WASHINGTON, June 16 (UP).—Final action to close the case of Albert B. Fall, formerly secretary of the interior, was undertaken today by the government as President Hoover, Former President Coolidge and Atlee Pomerene, special prosecutor of the Fall oil scandals, dedicated at Marion, Ohio, the mausoleum of Harding, Fall's former chief.

Here District Attorney Lee Rover prepared to appoint two physicians to determine whether Fall was able to endure two years imprisonment to which he was sentenced.



A Mexican, Antonio Rodriquez, came into the United Dry Goods company store and said he wanted to look at merchandise. While he was examining this the other Mexican decided

he wanted to buy shoes. Mrs. Oliver suspected the two were planning to get away with dry goods, so she made a pretense of showing shoes to one Mexican, watching the one in the front of the store all the

She saw Rodriquez slip something into his clothing. Walk-

ing through the front of the store under pretense of getting a pair of shoes out of a display window, she shut the front door in the face of the amazed shoplifter, telling him not to move, that he had dry goods in his clothing and that he was going

Directing Mrs. L. C. Stephenson to call the sheriff, Mrs. Oliver stood close to the Mexican, threatening to hit him with her fist if he moved. The fact that there were only the two women in the store at the time apparently made no difference to the two Mexicans, for neither tried to get away. The shoplifter fell on his knees and begged to be allowed to get away, saying he was the sole support of his poor,

The sheriff said, however, the son of the poor, sick mother is a professional shoplifter and hides goods until he can carry them to a fence dealer. He operates in several towns of this section, generally with a com-

The Mexican who went into the United Dry Goods company store with Rodriquez, however, "didn't know" him, volubly swearing he had never seen him before. A Mexican woman was questioned. At first, she said she did not know Rodriguez, but later said he was a "good friend."

Rodriguez was found guilty of misdemeanor and is in jail, not having money enough to pay his fine.

There is nothing particularly new in the Wickersham Commission's remarks about the evil effects of politics on the administration of criminal justice in the United States. Every man who has had occasion to watch criminal courts and prosecutors' offices at close range has been saying the same thing, privately, for years.

They "know somebody in the prosecutor's office"; that is enough.

Under such circumstances, is it any wonder that bootleggers, grafters of high and low degree, underworld leaders of all descriptions and a whole host of crooks of other varieties slip through the courts unscathed? The same system that fixes a parking ticket for John Citizen, who has a friend who knows Somebody with Influence, prevents society from even beginning to deal effectively with its worst enemies.

If the Wickersham report on this one point can jar the public into activity the commission will have justified its existence. For a great many years we have been kidding ourselves, wondering why so much crime went unpunished when the answer was obvious to everyone who was at all familiar with the facts. Until the prosecutor's office, the criminal court and the police department can be removed from political influence our administration of justice will continue to be the inefficient and frequently scandalous matter that it is today.

A DAMNING PICTURE

"Just working, working, working all the time." That was the only explanation offered by a pretty young waitress who was taken to a middle western hospital the other day after making an unsuccessful attempt to end her life by taking poison. Brief as it is, her explanation is terribly impressive.

Back of it there is clearly evident the dreadful monotony that falls over some jobs. One can picture the endless succession of days that were exactly alike; days of hard work; unpleasant living conditions and insufficient recreation. When the sameness of "working, working all the time" can drive an attractive young girl to suicide one gets a damning picture of the lives which some wage earners in modern cities have to live.

WASHINGTON.—Speaking of jobs here are nearly 17,000 government positions here held by men and women who are theoretically not entitled to them.

They have all been available at one time or another to people out in the states who wouldn't come and take them.

The law provides that as far 95 cossible appointments in the departmental service in Washington shall be apportioned among the states on the basis of population. The Civil Service commission has been making almost frantic efforts to enforce that provision, but one still finds that Forty-four states and territories which are entitled to about 36,000 of the apportioned appointments here have received only about 19,000. Virginia, Maryland, and the Disrict of Columbia, entitled to 1389 appointments, have 17,739. That is

Homesteaders and desert land owners supply part of the plants i clearing their holdings but most of

SPAIN'S ARMY **REORGANIZED ON** FIGHTING BASIS

MADRID, June 16.—Spain's army will be reorganized on a fighting basis of eight divisions totalling 100,000 men by July 1. It will be devoid of skeleton battalions and contains only the necessary number of officers to command each

first serious attempt to solve the army problem ever made in the history of this country, so harassed by the combination of military men and politics, especially since Spanish-American War days, is being executed under the direction of Minister of War, Don Manuel Azana.

No longer is it possible for the majors, lieutenant-colonels, and colonels of a regiment stationed in Morocco, for example, to stay in Madrid, or some other Peninsula city, while a captain remains in charge of the entire regiment; no longer will there be regiments with a dozen times more officers than are necessary; and the total number of generals will be nearer 80 than the old figure of 548.

Furthermore, in all probability there will not be a generalissimo. or the Captain-General of the Army. The vacancy caused by the death of Captain-General Valeriano Wevler last November was filled shortly after the advent of the Republic with the appointof Lieut.-Gen. Francisco Aguilera to that post; but with Aguilera's death in May it is again vacant, and the chances are that it will no longer be possible for an army officer to aspire any higher rank than Lieutenant-General.

Azana's plan is to have the army maintained in such a state of efficiency that in case of war it would be possible to build up a much larger army, the permanent personnel not only serving as the nucleus, but as a corps to train the

The plan of divisions is similar to the one used in France, Russia, and Japan-which means the divisions are smaller and more mobile than the full divisions of the United States army.
