(UP)-"The feminine line of the past few seasons is dead," says the eminent fashion specialist, Jean Patou, "The monotony and lack of personality expressed by the majority of dresses worn during the summer were for the practiced eye, symptomatic of that lassitude which marks the end of an epoch and the necessity for a change." he added.
