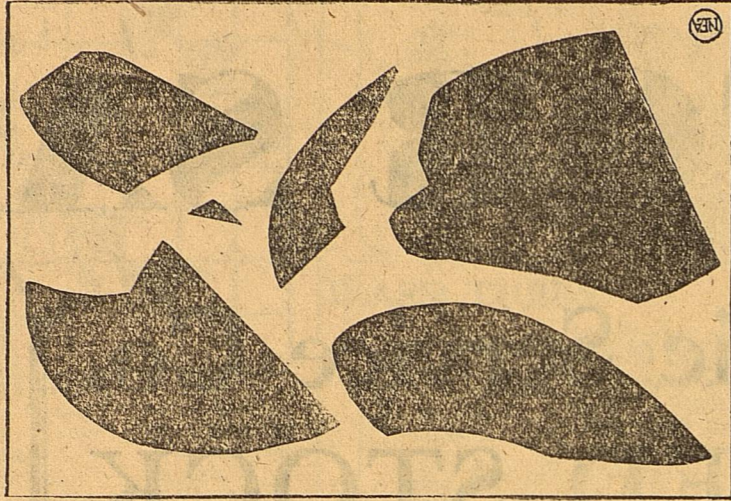

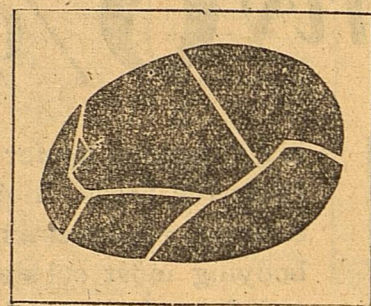
Conference at Courtney Baptist Church Tuesday

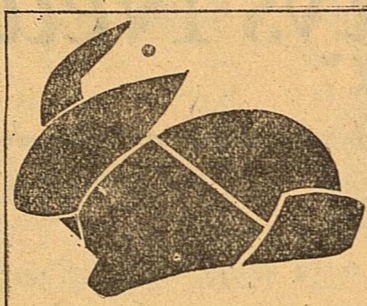
An Easter Cut-Out Puzzle For the Little Folks

HARRIS SEES IMPROVED TIGERS AS FIRST DIVISION PROSPECT

LIKELY YOUNGUNS PEP UP ALL POSTS

The greatest of great coaches, Knute Rockne, fell to his death yesterday. Notre Dame, the institution he served as player and coach for so long, will not feel the shock of his passing any more than the country at large. Football over this country was what his formative fingers made it. Everyone followed his style or, differing slightly from it, respected it. Few men have done as much for collegiate sports, or for an educational institution. Under his grid tutelage the name of Notre Dame, a small university, became internationally famous. We do not write sufficiently well to attempt eulogies, but present for a last study the picture of a man who was universally known and whose name was on the lips of every ardent lover of clean sports.

Reporter-Telegram and Midland Hardware tried to cut down the margin of accumulated playground ball games that have been postponed because of weather conditions. The newspaper won, 19-8. Bill Morgan hit one that stopped rolling about the time Bill spiked the fourth cushion. Peculiarly enough, Bill's batting position is eighth, the same as a Morgan on the side of the opposition. Gemmill appears to be one of the best pitchers in the loop. Slipping the ball in to the batter with a lot of speed and a perceptible hook. A bit wild, but entirely effective.

No one in the playground ball racket is expecting to win many games from the Texas Electric Service company, so they say. With such perfect golf weather as that of this morning a-dawning as a regular seasonal succession, small wonder that Midland, Texon, Big Spring, Colorado, Lamesa, and Snyder are exchanging more and more letters about the beginning of the Sand Belt Golf association. April 12 was designated as the first game of the putting, so Ellis Cowden, prexy, informs us. Who will play for Midland? The answer is found in the ladder tournament now being conducted at country club. The first eight, or better said the best eight will be found by selective methods. Every caddy knows what that means: long, low, rolling drives; straight pitched approaches, careful putting. Explosion shots when necessary but no flaring or tempering.

