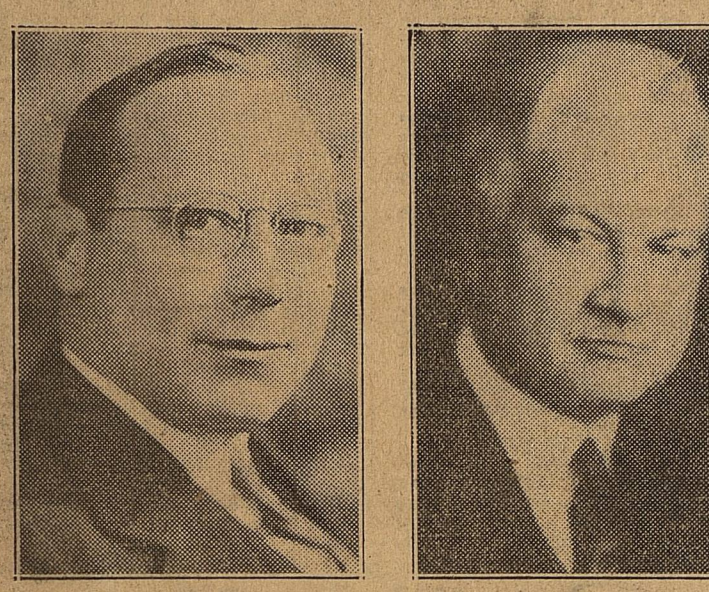

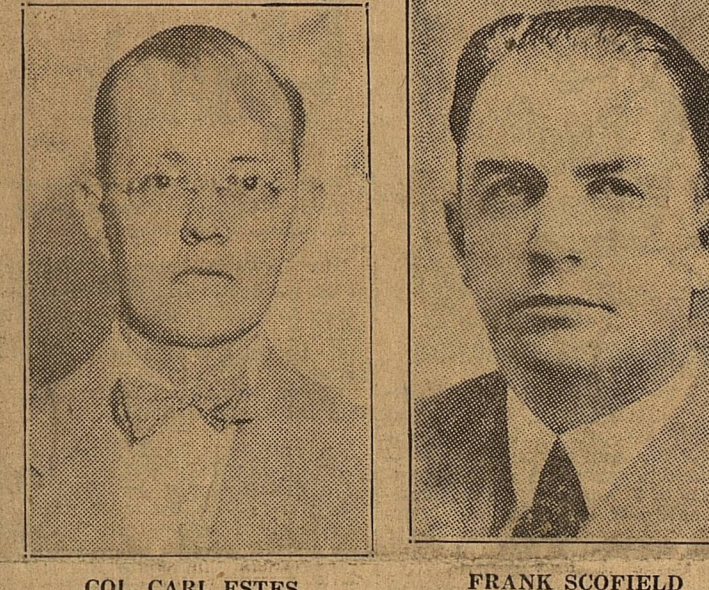
LEAVES FOR RACES

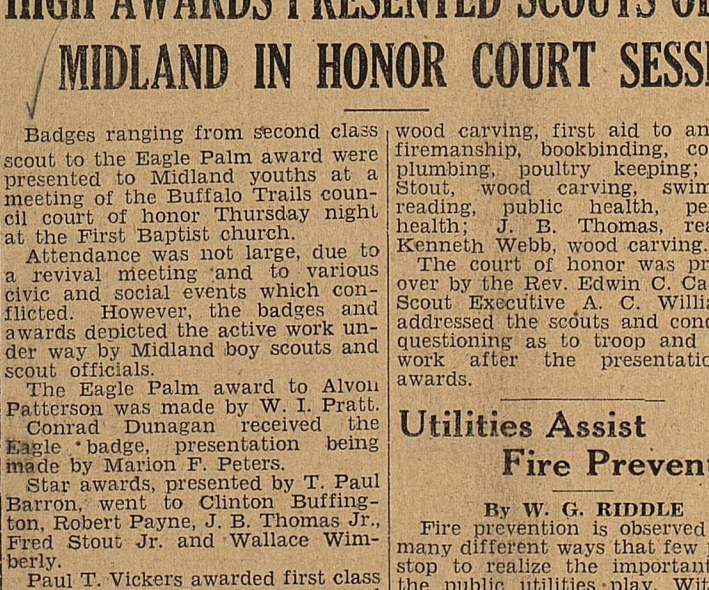

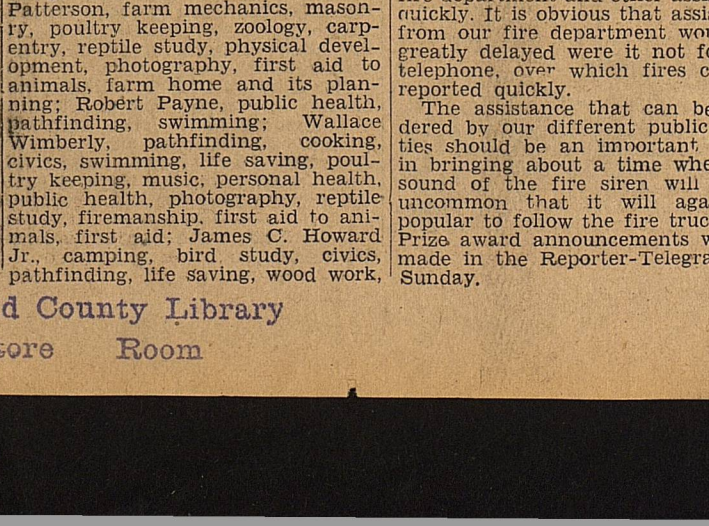

Overproduction Suit Is Filed

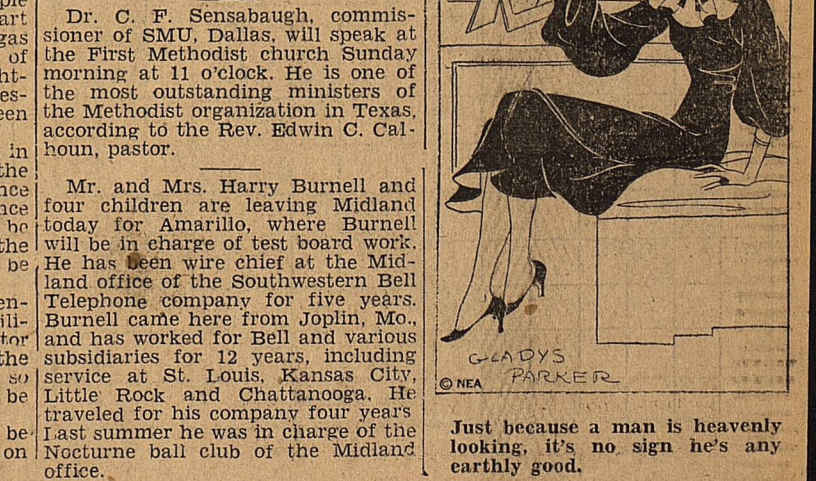

## PERSONALITY OF JOHN GARNER

Editor's Note: The following paper was read before the Fine Arts club Wednesday by Mrs. T. Paul Barron. Another paper, on the Life of Stephen F. Austin, will be published by The Reporter-Telegram Sunday.

Spending thirty years in Congress before making his first and only political blunder, John Garner, Speaker of the House and Democratic nominee for the vice presidency, may well be called one of the ablest professional politicians in America.

The political blunder referred to was his recent tax bill sponsored by Garner to please William Randolph Hearst, who was backing the Texas in all of his newspapers as democratic nominee for the presidency. Exceedingly canny, he takes advantage of his long experience and is an outstanding "parliamentary scrapper." Paul Y. Anderson, writing about John Garner in "The Nation" said: "His only political poker game in which he sits he will have at least one ace in each sleeve and 'possibly an entire deck'."

To bear out his political methods, it should be noted when his sales tax bill lost in Congress, Garner made a speech to the effect that he had never been in favor of such a tax, but was burning with desire to "balance the budget."

