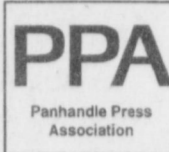

CNN Newsroom: live from Lazbuddie

Junior High and High School students across the nation will soon be learning about Lazbuddie and its six-man football program.

CNN Newsroom, a special program produced for classrooms, spent a few days in Lazbuddie this past week visiting with community members about the uniqueness of their hometown, the school and especially their six-man football program.

Friday morning, local residents met, as they usually do, at Treider Hardware and Supply to shoot the breeze.

"Right now, football is the social event of each week, when its not football, its basketball," said lifelong resident Scott Hicks, explaining about the usual daily conversations around town.

This Friday was a bit different than normal with CNN correspondent Joel Hochmuth from Atlanta joining the group.

As the reporter listened, the locals eagerly explained some of the major

differences between 6-man football and 11-man football.

"It's much faster, more like basketball. The teams swap ends all the time and its a long running and passing game. Also, there's a lot of scoring," said community member Brad Treider.

"In 6-man, the kids have to be pretty versatile. It would be hard to pick out a single person that does the best because the kids have to, and do, play as a team,"

Rangers run over Mules

PERRYTON — Muleshoe couldn't stop Allan Adkison or the big play Friday in a 41-18 District 1-3A loss to Perryton.

Adkison rushed for 242 yards and five touchdowns as the Rangers (5-2) remained at least tied for the district lead at 4-0.

The loss eliminated any real hope the Mules (2-5, 1-3) had of making the playoffs.

Adkison scored three times in the second half when the Rangers broke the game open. The Rangers led 13-3 at half-time.

Adkison scored on a 65-yard run one minute into second half and quarterback Trey Duke and Brian Gilbert hooked up on a 72-yard scoring pass later in the third quarter.

The Rangers finished with 450 yards.

Gilbert Vela broke the 100-yard barrier for the second-straight week, finishing with 113 yards on 19 carries. Matt McClanahan passed for a season-high 173 yards as Muleshoe finished with 308 yards.

Muleshoe took a 3-0 first quarter lead on Ryan Hodge's 27-yard field goal.

In the second half, Vela scored on a 16-yard run and McClanahan scored from two yards out.

does," said hospital administrator Jim Bone.

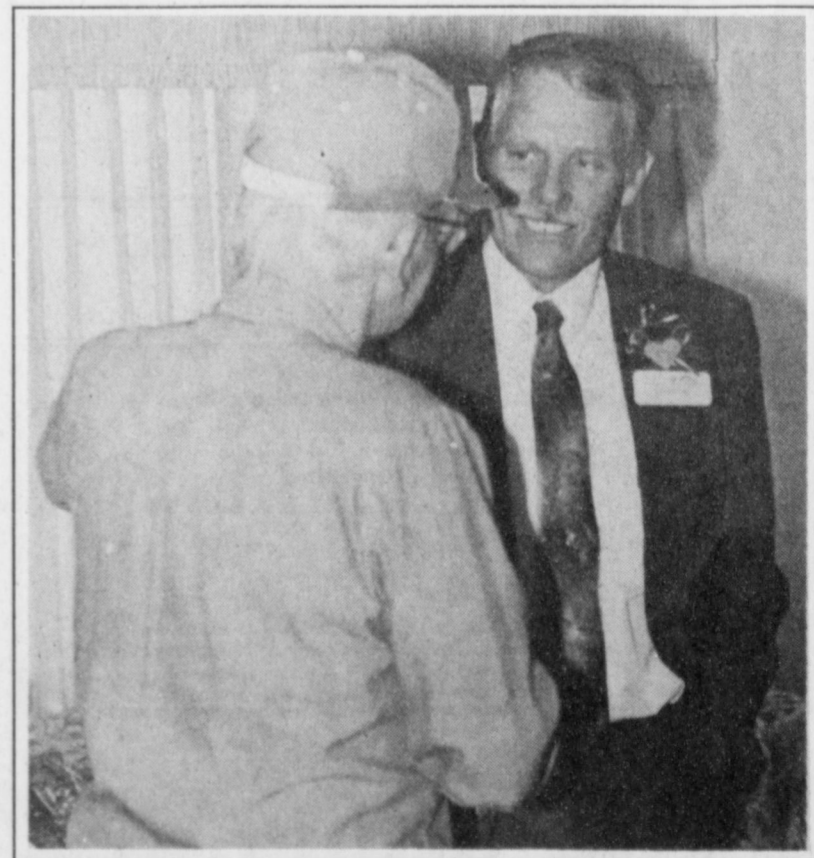
In recognition of Clergy Appreciation Week, the nursing home surprised the minister by declaring Thursday "Bless David McIntire Day."