Here is the method of scoring the association. "Each member will score one point for being present at each match, whether opposing team be present or not. Each individual match won will count two points toward their team's total. Each best ball match won will count three points towards their team's total. Teams winning the greatest number of points will win the team championship. The member winning the greatest number of individual points will win the individual championship."

Ellis informs us that all play shall bein foursome, each No. 1 playing the other No. 1 and No. 2 playing No. 2, and Nos. 1 and 2 playing the opposing Nos. 1 and 2 best ball match, etc., for the eight players in all four of the foursomes. (We confess we are not enough golfer to get all of this well enough to explain to Aunt Susie while we hold her knitting in the evenings, but we can give you the street address of Ellis.)

And here's the schedule, in case you want to be a part of the gallery. We are to be a caddy, we understand, in the association. We can't find balls very well but we do a notable bit of kabitizing, popping off about how a spoon should be used rather than a midiron, then saying something about "I told you so." In general, we are the type that is found on every course. Besides, we want to be up close where we can hear the jokes.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1. —Bucky Harris is the youngest manager in the major leagues — but don't get the idea that he bubbles over with childish enthusiasm. Especially when it comes to talking about Detroit's chances this year.

Not that he's pessimistic. He admits the team is good, and its chances are great. But he doesn't break loose with a raft of superlatives.

"Who looks good? They all look good," he avers. "And where we have competition for places, like shortstop and the outfield, the candidates all look so good that it's apparently going to be a question of time before we determine who'll stay."

"Shortstop troubles had considerable to do with our heavy losses last year. Two months out, we lacked both fielding and hitting in the position. Now, we have Akers and Mark Koenig battling against a worthy contender in Owens, from Seattle. Any one of these is good, so there is going to be a lot of offensive and defensive improvement, no matter who gets the regular call."

Harris looks for a new batting punch for the outfield in the Walker brothers—Gerald and Harvey; in Irey Shiver, called in from the Texas League and the hard-swinging Doljack. All have been Detroit property for some time and all have been nursed along.

"And they look about right for major league competition, too," says Harris. "The four lads feel they're just about set, so they're going to give Roy Johnson, Funk and Stone, the regulars, some mighty hard battles before it is finally determined who stays."

"Frankly, I've not seen such a bunch of good looking youngsters in some time."

There has been the usual raft of aspiring pitchers toiling at the Sacramento training camp. But Harris is all for starting the season with the moundsters that carried the hot last season.

"You'll find very few major league clubs that can match our pitching staff," he declares. "The early workouts at Richardson's Springs and the Sacramento sessions have brought the pitchers into splendid playing shape."

"Careful attention was given to Wyatt's throwing arm, which crumpled at the wrong time last season. Vic Sorrell appears this season wearing glasses, correcting his bothersome trouble last year. A winter of treatment has eliminated Hogsett's bad health. And that's a lot of recoveries."

"I look for a lot of wins from these boys. And add to these Waite Hoyt, Whitehill, George Uhle, Guy Cantrell, Charlie Sullivan—not to mention Marrow, Bridges, Herring, Page and Mallett—and the Tigers have plenty of pitching talent to draw from. Wally Schang and Grabowski, added to the catching staff, will add a lot to the efficiency of these pitchers too."

The Detroit catching staff also includes Hayworth and Desautels.

With the exception of the changes around shortstop, the Tiger infield seems set to stand as it woud up last season. Big, driving Dale Alexander is on first base; Charlie Gehring is at second, and bound to scintillate if playing with a good shortstop; Marty McManus and "Jumping Joe" Dnagan at third base. Add to these Messrs. Koenig, Akers and Owens, the shortstop rivals, and you have a heads-up infield.

The schedule calls for each club to play every other team twice during the season.

