Senate Adopts Amendment Restricting Cotton Planting

NO VOTE OF HOUSE

Reduction Is Fourth Rather Than Third

As Proposed AUSTIN, Sept. 16. (UP).—The senate today adopted the Archie Parr amendment restricting cotton planting in 1932 to a fourth of the 1931 cultivated land acreage, instead of a third, by a vote of 15 to 12. The house had not voted at noon.

Legislators Warm To Solon's Speech

AUSTIN, Sept. 15. (AP).—The wrath of Texas legislators, aroused by accusations of Governor Huey P. Long of Louisiana that they were influenced by money, last night appeared to have destroyed any chances for adoption by Texas of the 1932 cotton prohibition plan Governor Long championed.

No vote was in prospect before today, but sentiment in both houses appeared aligned definitely in sup port of acreage curtailment, either to one-third or one-fourth of the land in cultivation. Members predicted this action would result in a 50 per cent reduction in the 1932

Uproar of Indignation The house was swept into an up-roar of indignation yesterday and cheered Rep. T. H. McGregor o Austin, a southern orator of the old school, as he denounced Governor Long in the bitterest language heard on the floor of the chamber in many years. After he had spoken in the house, 18 of the 31 senators signed a resolution asking him to address the senate and members of the house trooped over in a body

to hear the second attack. McGregor described Governor Long as "arrogantly braying from Louisiana" and declared it was "the first time in history that ignorance impudence and insolence combined have crossed the state line and the people of Texas been insulted by political ambition and demagogu-

"Drunk with Ignorance" He declared the Louisiana executive was "drunk with ignorance and power" when he charged the Texas