Rachel Rodriguez is the daughter of Biolanda and Bernardo Rodriguez.

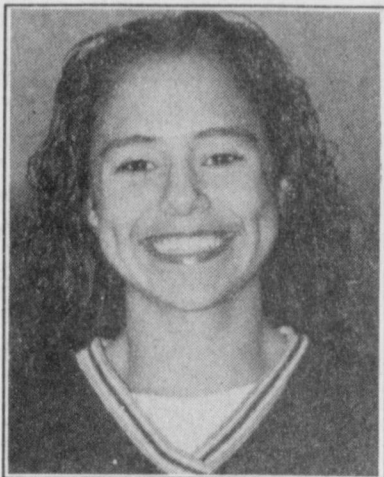
She is involved in basketball, cross country, track, band, choir and FHA. Honors she has received include National Honor Society, all-region band and fourth in Regionals in FHA.

She is involved in the Technology Student Association, choir, golf and UIL. Honors she has received include National Honor Society, first in



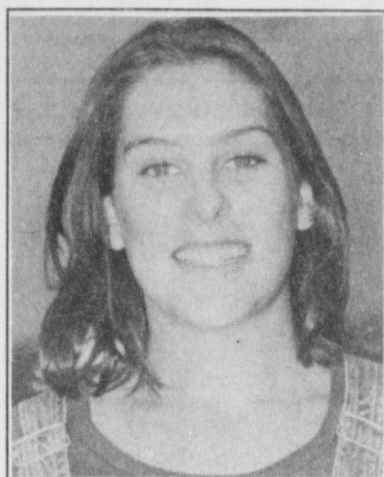

The Bailey County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, Oct. 13 at the Bailey County Courthouse.

The court accepted a bid for courthouse lawn maintenance from Shafer Nursery of Muleshoe. Shafer currently supplies the lawn care, but sealed bids were requested in order to ensure that the county was paying the lowest possible fee.

County Judge Marilyn Cox was authorized by the board to advertise for bids on a new 1997 or 1998 car for the Sheriff's Department.

According to Sheriff Jerry Hicks, the new car will replace one of the car's currently being used that has close to 100,000 miles.

Hicks said that replacing the car now is good management and will prevent costly problems that could arise in the future due to high mileage and aging of the vehicle.

The Commissioners approved a bond on new Deputy County Clerk Jana Leal who started Sept. 22.

Also Monday, the board appointed Mary Nell Bleeker as Alternate Election Judge for voting box 1. She will replace Clara Harbin, who resigned due to health concerns.

Bleeker will be responsible for assisting during elections, and to act as election judge if for any reason the person that holds that position can not fulfill their duties.

'Horns defense spurs 50-21 win

LAZBUDDIE — A matchup of the two of the area's top offenses came down to defense.

Josh Morris passed for 257 yards and four touchdowns and Lazbuddie played smothering defense, leading the Longhorns to a 50-21 win against Silverton Friday in a key District 3-1A six-man game.

Lazbuddie (6-1 overall, 2-0 in district) held the high-flying Owls (5-2, 1-1) to 242 yards, nearly 150 yards below its season average.

