



#### **HIJACKING AT ITS WORST**

Hijacking, when brought closer home, always rouses the wrath of the public. Midland has had a recent example and more than one good citizen has been heard to exclaim that sawed off shotguns and buckshot would be too good for the heinous thug who will lie in wait for a man holding a position of trust, attack him from behind and either maim or kill him on a mere chance of securing money

It is in times like the present that "no accounts" are incited to such acts of violence. It is in times like these that individuals should be on guard for such attacks, and if the hijacker happens to get the worst of it, little sympathy will come from the public.

### THE SPORT OF SELECTING A JURY

#### From the Sherman DEMOCRAT:

One phase of a murder trial in Texas that never fails to draw a crowd is the work of securing the jury that will try the defendant. In the first place, man is sworn to tell the truth in answering questions, and then the real sport begins.

The lawyer for the defense takes the man in hand, addresses him like he was mad at the prospective juror, and proceeds to question him. If the juror acts like he desires to serve, the lawyer tries to keep him from serving, but if he fortunately passes the cruicifixion, the state then takes its whirl. He is asked about his family relations, how many children he has, what his occupation is, and other personal and impersonal questions.

If he gets by for the time being, the defense attorney then takes him again and asks him if he can put himself in the position of the defendant and can see the alleged crime from the defendant's viewpoint.

In Dallas recently several days were spent in trying to secure a jury to try a man charged with murder. One man was excused because he had seen two men killed and three wounded in his own house. The state didn't want that sort of juror. Another man was excused by the defense attorney because his wife had advised him to give the fellow at least 9 years. And still another lost out because he had a kinsman working in the court house.

And then there are those who do not care to serve. Most of these have conscientious scruples against the death penalty. Many have already made up their minds, and some just naturally do not want to serve. So, taking it all in all, it is just about as hard on one side as the other, and the court has an awful time maintaining his dignity while keeping down the little squabbles and doing the umpiring as the case proceeds.

#### **A COMMISSION FOR NICARAGUA**

The killing of a group of marines in Nicaragua has !ed to new demands in the United States Senate that American occupation of that country be ended forthwith; and the whole subject doubtless will come in for extensive discussion this winter.

In this connection, we are reminded that one of President Hoover's most notable accomplishments to date was the study he had a commission make of conditions in Haiti, another nation where the American marines have found lots of employment. As a result of that study, the Haitian situation at last bids fair to be ironed out in a manner satisfactory to all concerned.
