cotton to be withheld.

Regarding cotton, Stone's statement said:

prior to July 31, 1933, more than 300,000 bales have been sold. The corporation will immediately withdraw its remaining stocks from sale until March 1, 1933, with the exception of certain small amounts now on consignment in foreign countries, and such cotton as may be sold at 12 cents per pound or more based on the near month of the New York cotton exchange.

"The American Cotton Cooperative association will maintain its present stocks of the 1930 crop until July 31, 1933, with similar exceptions for sales at the above prices.

"These steps are being taken and loans obtained so that the cotton growers will get the full benefit of the market for their crop of this year and for the purpose of enabling the organizations to gradually liquidate their holdings during periods when more active demand is anticipated."

# LABOR DAY TOLL

(By United Press)

Two hundred deaths were reported in national Labor day celebrations. Six were killed in airplane mishaps and most of the remainder were caused by automobile accidents and drownings.

Automoble accidents and drownings combined to mar the annual tribute to labor. Two hundred were killed in auto collisions and dozens were injured.

Highway officials expected the list to be increased greatly by home-coming autoists. Roads were collected with cars near the metropolitan centers and accidents and collisions were numerous.

Automoble races accounted for one life in Massachusetts. The water ranked second to automobiles as a contributing factor to the fatality list, a dozen or more drwonings being reported. At New York a fishing launch overturned, throwing its six occupants into the water. Four were rescued, one drifted ashore on the overturned boat, but the sixth, Capt. Emil Steffens, was drowned. In addition to the single heat death, in Pennsylvania, the East reported hundreds of prostrations, 244 such cases being treated in washington, D. C., alone, during a firemen's parade. A large section of the East suffered from intense heat.

Finally, the big day arrived.



## **BULLETIN 305 GIVES MIDLAND**