"This is a big win because it puts us in the driver's seat," Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson said. "That's the best defense we've played all year."

Lazbuddie did play well despite the distraction of having national network CNN in town the last two days taping a documentary on six-man football.

Led by Adam St. Clair and Jeffrey Seaton, the Longhorns added 198 yards rushing and finished right at its season average with 458 yards of total offense.

St. Clair rushed for 70 yards

on 13 carries and caught a 22-yard touchdown pass that gave the Longhorns a 28-15 halftime lead. Seaton rushed for 65 yards on four carries, including a 52-yard touchdown burst three minutes into the fourth quarter that sealed the win.

Morris completed 18 of 24 passes, spreading the ball around to eight different receivers.

First-year Silverton coach Larry Mantle, the younger brother of New York Yankee legend Mickey Mantle, came away impressed with the Longhorns.

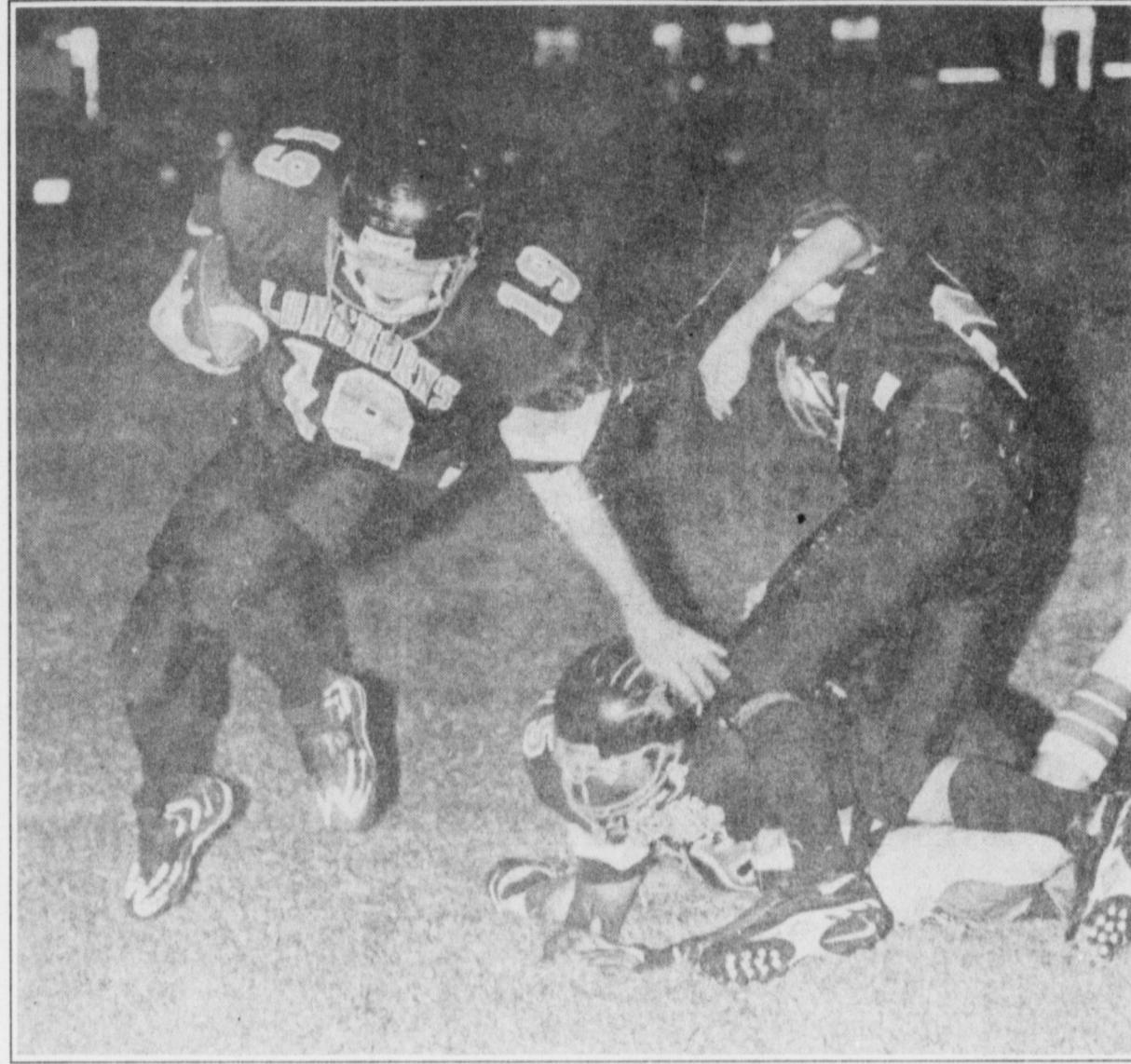
"I told the kids after the game: 'it ain't anything you did wrong, they just kicked our butts,'" Mantle said in the translated PG version. "Give them the credit."

