

Thus, we have the working plan of the great heralded Fifty Million Dollar Bankers Pool for Relief of the Cattle Industry. Where does the relief come in? How do the methods of the Pool differ from present methods? They do not propose to make any loans for longer than six months. The cattleman have been getting their money on six months time always heretofore, and, in a good many instances, they could get twelve month money. The Pool does not propose to take any other character of collateral than livestock, we have always been able to get money on our livestock securities, but the deflation in values has reduced the value of a great many of the herds of the country to a point below the amount they are mortgaged for; and, it was the hope of the cattlemen that this Pool would accept land and other securities in addition to the livestock, thus enabling the owners of cattle that are mortgaged for more than they will bring on the market to add their lands or other character of collateral that they might have, to their cattle and obtain loans running from one to three years, which would make it possible for the cattle to grow into value equal, if not more, than the mortgage against them.

The Pool proposes to charge prevailing rates of interest on the loans they accept. What does the word "prevailing" mean? Does it mean any fixed rate? No, it means the

CATTLE LOANS ARE NEEDED ON LONG TIME



What they want, however, is advances financially that will save them from the ruthless demands of money sharks and interests that might have an ultrior motive in destroying the credit of the stockman.





PLAN MORE DRILLING IN FT. STOCKTON FIELD

From The Pioneer.

Among the many oil men who are unostentatiously preparing for drilling in the Fort Stockton field in the near future are W. K. Maull, of Oklahoma City, and his associate, J. C. Frazier, of Denver, Colo

Messrs. Maull and Frazier have kept in close touch with the field through currespondence with the Chamber of Commerce, for the past several months, and Mr. Frazier, who arrived here during the past week, has been busy shaping up things preparatory to the beginning of drilling at an early date.

While the exact location has not, as yet, been determined, it is definitely decided that a standard rig will be erected on section 23, township 8, block 48, Texas & Pacific railway survey, land owned by Mrs. Mary Roberts, of Oklahoma City.

The operators had expected to be ready to begin drilling by the first of this month, but unanticipated contingencies arose which have delayed matters and very likely the rig will not reach here before the middle of July; but immediately following its arrival work will be crowded and it is expected that the operators will be "all set," ready to spud in on or before August 1st.

Maull and Frazier are said to be men of experience in the oil game, with ample financial resources to care for all ogligations they may assume, and their coming into the Fort Stockton field will cause others to become actively interested without nuch more delay.

The area in which the Messrs. Maull and Frazier will initiate operations lies about 20 miles northwest of Fort Stockton, and, in the opinion of many old oil men who have carefull canvassed the county, that immediate vicinity presents some very pronounced and significant surface indications of oil; some emphatically stating it is their belief that the biggest pool of oil in the county lies under the surface of that district.

There has been for some time, more or less talk of drilling in that section of the county and now that Maull & Frazier have determined to start the work their operations will be watched with decided interest.
