

Another big job has been done in Midland's famous BIG WAY.

The drive for funds to carry on the year's work of the Midland Community Welfare association was practically completed within three hours yesterday morning. The goal had been reached and additional funds were in sight, expected to be secured today, which would guarantee to the association sufficient money to operate for twelve months.

The organization was put into effect only a year ago. be well done after all of that. Proof of its efficient and satisfactory work was seen in the fact that the women soliciting funds did not find it necessary to explain to the public what the money was to be used for.

In most cases no questions were asked. In many cases the checks were written out and waiting on desks of business men

And why not? The welfare association has created for Midland citizens a medium through which charity work has been handled effectively and without help from the average citizen. A small group of interested workers, serving entirely without pay or without administration expense to the organization, put in long hours making in-vestigations, gathering and distributing clothing and food and expending the association's funds judiciously.

And, perhaps the greatest feeling of satisfaction to met a large group of men, includeach citizen, welfare workers and all others, has been that ing some natives, standing around Midland has taken care of her own work. The few citizens who were overlooked by committees yesterday may well afford to seek the association treasurer and pay in contributions to the fund. The money will be spent carefully and wisely and to the honor of Midland.

One moral to be drawn from the news of the day seems to be that the city slicker has to stick to the city if he wants to keep on slicking people.





That night I did not sleep well. Early the next morning I arose and getting dressed, hurried down to . by Clark breakfast. After eating, I took a




