First clash in the trial of Doris Dixson, negress, charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting on July 26 last of Dewey Edwards, negro, was won by the prosecution when the case was called for trial in district court this morning.

prosecution when the case was called when Northwestern university, in Evanston, III., announced prior to selection of a jury to try the case, made a motion to have the case transferred to the county court, offering testimony to show that the defendant was only seventeen years old. He placed on the stand Lois Stewart, negress, sister of Doris, who testified that she was present at the birth of the defendant and that the date was June 3, 1915, or seventeen years ago.

A. C. Francis, sheriff who made the arrest on the night of the shooting of Edwards, testified that Doris told him at the time of the arrest that she was eighteen years of age. Richard Brown, negro janitor at the First National bank, testified that he was with the sheriff when the arrest was made, and corroborated the testimony.

A note of humor came into the preliminaries of the trial when Prosecutor Bob Smith took the stand and testified that Doris had told him she was eighteen.

SOCIETY'S RESPONSIBILITY

One of the most tragic stories of the depression has to do with Frank Howard, 72-year-old Boston man, who seems likely to spend the remainder of his life in prison for the theft of a pair of shoes, a bottle of perfume and a handbag, all worth \$7.

Howard was sentenced to life imprisonment for armed robbery back in 1897, but in 1914 he was given a pa-

For 14 years he worked as a painter and went straight. He married and became a respectable citizen. Then came the depression and Howard was out of work. For nearly four years he stuck it out, doing odd jobs here and there and making a \$5 old age pension go as far as it would. Then, desperate, he committed the theft, was caught and automatically committed to prison.

The logical supposition is that Howard would have gone "straight" if society had been prepared to give him work. Cases of this kind emphasize more and more the fact that society must take a large share of the blame for many of our criminal acts.

Best Colors for Dark and Light Rooms Given

If you are planning to do over one or more of your rooms this fall, you are deen in the color scheme problem—than which there is none more exciting. If you are bewildered first ask yourself a few simple questions and then follow the rules of Mary Davis Gillies, well-known decorator. Explaining why you need at least three colors in any color scheme and which are best for different kinds of rooms and furniture she writes in McCall's for October: "Since paint and, fabrics—the two essentials for introducing color—are so inexpensive there's no excuse for If you are planning to do over decorator. any other color and most nearly approaches the effect of sunlight. Red orange, rust, peach, etc, are used to relieve the intensity of color schemes in which cool colors predominate. A porch, wide overhanging eaves trees outside the window, or reflected light from a nearby window may all affect the color of the light entering a window, and thus modify the effects of a certain exposure

exposure.

"The next thing to consider is the size of the room. Light colors have a way of making things seem larger than they are and therefore are essentially useful in decorating small rooms. Interest is now being shown in dark green, brown, and blue walls. For most of us, dark walls are a mistake even in large rooms. Unless they are expertly handled the weight of the color scheme actually seems to exert a pressure on one. In large rooms, dark tones in rugs, fabrics and upholstering are absolutely essential. Light colors used in a large room without a sufficient balance of dark color make a room seem empty and color make a room seem empty and

"In most cases the floors should be the darkest part of the room, the ceiling the lightest, and the walls somewhere in between. The drap-eries should be darker than the eries should be darker than the walls. However, the ground color of chintz or cretonne may be the same value as the walls. The upholstering may be brighter than the background colors, but slightly graved colors are usually the best choice. The woodwork in most cases should be painted the same color as the walls. In any case too strong a con-

he painted the same color as the walls. In any case too strong a contrast should be avoided. It makes a room spotty and disturbed. But in certain types of houses such as Early English or Early American natural finished woods are helpful in establishing the period.

"No color plan is good unless it includes three or more colors. You have all seen blue, pink, orchid or green bedrooms in which only one color was used for draveries, bedropread, rugs, scarves, etc. The result of such a scheme is bound to be shallow and monotonous. Contrast gives a room vitality. Brown must be an acceptable feature of the color scheme if the furniture is walnut. Yellow tones must be agreeable nut. Yellow tones must be agreeable if the wood is maple: and with mahogany, dark red-violet or dark red-brown is the key color."