Lazbuddie was determined to pressure Owl quarterback Jack Cherry and succeeded.

Blas Martinez had three sacks in the first half.

Longhorn defensive coordinator Carey Sudduth felt the key was grounding the Owls early.

"We felt like if we could

stop them (from scoring) four times, we could beat them," Sudduth said. "We didn't think they could stop us four times. Then we came out and stopped them the first two times they had the ball."

Down by 13, the Owls took the second half kickoff and marched 52 yards and scored to cut the Longhorns' lead to 28-21.

But Lazbuddie responded with a scoring drive of their

John Denver latest entertainer to die in plane crash

John Denver has unfortunately joined a prestigious list of prominent entertainers that have been killed in plane crashes.

Last Sunday, Denver, who sold millions of records in the 1970s including "Rocky Mountain High" and "Thank God I'm A Country Boy" was piloting a single engine, fiberglass, two-seat plane when it crashed off the coast of California near Monterey.

A list of other entertainers killed in plane crashes taken from an Associated Press story include:

Aug. 15, 1935: Will Rogers, cowboy humorist and star of vaudeville and film, dies in plane crash near Point Barrow, Alaska.

Jan. 16, 1942: Carole Lombard, actress in such comedies as "Nothing Sacred," is killed in plane crash near Las Vegas while on a tour to sell war bonds. She was 33.

Dec. 15, 1944: A plane carrying Glenn Miller, trombonist and leader of a hugely popular dance band, known for such hits as "Moonlight Serenade" and "In the Mood," disappears on flight from England and Paris while Miller is serving in the Army entertaining troops. He was 40.

Feb. 3, 1959: A plane carrying singers Buddy Holly, J.P. "The Big Booper" Richardson and Ritchie Valens crashes near Mason City, Iowa en route to a show in Fargo, N.D. Holly, the pioneering rocker whose hits included "Peggy Sue," was 22. Richardson, whose big hit was "Chantilly Lace," was 29. Valens, famous for such songs as "La Bamba" and "Donna" was 18.

March 5, 1963: Patsy Cline, whose country hits include "Crazy" and "She's Got You," dies in a plane crash near Camden, Tenn., at age 31. Also killed were Grand Ole Opry stars Cowboy Copas and Hawkshaw Hawkins.

Dec. 10, 1967: Soul singer Otis Redding dies in a plane crash in Wisconsin, along with members of his band, the Bar-Kays. He was 26. His greatest hit, the somber ballad "Sittin' on the Dock of the Bay," is released after his death.

May 30, 1971: Audie Murphy, a World War II hero turned film actor in the late '40s (mostly in Westerns and war movies), is killed along with five others in small plane crash in Carroll County, VA. He was 46.

Sept. 20, 1973: Jim Croce dies in an air crash near Natchitoches, La., at age 30. He had put together a string of rock hits, such as poignant "Time in a Bottle" and the witty "Bad, Bad

Leroy Brown."

