Employment in Texas Increases

AUSTIN. (UP)-A 4.9 per cent in crease in number of persons employed in 930 Texas firms during the period from Aug. 15 to Sept. 15 is one of the largest in recent years, according to the University of Texas business research bureau.

During this period the 930 firms

reporting showed an increase of 3,083 workers over the preceding month, or a total of 66,172 workers on Sept. 15 as compared with 63,089 on Aug.

Last year, for the corresponding Last year, for the corresponding period there was a drop of 0.5 per cent, and in 1930 a 4.5 per cent drop. In the boom year of 1929 the increase was only 1.31 per cent.



As compared with Sept. 1932, the number of workers on payrolls for the month just passed was only 12.7 per cent behind. The decline has been as much as 19.9 per cent, which occurred in May, 1932.

Repelling Indians Was Hazardous Job Of Texas Rangers

The red-man, fired by the exhortations of old chieftains, realizing theirs was a battle to death, stubbornly lighting each foot of ground, raided, plundered, massacred and burned in a futile effort to regain their hunting grounds. It took the Rangers and militia nearly three-quarters of a century to repel them, costing the lives of hundreds of white men,

From these Ranger-Indian fighters came such personalities as Shap-

es came such personalities as Shap ey R. Ross and his son, Lawrence ley R. Ross and his son, Lawrence later governor of the state and a president of Texas A. & M. college Perhaps the most colorful of all was "Big Foot" Wallace, a six foot and two inch Virginian who came to Texas in 1836, a few months after the Texas battle for independence at San Jacinto, to avenge the slaying of his brother in Fannin's massacre.

Wallace received the name "Big Foot" while a prisoner in Mexico City where he was taken after he had been captured with the ill-fated Mier expedition and had drawn a white bean at the execution thus saving his life. No shoes could be
