

Did you know that the Fergusons had one of the most valuable contracts granted by the State given to them by one of Mrs. Ferguson's appointees on the board of control, who held office until January 1, 1931? This contract was to furnish butter to all the eleemosynary institutions of Texas. The Fergusons had this contract from 1927 to 1931, receiving an average price of 45c per pound, and they sold over 35,000 pounds per year. Here is

Sterling's Record

State Tax Rate

Under Governor Sterling's administration the state ad valorem tax rate has been cut five cents per one hundred dollar valuation, thus making the present tax rate 69c per one hundred dollar valuation. Highway Department

Practically everyone knows the story of graft and exorbitant contracts which were made by the Ferguson administration. In fact, the Attorney General of Texas recovered over a million dollars and cancelled many of the corrupt contracts illegally let by the Ferguson Highway Commission. The Fergusons have promised the same kind of administration that they gave the people six years ago. Topping contracts were let by the Ferguson highway commission at 30c per square yard and identical contracts by the Sterling administration at 81/2c per square yard.

Penitentiary System

Everyone knows about the traffic in pardons that was conducted under the Ferguson administration. One hundred and fifty-one pardons were granted during the last two days of that administration. One of the first acts of the next Legislature, after the last Ferguson administration, was to appropriate \$875,000 to take care of the deficit in the penitentiary system, which is a striking contrast with the present administration, under Governor Ross Sterling. An actual comparison shows that the per capita cost of keeping prisoners under the Ferguson administration was more than twice that under the Sterling administration.

What Sterling Has Done

Repayment of County Bonds
