Bonus Members Get Soft Sentences

WASHINGTON.—Official justice has been satisfied in the matter of the bonus army riots by suspended sentences and probation meted out to three members of the army.

The situation had reached a place considered a national menace when soldiers finally evicted the bonus marchers. Two men had been killed. The White House ordered an investigation. A federal grand jury inquired into the disturbances and finally indicted John Olson, Bernard McCoy and Broadus Falkner—the three men who just recently received the suspended sentences and were placed on probation.

All three served overseas, and each was wounded and gassed. Olson was decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross by General Pershing for extraordinary heroism in rescuing wounded comrades under fire at Cantigny. Faulkner, a negro, is the only one of two for whom the authorities claim to have found any previous police record.

Olson, a tall, rangy man of 45 years, was born in Nebraska, received a suspended sentence of six months for simple assault. He was 28 months overseas with the 16th Infantry, First Division, and has a shrapnel scar on his right leg.

New Social Fad Is "Depression Flower"

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UP)—Governor Gifford Pinchot ardent sportsman, has released his "code for hunters" for thousands of Pennsylvania hunters.

Among his "do's" and "don't's" recommended for better hunting and more friendly feeling with the farmers whose lands are invaded were: "Ask permission to hunt and respect the farmer's rights."
