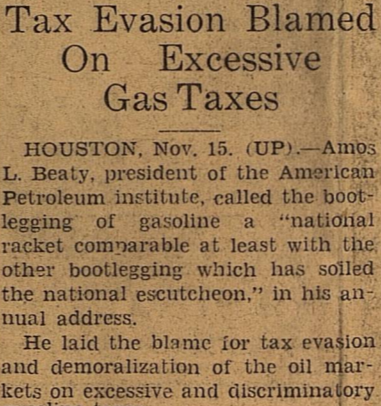

Comprehensible Art Necessary

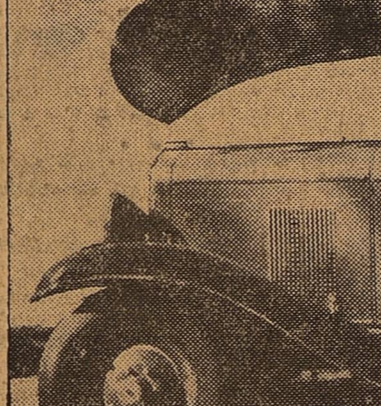
AUSTIN.—To be great, art must be comprehensible, in the opinion of Dr. L. W. Payne, professor of English at the University of Texas. (UP)—Oklahoma lawyers may pocket \$707,940 in fees if they are successful in 513 World War veterans' suits for war risk insurance now on the Federal court records, disclosed that suits totaling \$7,079,400, brought by veterans, who claim they were totally disabled in the service, are pending here, at Tulsa and at Muskogee. The law allowed 10 per cent of the amount recovered to veterans' attorneys. The government pays both beneficiary and attorney.

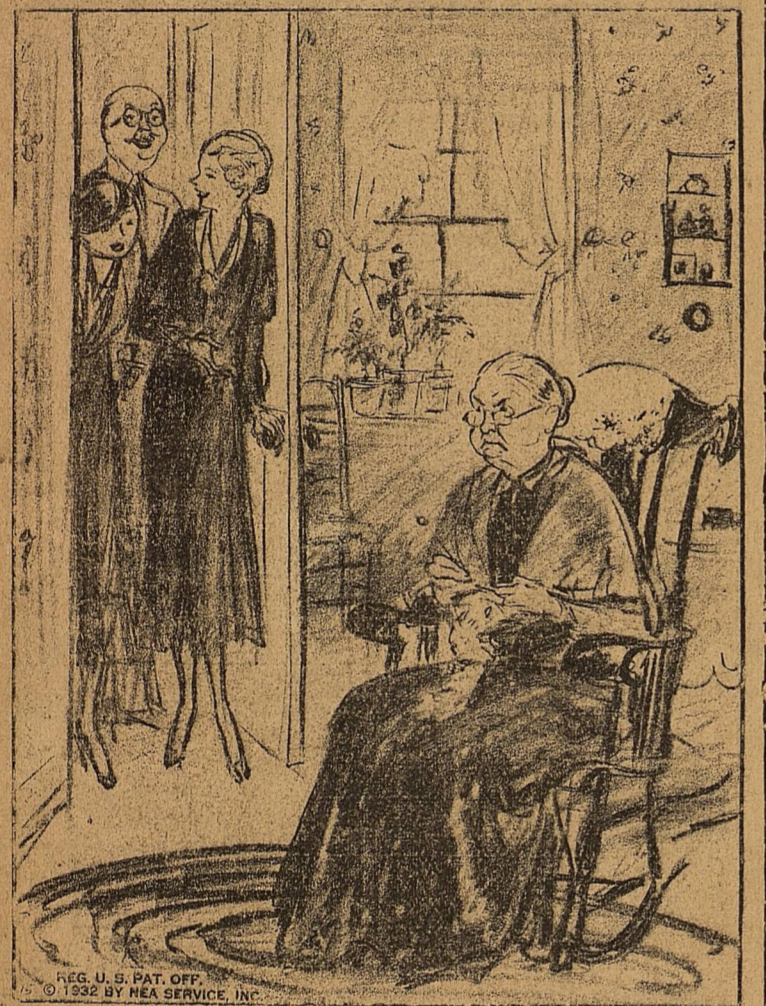
EDITORIAL NOTES

Two mistakes by Frog play-caller gave the crowd several of its greatest thrills and, as none of them really hurt, it was a big boost for the spectacular part of what everybody except the Texas delegation said was a grand game.

Near the end of the half, with the score 7-0, and knowing only a few seconds remained in which to play, a pass was called near mid-field on fourth down. Now it doesn't take but a couple of seconds of playing time to pull a pass play. Doubtless the Frogs figured they had better time for one play. So, instead of taking a punt at the ball and insuring retirement for the half with a 7-point lead, the pass was pulled and failed.

It drew a five yard penalty, being the third incomplete pass in a row. And Texas had the ball right on the middle stripe. Mr. Koy dropped back and heaved a long one down the field. Mr. Stafford got by the left halfback, received the ball in a clear field and lit out for the goal line.

