

Instead, we let the tide of things go on without us. At some point along life's journey we permit our roots to go down too far. We become fixed, we harden into a form that cannot be changed: and presently—like this old lady in New York—we find that we are on the shelf, hopelessly out of adjustment with the currents of today.

'And yet, even when that happens, the old person is not entirely an object for pity. For the very old seem to make up for their withdrawal from the world by re-creating the world that used to be. They have their memories, they are intimate with the shadows of men and events that passed long ago; and very often-as in this casethey are content with them.

This New York lady, now; she had been a society bell when Abraham Lincoln was president, she had danced with that debonair Prince of Wales who was to reign as always youthful. Try MELLO-GLO.
