ment of fair and honest people. He had rather have a record of saving tax payers' money than the honor of the office. You have noticed considerable comment in the papers of the attitude of speakers with reference to the handling of the highway department. As you know Governor Sterling was for three and one-half years chairman of the highway commission prior to his election to the office of governor. During that period the department was efficiently handled, taken out of chaos, put on a business basis and not one word of criticism has yet been uttered by his bitter opponents. And now the opposition brings in a proposal to divide the \$30,000,000 gasoline tax into three parts, one part to the school fund, one part to the general revenue fund, and one part to the highway department. It is not only the 4c tax that goes to the school fund; or, in round figures, \$7,500,000 is now already set aside for the public school fund, and that the opposition proposes to place \$10,000,000 to the fund. In fact, one adds \$2,500,000. Rather than put any part of this tax money into the general revenue fund, Governor Sterling, through legislative enactment, offers a proposal that means lower taxes for you. He proposes to take so much of this gasoline money and pay the interest and sinking fund requirements on the bonds each county voted and expended on state highways. Now to be a little more specific, Midland county has spent \$125,000 on state highways and the county commissioners have assessed a tax of 36 cents on every \$100 valuation to meet the interest and sinking fund on road bonds. If the legislature will enact into law this recommendation of Governor Sterling, the state will pay this 36 cents tax in this county, thus reducing our taxes. If Ferguson's plan goes through, we will continue to pay the 36 cents and in addition Ferguson says he may levy in addition a 1 cent gasoline tax to meet the requirements of the federal government in order to maintain federal aid for our state highways. Today we are a tax burdened people and any proposition looking to the honest reduction of taxes should be given the greatest consideration. I do not deem it proper to enter into discussion here of comparison of the records of the management of the governor's office between the two candidates. There are plenty of records for you to determine this point without any argument from me. If any of you have children in school who are studying Texas history, I ask that you get their text book and read the historical record of the administration of all those concerned in this race. The system of government in America and in this state is by far the best system ever devised. In honest capable hands the machinery moves smoothly, for the general good of the citizens. The discovery of dishonesty among those clothed in authority indicts them and does not indict the system of government. It emphasizes the fact the responsibility for conditions rest with all of us when we fail to vote, or if we fail to vote intelligently in the coming primary unless he bestirs himself sufficiently to learn something about the candidates for office. No business man can have more important business than or trying to obtain the sort of government
