

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



LONDON. (UP).—No less than ine ruling princes of India shortly vill be among the shareholders of he "Pioneer." published at Allahapad, one of the best known Indian newspapers. The "Pioneer" thus qualified as the most royal of all

qualified as the most royal of all royal newspapers. A syndicate, headed by J. P. Srivastava, Minister of Education in the United Provinces, has pur-chased the newspaper. The Maha-rajahs of Kashmir. Baroda, Gwa-lior, Travancore, Bikaner, Patiala, Jaipur and Bhavnagar and the Nawab of Bhopal all have prom-ised to buy shares in the paper, according to information reach-ing London.

according to information reach-ing London. Three of them, the Maharaiahs of Kashmir, Bavoda and Gwalior, are each entitled to salutes of twenty-one guns on ceremonial occasions. King George V is en-titled to no more. Saluting guns will have to boom 170 times if all the royal share-holders pay state visits to their property at the same time. The Mahārajah of Gwalior is only 16 years old, the Maharajah of Travancere only 20. Needless to say, the policy of the newspaper will be anti-Gandhi and anti-Indian National Con-gress.
