COTTON BREAKS \$1 ON BALE AS **OUTPUT HIKED**

12,727,000 Bales in New Estimate of Government

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8. (UP)—
The department of agriculture estimated today the year's cotton crop at 12,727,000 bales.
This was 780,000 bales more than the November estimate. The increase was attributed partly to better yields per acre being realized in all states.

Texas production was estimated at 4,445,000 bales.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8. (UP)—Cotton prices broke \$1.00 per bale today after the department of agriculture estimate was issued. Traders rushed to sell, December futures dropping to \$5.38.

Less than 1,000 bales of cotton remain to be ginned in Midland county, it was said today along with reports Midland's three gins have turned out 8,218 bales to date.




