The party left College Station Friday evening, going to Galveston for Saturday and leaving for Midland that evening.

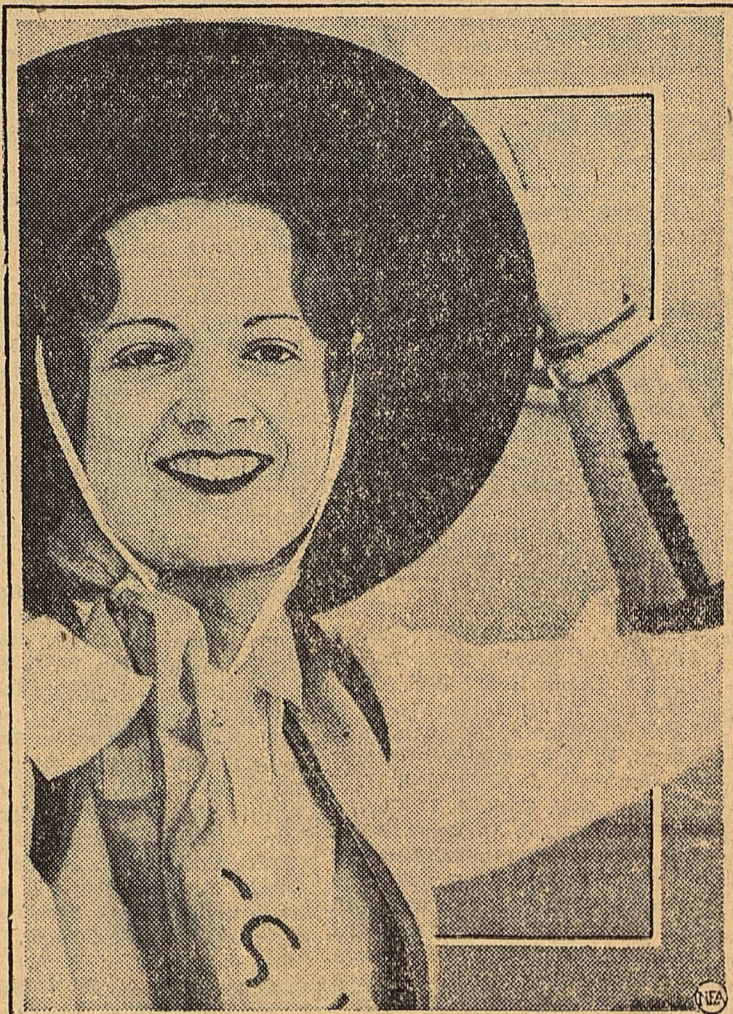
Stories of the course will be written by each delegate and published in the Reporter-Telegram.

Four New Books on Rent Shelf and Four Are Donated to Midland County Library

Among the new books recently put on the rent shelf at the county library are:

"The Shiny Night" by Beatrice Turnstall.

The story covers sixty years of the life of Seth Shone. After eight years in a penal settlement, Seth returns to his native home in England, determined to visit vengeance upon the men who had caused his downfall. With old time superstition, he carved in stone the figures of his enemies and set them up till such time as they should fall before his hatred. The curse that he put upon those who had ruined his life (or at least marred it for years) proves to be a successful one as he watches his enemies fall before him.

The book is not solely concerned with Seth's vengeance for it tells the story of his happy marriage to Elizabeth, of his successful farming, of his children, and his grandchildren.

This is Miss Tunstall's first novel but the soil of England and the spirit of the English have been so well portrayed that even this first book makes her a novelist worthy of notice.

"The Square Circle" by Denis Mackail.

This is a cross section of life as it is lived in "Tiverton Square", an aristocratic residential section near London. The old and the young, the rich and the poor, the social ascendant and the socially negligible are all pictured for they all go to make up the circle of life.

The book is written with Denis Mackail's pleasing humor and intelligent, suave style. His characters are real individuals and not mere puppets.

"The Vintage of Yon Kee" by Louise Jordan Mill.

This book is another novel of the everlasting problem of the White-and-Yellow. The heroine, Lois Al-lingham, is the daughter of a Chinese mother and an English father. Having the characteristics of both races, she is beloved by both an Englishman and a Chinese. It is in this fact that the girl finds her hardest problem and that the tragedy of mixed blood becomes evident.

Choice Cooks' Corner

**Sour Potatoes with Bay Leaves**  
1-2 cup finely diced salt pork  
1-2 cup finely chopped onion  
1 pint boiling water  
5 pared potatoes, cut in quarters  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
Pepper  
2 bay leaves

1 tablespoon vinegar  
3 tablespoons browned flour  
1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley

Fry out the salt pork until brown and crisp. Remove the pork and cook onions in the fat until lightly browned. Add to the water and potatoes with the salt, pepper, and bay leaves and stir in the vinegar. The browned flour and crisped pork. When well mixed, serve with the parsley sprinkled over the top.

**Carrots Cooked in Broth**  
2 to 3 cups mutton or lamb broth  
5 or 6 medium sized carrots  
Pepper  
1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley

Heat the broth to boiling. Wash, scrape and cut the carrots into thin lengthwise pieces. Cook them in the broth from 10 to 15 minutes or until tender. Season with salt, pepper, and parsley. Serve with some of the broth.

**Cheese Cake**  
1 pound cottage cheese  
1-3 cup sugar  
1-4 cup milk or cream  
3 eggs, beaten  
1-2 cup chopped raisins  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
Rind and juice of one lemon  
2 tablespoons melted butter

Press the cheese through a fine strainer, beaten eggs, melted butter, sieve. Add the cream, sugar, salt, and lemon juice and grated rind, and stir until well mixed. Line a deep pie tin with pastry and bake until a delicate brown. Fill with the cheese mixture. Bake in a moderate oven until firm in the center, about 15 to 20 minutes. Serve cold.
