# FORT WORTH AVIATOR OFF ON LONG FLIGHT TO TOKYO, JAPAN

Pilots Seek to Make \$25,000 in Prize Money Offered

VANCOUVER, July 8. (UP). The monoplane Fort Worth, en reute to Tokio, passed over Prince George, British Columbia, at 11:30 a. m. today. The flyers were making less than 100 miles an hour.

SEATTLE, July 8, (UF)-Reg Robbins and H. S. Jones took off at 6 a. m. central time today, attempting a non-stop refueling flight to Tokyo.

They will meet a refueling trimotor at Fairbanks, flying together to Nome where the monoplane Fort Worth will take on a last load of gas before starting across the Pacific.

The plane was heavily loaded at the takeoff and rose slowly, almost striking the wires at the end of the



"Schnitzler will always be an acor's favorite among playwrights."