Oct. 21, 1977: Lead singer Ronnie Van Zant and guitarist Steve Gaines of the Lynyrd Skynyrd band, which carved a niche in the rock world with its image as hard-working, hell-raising Southerners, are killed in a plane crash in McComb, Miss.

Aug. 27, 1990: Blues guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughn, 35, is killed when a helicopter crashes into a hill in East Troy, Wis. after departing from a concert. Vaughn, a Grammy winner, had a platinum album with his band, Double Trouble, in "Couldn't Stand the Weather," released in 1984.

March 16, 1991: Seven members of singer Reba McEntire's band are among 10 people killed in crash near San Diego.

John Denver latest entertainer to die in plane crash

John Denver has unfortunately joined a prestigious list of prominent entertainers that have been killed in plane crashes.

Last Sunday, Denver, who sold millions of records in the 1970s including "Rocky Mountain High" and "Thank God I'm A Country Boy" was piloting a single engine, fiberglass, two-seat plane when it crashed off the coast of California near Monterey.

A list of other entertainers killed in plane crashes taken from an Associated Press story include:

- Aug. 15, 1935: Will Rogers, cowboy humorist and star of vaudeville and film, dies in plane crash near Point Barrow, Alaska.
- Jan. 16, 1942: Carole Lombard, actress in such comedies as "Nothing Sacred," is killed in plane crash near Las Vegas while on a tour to sell war bonds. She was 33.
- Dec. 15, 1944: A plane carrying Glenn Miller, trombonist and leader of a hugely popular dance band, known for such hits as "Moonlight Serenade" and "In the Mood," disappears on flight from England and Paris while Miller is serving in the Army entertaining troops. He was 40.

- Feb. 3, 1959: A plane carrying singers Buddy Holly, J.P. "The Big Booper" Richardson and Ritchie Valens crashes near Mason City, Iowa en route to a show in Fargo, N.D. Holly, the pioneering rocker whose hits included "Peggy Sue," was 22. Richardson, whose big hit was "Chantilly Lace," was 29. Valens, famous for such songs as "La Bamba" and "Donna" was 18.
- March 5, 1963: Patsy Cline, whose country hits include "Crazy" and "She's Got You," dies in a plane crash near Camden, Tenn., at age 31. Also killed were Grand Ole Opry stars Cowboy Copas and Hawkshaw Hawkins.
- Dec. 10, 1967: Soul singer Otis Redding dies in a plane crash in Wisconsin, along with members of his band, the Bar-Kays. He was 26. His greatest hit, the somber ballad "Sittin' on the Dock of the Bay," is released after his death.
- May 30, 1971: Audie Murphy, a World War II hero turned film actor in the late '40s (mostly in Westerns and war movies), is killed along with five others in small plane crash in Carroll County, VA. He was 46.
- Sept. 20, 1973: Jim Croce dies in an air crash near Natchitoches, La., at age 30. He had put together a string of rock hits, such as poignant "Time in a Bottle" and the witty "Bad, Bad

- 40. Leroy Brown."
- Oct. 21, 1977: Lead singer Ronnie Van Zant and guitarist Steve Gaines of the Lynyrd Skynyrd band, which carved a niche in the rock world with its image as hard-working, hell-raising Southerners, are killed in a plane crash in McComb, Miss.
- Aug. 27, 1990: Blues guitarist Stevie Ray Vaughn, 35, is killed when a helicopter crashes into a hill in East Troy, Wis. after departing from a concert. Vaughn, a Grammy winner, had a platinum album with his band, Double Trouble, in "Couldn't Stand the Weather," released in 1984.
- March 16, 1991: Seven members of singer Reba McEntire's band are among 10 people killed in crash near San Diego.