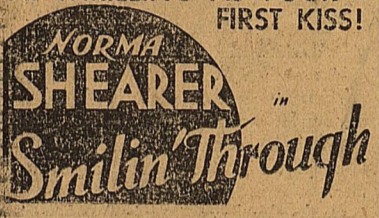

Alabama tied Stanford in the Rose Bowl on the same play in 1927.

Well, Koy got loose and made a first down inside the Frog five-yard line, and was the crowd excited. Big Ernie got shot and gave all he had in a terrific hot off his right tackle. And Buster Evannon hit him on his shoulder and dumped him for no playing fallback for Texas.

Now, when it came to tacklin' that was different. If it hadn't been for that guy Stafford, TCU would have made plenty of touchdowns.

So we still have to give it to him.

And there's the memory of Red Oliver hurtling into the line, almost struck by a catapult.

And Red played a good ball game every other way, if you ask me. He blocked and tackled and took care of all defensive and offensive assignments like the great money player he is. Red likes the big crowds and the big games.

Hilliard is a great, a thrilling ball carrier. He just couldn't get that's all. But I'll take my Spearman until Hilliard comes along a little bit further. Spearman returned two punts when we were in the "time-hole, goin'" against the wind. And he stepped off some other gains that were very helpful indeed between playing a bang-up defensive and blocking game.

And Johnny Kitchen came thru like a jillion dollars. I wish I could tell how Meyers sat on Stafford until his leg was hurt.

How Howell sat on Hilliard, how Ben Boswell smashed interference undressing the ball carrier for his fellows; how this guy Townsend played a multi-assignment job and blocking game.

But I would be a fine fellow if I forgot to tell about how this little guy Thier carried on.

There's something inspiring in the way the hunk out there kicks. It goes takes off his hat with the ball still in the air and starts for the bench. He missed one close one in seven tries—or is it six or eight?

And I wish, in opening the featuring, to ask where was Cheesy? He was out there, but to save my life the only times I saw him he was on the ground and somebody was running right thru guard. Cheesy is a great wag. Last year, down at Austin, Johnny Vaughn was playing with injuries enough to keep most guards in a hospital bed. They were run over Johnny and Cheesy kept hollering: "Where's Johnny?"

I think this sorta stuck in the craw of not only our 1932 captain but in the craws of the men who work with him. At any rate, yesterday when the Frogs needed some yardage all they had to do was get a weak-side play and there went the ball carrier right thru Cheesy's hole.

Finally, the terrible Mr. Stafford caught Johnny in a good position and socked a block on the Frog star that hurt everybody in the stands. Vaughn, about to leave his feet to

brought him down on the three-yard line. Texas took time out and drew a five-yard penalty. I imagine Coach Littlefield took a dive. Anyhow, the time out gave the Longhorns a chance to cook up a hot play.

This hot play was a flat zone pass Koy to Stafford. Red Oliver zipped in between the receiver and the ball, grabbed the pass, and started for his goal, a mere little old 95 yards northward. He looked loose for a minute, I still argue he might have made it had he kept on the side-line, but he cut back to let a blocker take Koy out of his way, and was nailed on his 45-yard line just as the gun sounded.

The strategic play may not have been such a bad one after all, for Texas knew they only had time for one play. They hadn't gained three yards on any ground play up to then. It wasn't had strategy to take a five-yard penalty at that.

The second mistake of the Frogs came just at the end of the game. They led, 14 to 0. They failed to gain in a couple of thrusts at the Texas line. It was the spot for a punt on third down, for the wind was in their back and chances for a touchback were good, although the ball was on about their own 30-yard mark. Instead of punting on third down, which amounted to a finish blow to Texas' chances, they ran another play. Then, when Evanson got back to punt, the ball was passed over his head. Wow! He recovered it on the 16-yard line but, being fourth down, it was Texas' ball.

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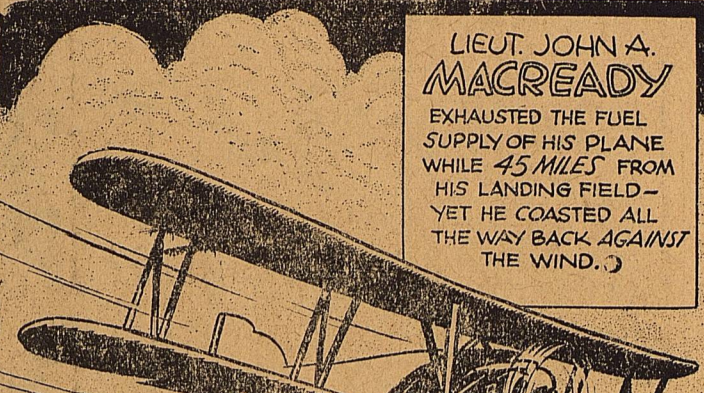
