Grandfalls Area Is 'Poor Man's Paradise,' Said

Drilling activity in the Grandfalls area is furnishing a mild sensation in the otherwise too dormant Permian basin. A dozen wells are drilling on the town site or nearby. The shallow wells are drilled with spudders and small gasoline engines. A kind of drilling orgy has broken out with small operators doing most of the drilling. One man is said to have started two

THE MEN OF TOMORROW

The small boy, for all that we see so much of him, is usually a mystery. We talk a great deal about him; we have traditions that begin, "small boys like-" and "small boys want," but half of the time we are wrong, and we seldom take any pains to set ourselves right.

The Boys' Club Federation of America recently set out to get the right slant on boyhood's ideals, boyhood's games and boyhood's habits. It questioned a great many thousand boys, scattered through more than 125 cities in all parts of the country; and it learned some interesting!

To begin with, baseball is not quite as popular among city boys as it used to be. This is not because of any defect in the game itself. It is simply that the growth of cities has left fewer and fewer places where boys can play ball. Besides, the equipment is expensive.

In cities where boys' clubs or other organizations have provided athletic fields, baseball is as popular as ever. But in most cities the supply of playgrounds is woefully inadequate; and in such cases the lads play "soft ball," because less equipment and a smaller field are involved.

Boyhood's ambitions for the future are slowly changing, too. Years ago the average city youngster wanted to become a policeman or a fireman, so that he could wear a bright new uniform. Now the average youngster aspires to become an aviator. In the football season he is apt to think that he would like to follow in Knute Rockne's footsteps, and in the summer he may yearn to be another Babe Ruth or Hack Wilson; but day in and day out it is the aviator who is his particular ideal—and Lindbergh is still







Choice Cooks' Corner

These recipes may be new to you and help solve the daily problem of "what shall we have to eat?"

Casserole of Vegetables

Two cups canned or fresh peas 1 cup string beans, 1 cup diced carrots, 1-2 cup diced celery, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 head cauliflower, 4 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 4 tablespoons grated cheese.

Cut beans in small pieces. Remove outer stalks from cauliflower but do not separate into flowerettes. Let stand in cold salted water for one hour, drain and rinse well in clear cold water. Melt butter, add onion and cook five minutes. Add peas, beans, carrots and celery and salt until thoroughly coated with butter vegetables and stir lightly with a fork. Be sure flour is well blended with butter. Put cauliflower in the center of a buttered casserole and arrange prepared vegetables around it. Season with salt and pepper and add boiling water to barely cover mixture. Cover casserole and cook forty minutes in a hot oven. Remove cover and sprinkle with cheese. Cook uncovered until the cheese is melted and slightly colored.

Savory Vegetables

One cup dried lima or marrowgreen peppers, 1 Spanish onion 1 cup broken macaroni, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup sliced mushrooms, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-3 teaspoon pepper.

Soak beans in cold water to cover overnight. In the morning, drain and parboil for five minutes Throw away the water and cook in boiling water until tender, about 3 hours. Add carrots, peppers cut in shreds and onion peeled and thinly sliced. Simmer until vegetables are tender and water is reduced to a few tablespoonfuls. In the meantime cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender. about 20 minutes. Drain and add to vegetable mixture with tomatoes. Melt butter and saute mushrooms for five minutes. Add to vegetable mixture and heat thoroughly. Season with salt and pepper and serve.



Irish potatoes may be planted as a spring or fall crop. The spring plantings are usually more prolific and more profitable because of favorable weather conditions existing in this state during the spring months. The seed bed for Irish potatoes must be deep and thorough ly prepared. The rows should be 36 to 40 inches apart and the seed pieces planted 12 inches apart in the drill. The seed pieces for the spring planting should be covered 2 to 3 inches deep. The fall planting should be covered 2 to 5 inches deep. Certified seed that have been subject to rigid inspection will give high yields, and will repay the grower for the small additional cost Large seed pieces ranging from 1 -2 to 2 ounces are desirable, because they will produce stronger plants. Irish potatoes are not a poor soil crop. This plant must have an abundance of plant food for heavy yields. Well rotted manure, supplenented with superphosphate and rae of 4 to 10 tons per acre is satisfactory. A 10-6-7 commercial fertilizer mixture used at the rate of 1000-1200 lbs. per acre and applied two weeks before planting is good.
