PINK BOLL WORM QUARANTINE AMENDMENT EFFECTIVE AUG. 1

AFFECTS MIDLAND

Sixteen Counties of Two States Share In Changes

WASHINGTON, July 23. (AP).—Effective Aug. 1, the secretary of agriculture announced amendment to the pink bollworm quarantine under which permits are issued for movement of cotton from infested sections of Texas and New Mexico. The amendment covers the counties of Chaves Eddy, Otero, Dona Ana and Luna in New Mexico, and Pecos, Reeves Ward, Loving, El Paso, Winkler Andrews, Ector, Midland, Crane and Upton in Texas. Also there is included a small part of Hudspeth county along the north bank of the Rio Grande from a point immediately west of the town of McNary to the western border of the county.

The department explains that in the foregoing areas the infestation is so slight that fumigation of the material may be omitted without involving risk of spread of the pink

Heretofore both fumigation and compression have been required to rying pink bollworms to uninfested areas. The new amendment authorizes the plant quarantine and control administration, under certain conditions, to permit interstate movement of compressed but unfumigated bales of cotton lint produced in areas so lightly infested with the pink bollworm that in the judgment of the department any possible danger of spread of that insect in baled lint would be prevented by high compression without fumigation.

Recent investigations have confirmed, the department says, the importance of compression as a measure for greatly reducing or, under most favorable circumstances, entirely eliminating infestation of the

The release from fumigation applies only to square bales which have been compressed so that when ready for transportation they have a density of at least twenty-two pounds to the cubic foot. Permits for the shipment from the areas named of compressed but unfumithat relate primarily to the protection of the bales from contamination by cottonseed and to the sterilization of all cottonseed produced in the gin which bales the cotton.

State Concedes No Legality in Contract

AUSTIN July 23, (UP) The senate this morning voted to give the Red River Bridge company the right to sue the state on the contract dispute which has kept the Denison free bridge closed by federal injunction.

The senate action was taken following the reading of the governor's message outlining the need for such permission.

Under a bill passed by the senate the state concedes nothing concerning legality of the contract between the bridge company and the state but permits J. R. Handy, receiver, to get what money he can in court. As a condition to passage of the bill, Handy agreed to ask Judge Kennerly at Houston to dissolve the injunction.

Plan Agreement

AUSTIN, July 23. (AP).—A plan whereby the Red river free bridge north of Denison is expected to be was agreed upon Wednesday by Governor Ross S. Sterling, Senator Loy of Sherman, Cone Johnson, highway commissioner, and Sidney Benbow, assistant attorney general.

Filing of Suit The plan involves the introduction of a bill by Senator Loy to permit the Red River Bridge company, operator of a parallel toll bridge, to sue the state on its contract with the Texas highway commission.

Governor Sterling submitted the subject and Loy said he would inroduce the bill today. He predicted no difficulty in passing it in a few

Opening of the bridge had been delayed by a federal court injunction obtained by the toll bridge company. Loy said representatives of the toll bridge had promised to withdraw the injunction suit in event a law should be enacted permitting them to sue the state.

Attorneys for the toll bridge company said they believed the contract was valid while the attorney general's office claimed it was invalid. Under its terms the commission would pay the toll bridge company a sum estimated by Johnson as \$80,000 and estimated by the bridge concern at \$117,500.

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RAILROADS AND REDSKINS

'A railroad grade crossing in Texas claimed the life the other day of another of the human links connecting the present day with its lost frontier epoch. An Indian known as Old Roque, having attained the ripe age of 100, was killed by a passenger train near El Paso.

Old Roque belonged to a bygone era. He was one of Geronimo's band of Apaches, who harried the southwest in the old days until tough General Nelson Miles crushed them in 1886. Thereafter Old Roque became a "good Indien" had in the lost dian," herding sheep on the Texas plains and, in the last years of his life, making bows and arrows for the white children of El Paso and teaching them archery and wood-

All in all, the old chap's life spanned great events. He was born when Texas was a part of Mexico, and he kept on taking white men's scalps and burning homesteads for a whole decade after Custer went down at the Little Big Horn; and in his old age he became the friendly counsel-lor of white children, a survival in 20th century civilization direct from the stone age.

It was strange that he should be killed by a railroad train—this old warrior who had donned war paint so many times and had faced the rifles of frontiersmen and the horsemen of the United States army. Strange-and yet rather fitting.

For the railroad, more than anything else, ended the reign of the red man in the old west. When the first iron horse puffed across the plains, the Indian was done for. A few bloody years of protest remained, but the end was inevitable.

An Indian warrior ought to die in battle. Failing that, however, wasn't it right that this old fighter should die under the wheels of the mechanical monster that ended the reign of his tribesmen on the limitless plains?

THE PLIGHT OF THE RAILROADS

If you are wondering why the railroads want a 15 per cent increase in freight rates, you might consider the testimony recently given the Interstate Commerce Commission by J. J. Pelley, president of the New York, New Haven &
