her two minor children to a half interest in the property.

After five years before the courts, the case is scheduled for return to the trial court or for appeal. Attorneys for the more than a dozen oil companies and individuals who

hold title to the lands and mineral rights say the case will be appealed. Originating in the Hutchinson county district court in March, 1926, the case was once settled by compromise, refilled six months later at Stinnett, transferred to federal court in Amarillo, sent back to Stinnett for want of jurisdiction, then transferred to Potter county by agreement of attorneys. It was thrown out of court on a general demurrer, but an appeal resulted in a reverse.

Testimony was first heard by a court almost a year ago, and Judge W. E. Gee, of the 108th judicial district, instructed the jury to return a verdict against Mrs. Dial and her children. The plaintiff's attorneys appealed and the case was reversed. Attorneys for the defendants are appealing.

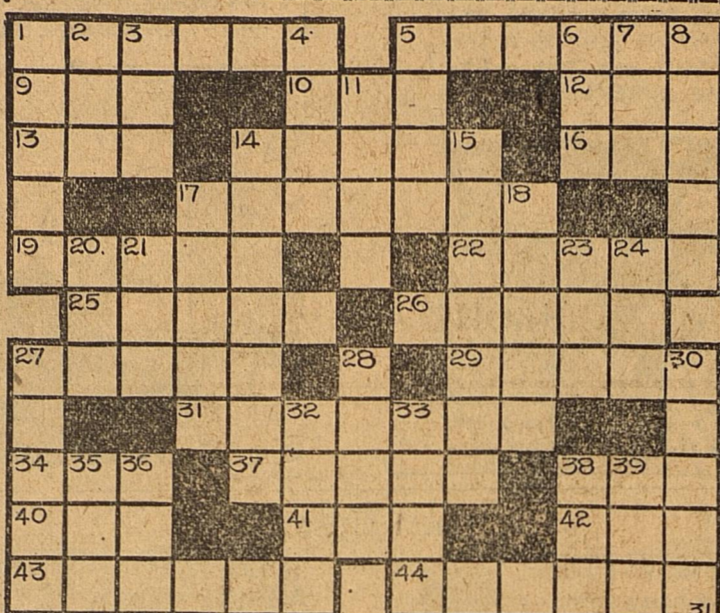
Meantime, more than \$6,000,000 worth of oil and gas has been taken from the 11,046 acres of land. Because of the slump in the petroleum industry, the old ranch now is probably not worth more than 12 or 15 millions of dollars. The mineral rights continue to be exploited to the profits of the leaseholders, and if the case is kept in court many more years, it is probable that the land at time of settlement will be worth only a small part of its value at the time the suit was filed in 1926, Lloyd Fletcher, attorney for the children said.

Claiming half interest in the property, Mrs. Dial and the children first filed suit to have the deed of conveyance, and the oil and gas leases set aside, charging that they were fraudulently obtained and were not binding on them. That claim, in which they asked for \$315,000, was settled for \$212,500, being divided equally between Mrs. Dial and the children. A special term of Hutchinson county court was called to enter the judgment, June 19, 1926.

In December of the same year a new suit was filed to set aside the deed of conveyance, the mineral rights and the former agreement. It is this case that is still before the courts.

The suit is based on the settlement of a ranch partnership between J. C. Dial, deceased, and his brother C. L. Dial. When J. C. Dial died in 1918, leaving his widow and two minor children, the ranch continued to operate on a partnership basis which, attorneys claim, was contrary to the statutes. It became so involved in its obligations that a deed of conveyance was signed, with an understanding that the purchas-

Carlsbad Potash Shaft Deepened

Concreting of a four-department shaft to a depth of 600 feet in the United States Potash company's mine near Carlsbad has been completed, and workmen are carrying the shaft on down to 1000 feet. Unique Map Study Evolved by Teacher

GALVESTON, Jan. . . (AP)—In the past, one studied geography from the map; but in the future the pupil will be able to learn both history and geography from a new and unique map designed by Mrs. Fay Allen of Austin and lithographed here.

This map printed in six colors and protected by two coats of varnish, depicts historical scenes of Texas in their true location upon the map. Sketches with lettering and dates, portray the stirring scenes and the history-making events of Texas under six flags, each scene integrated to the spot in Texas where it took place.

Mrs. Allen's map brings down the history of Texas from the discovery in 1519 by Alonzo de Pineda, through the Confederacy and the return to the union, the building of a farm and industrial empire of great cities.

The map bears as a design the six flags of Texas, in colors. The original capital here built in 1839 is portrayed as the Austin sketch. The colony of Prince de Salm, located in 1842 east of Austin, that of Henry Castra near the present Fredericksburg highway, and emblems representing roaming Indian tribes are depicted in Central Texas.

Repeal Three-Day Marriage Law up

AUSTIN, (AP)—Repeal of the three day requirement of the marriage license law is the aim of more than one legislator.

Senators Parrish of Lubbock and Loy of Sherman, both of whom reside near the state's border, have urged the Senate to take action against the new provision.

Another bill asking the repeal of the law has been introduced in the House.

Senator Parrish expressed opposition to the marriage license law requirements. He characterized the law a nuisance. He charged that actual physical examinations as required under the law were not being properly made. In some cases, he said, the examinations were not being made at all.