Garner possesses great political nerve. When the Mellon tax plan was presented in the House, the Texan said: "I am not interested in this. Using mild profanity, he said he could write a better one in 24 hours."

Political history of the last few months shows us that he did prepare a substitute in 24 hours, having it successfully passed. One writer says that John Garner is at bottom a thoroughly conservative man, a combination of big-time politician and a small town banker; and that on top he is a frontiersman.

Garner has the frontier spirit of a man who knows the law, the roughness of the under-dog. He has the frontiersman's pride in being very much on the level, and bears a reputation for self reliance.

His personal word is said to be as good as his bond and his personal bond good for a million dollars plus. A close friend said he knew Garner for years before he learned of the Texan's wealth, a noteworthy attribute in itself.

John Garner got his wealth, according to Texans who know him personally, through shrewd trading. He lives frugally, hates extravagance on his own part or that of the government, and even refused to accept the "official car" which the government provides for the Speaker of the House, saying that he could get to and from his office for 50 cents a day in taxis instead of the \$5 a day it would cost the government for the official car and chauffeur.

Foker is said to be Garner's chief vice, although some would not call it a vice to win as much as \$15,000 in one session.

Prior to coming of age, while he lived in northeast Texas, John Garner had his disabilities removed and ran for the office of county attorney. He was elected because of the backing given him by the saloon element. His first act was to enforce the Sunday closing law on saloons and this brought a great protest from his backers. He was courageous however, and insisted upon enforcement of the law. An unprecedented wave of prosperity came upon the little town in which he lived and he grew in popularity.

Shortly afterward, he became ill and was advised to seek a different climate to prevent lung trouble. He moved to Uvalde, his present home. He ran for the state legislature, was elected and immediately introduced a bill to divide Texas into five states. The bill, of course, lost, but Garner's section of the state was given a new congressional district. Garner announced for the office of congressman from the new district and was elected. He has held the place for fifteen terms without making another campaign. His people seem to think that he is their congressman for life.

John Garner possesses both physical and mental hardihood. One would never believe now, at his age of 63, that he had almost suffered from lung trouble. He has the leathery visage of the plainsman, cold blue eyes, a hooked nose, shaggy eye-brows, a hooked head that is thick with curly, thick gray hair; he has a tight, down curving mouth.

In Washington, Garner has such picturesque nicknames as Cactus-Jack, Texas Tiger and Chaparral Jack.

He is said to be the soundest and most correct drinker in Washington, preferring the hot ready to drink corn if it is good.

Summarizing John Garner's personality and the impression he gives to those who know him, he is one of the ablest professional politicians in the business; he is familiar with the routine and technique of government; he has a natural sympathy for the common man; he personifies the frontier romance; he is a sound man with distinct limitations.

Clinton W. Gilbert, in "The Forum" said Garner is a grasshopper of the routine court house, the country bank and the rural political conventions, with a post graduate course of thirty years in the United States congress.

Gilbert added that Garner has a hard practical head, an infinite understanding of human beings.

He is indifferent to publicity and is never divided in his mind because he is not worried about what the papers may say about him or his actions.

He does not play the game of politics according to the rules, and where ordinary politician is cunning, Garner is wise.

He never wanted to be senator or governor, placing the Speakership of the House in first rank, a big-time political ambition. The idea of being president or vice president had never occurred to him until he was nominated recently. Even then, he remained in the background, diligently until the evening, has Mrs. Garner for his secretary, does not accept dinner invitations except where necessary. When anyone asks a favor of him, he either grants or refuses it, never "beating about the bush."

Garner has courage and will fight, but once the fighting is over, he is anxious to heal the wounds he may have caused to his opponents.

The Texan does not swell up with his job. When he became floor leader, he showed little change, merely abandoned his Western broad-brimmed hat for a derby. Later, his wife bought him a "slouch" hat, realizing that the derby pulled down on his ears, was not the type it he should wear. He still wears the "slouch" hat.

John Garner possesses great vitality and is a man's man. He gets fun out of life and is regarded as a clever conversationalist, although he is conservative even in his conversation.