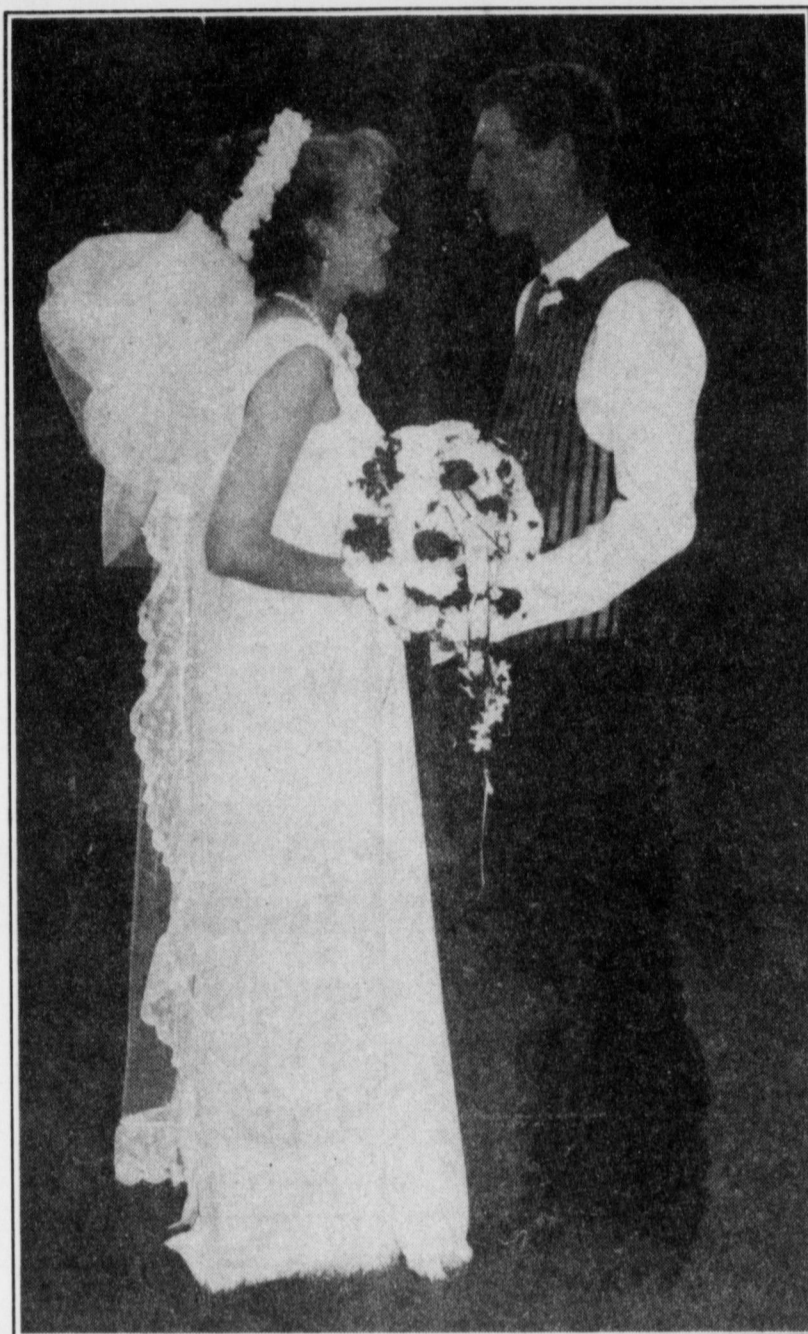

Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District

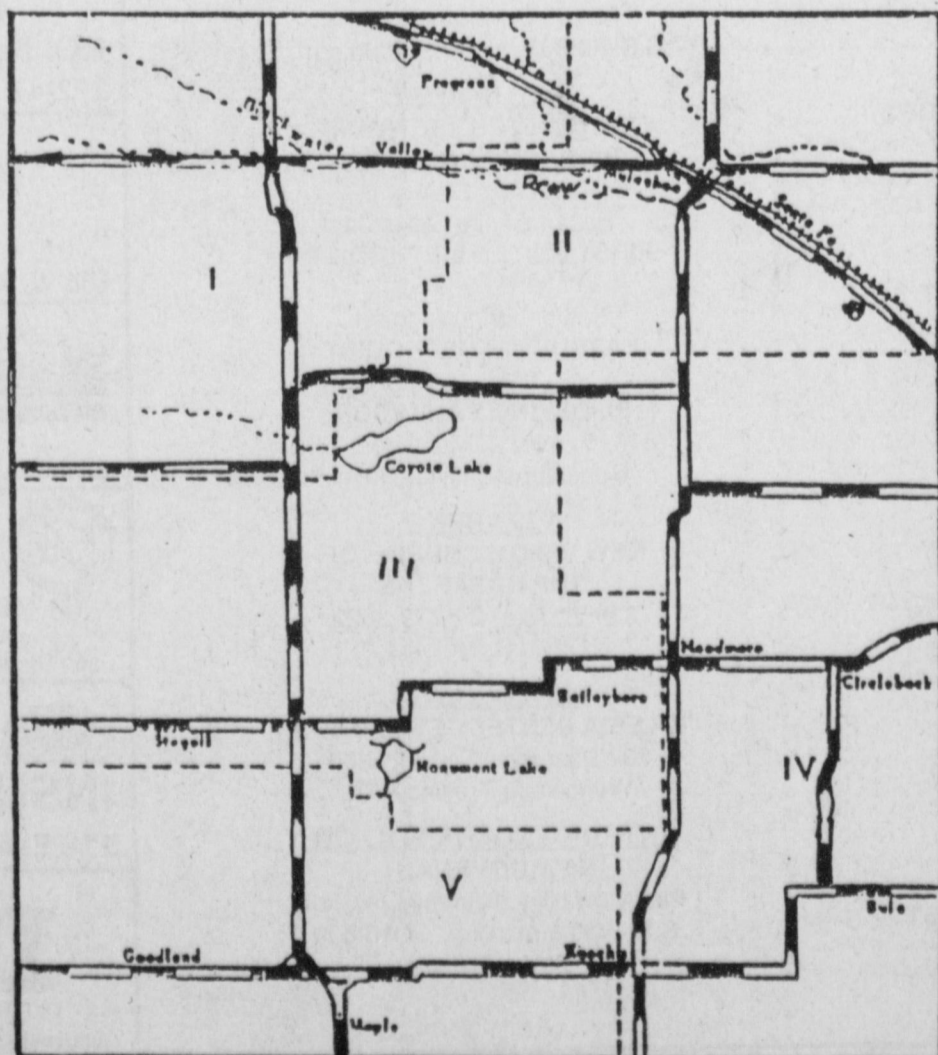
ANNUAL REPORT 1996-1997

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has completed their 56th year in Bailey County. E.L. Smith and N.C. Moore, County Directors at that time, submitted a petition requesting that a District be formed and approved by the State of Texas. On March 20th, 1941, the Secretary of State for the State of Texas certified the formation of Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District. It was number 111 and included all of Bailey County. As a legal sub-division of State Government, they requested the assistance for the District. The Soil Conservation Service is now renamed Natural Resources Conservation Service, but still provides the technical assistance on soil and water erosion problems. Today, there are over 200 Districts state wide working toward the same goal of wise use of all natural resources. Assistance is voluntary and private property rights are strictly observed.

The Blackwater Valley SWCD is divided into 5 zones with each zone having a director. Each zone director must own land within the zone served and serves a four year term. The director's attend monthly meetings at the NRCS office in Muleshoe. These meetings are open to the public.

Present directors are: Ernest Ramm, Zone 1, Nick Bamert, Zone 2, Sharon Dale, Zone 3, Larry Clawson, Zone 4, and Johnny Furgeson, Zone 5.

The District provides services to all individuals without regard to: race, color, creed, sex, national origin and complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

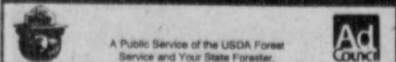
