



In 1919 the R 34, built according to plans gathered by British engineers from German Zeppelins brought down during the World War, thrilled the British people by being the first to cross, the Atlantic In July, 1919, she flew to New York in 108 hours and came back in 75. In 1921 she was wrecked at Howden. And from that time on most of the breaks were against the British. There were a number of mishaps, one of the worst being with the R 38 which the government built for sale to the United States Navy. August 24, 1921, she broke in two and fell in flames while she was on a trial flight over England, Commander Campbell, her constructor, and a crew of young American naval officers and men
