

President M. L. McClure will be actively in charge of the company's operations, with headquarters in Chiago. All details and regulations will be left to the six directors, who also constitute the executive committee. The six directors are: M. L. McClure Frank Connor, John Washburn, vicepresident Continental & Commercial National Bank, Chicago; Melvin A. Taylor, president First Trust & Savings Bank, Chicago; S. T. Kiddoo, president Live Stock Exchange National Bank, Chicago; John Fletcher, vice-president, Fort Dearborn National Bank, Chicago. This number will later be increased to fifteen by the election of nine additional members to be chosen by those contributing to the pool.

A good many of the plans suggested heretofore to help the stockmen have failed to materialize and the country has little faith in federal or State assistance. This pool, however, has all the earmarks of a successful concern and stock growers as well as feeders have a right to feel hopeful that some, at feast, of their serious financial difficulties are in a fair way to be solved.

OIL DEVELOPMENT IN THE PEGOS FIELD

An engineer from the Poland-American Petroleum Corporation, will reach Pecos within the next week to plan an extensive drilling program on the properties of that organization in the Pecos territority. The Corporation, which is backed by interests of the Galacian fields of Europe, has 20,000 acres in this area secured from the Toyah Basin Oil Company, a New York organization. The exact location of the drilling operation will not be known until after the engineers make an inspection of the field, but it is thought that the company will develop properties in the Bell territory and in Crane county. It is understood that the work will be done by men from the Galacian fields, where oil is obtained from depths of from 3,800 to 6,000 feet, and where the water troubles are said to be similar to those of the Pecos territory.

This organization will be the third to enter the Pecos area within the past few weeks. The Chris A. Jensen Syndicate of Chicago is to drill on section 2, block 54, township 1, Loving county, as soon as their rig arrives here from the Ranger field, and the Cook & O'Brien company of Wichita Falls and Amarillo, has men erecting a rotary nig in eastern Ward county on the Sherman O'Brien ranch.
