Severe weather for most of Texas was forecast by government bureaus today with freezing temperatures in a great portion of the state predicted for tonight.

The East Texas forecast was for partly cloudy, preceded by rain in the southeast portion; a cold wave in the interior except northwest, temperatures of from 22 to 30 degrees in the north portion, freezing in the interior of the south portion tonight; with mostly fair weather Tuesday, colder in the southeast.