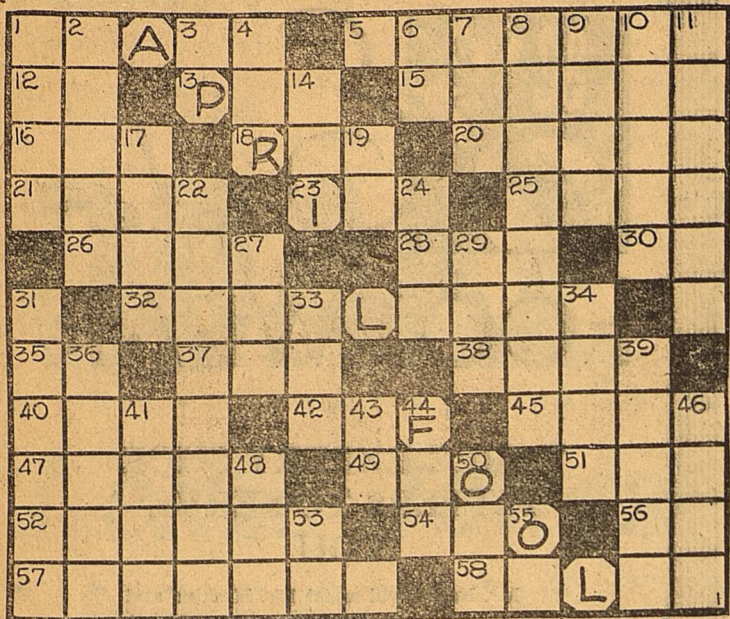

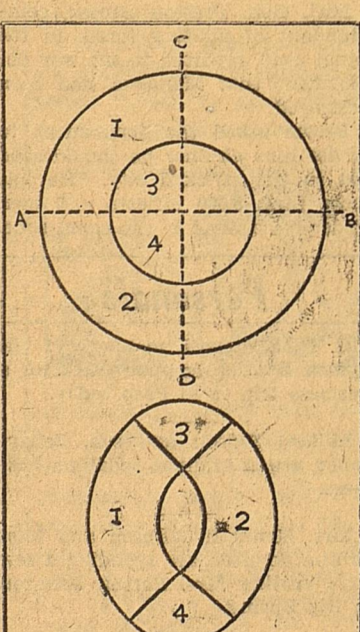

"The kid wasn't crying, at any rate," the county attorney was overheard remarking to the sheriff.

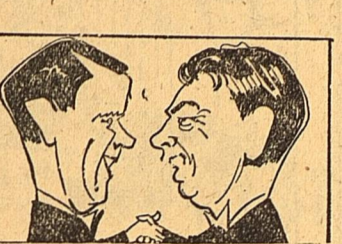

"As far as our squadron was concerned there was very little action in the late maneuvers. We were stationed at the Perlas islands for several days guarding the entrance to the canal against a surprise attack from the south. A patrol was maintained throughout the daylight hours and part of the night and early morning. All that tried to get through was a destroyer, which was soon spotted and bombed. One of the pilots on the early morning patrol thought he had landed a submarine and accordingly made his attack. He had a good bomber with him who got a direct hit with his smoke bomb, but instead of the object being a sub it was a whale of considerable size, and it promptly spouted a young geyser and took off. The pilot said he took a compass bearing on him and the last he saw he was headed on a true course for the Hawaiian islands and leaving a wake like the Saratoga."

"The maneuvers are about over, the ships are all in, either on this side or at Balboa. The Los Angeles has returned to the States and all the planes are here being checked over and made ready for a long hop back to Guantanamo bay on the coast of Cuba. They will be there about a month and then fly up to Norfolk."

"VF Squadron Two from the Langley came over for a visit a few days ago, they have eighteen Boeing F2E single seater fighters and are a real snappy fighting squadron. It has been more or less a tradition for the last few years for the navy and army pilots to take each other on for a "dog fight" when the fleet comes south. 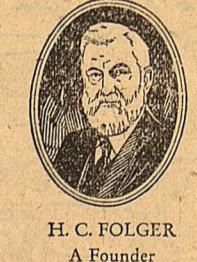
