Officers Sieze 250-Gal. Still

SWEETWATER.—One of the largest stills ever seized in this section, with a capacity of 250 gallons daily, is in the hands of the sheriff's department, as is 65 gallons of corn liquor and about 1,700 gallons of mash, while three persons, one of them slightly wounded, are under arrest as a result of a liquor raid by Sheriff Jess Lambert and his deputies on a ranch about 12 miles southwest of town, in the Lake Trammell section.

One of the men under arrest, who gave his name as Oral Whitefield, is suffering from shotgun wounds in both legs, officers said, as a result of his resisting arrest. When he started running officers said they commanded him to halt. When he ignored the command officers directed a volley of shot at his legs. The injury, while not serious, was enough to stop him.

The raid on the still was made Friday afternoon by Sheriff Lambert and Deputies J. A. Bland, Rip Daniels and Oran Taylor.

Two were arrested in the afternoon, including Oral Whitefield, who resisted arrest. The other gave his name as J. E. Anderson.

Policeman Bland and Deputy, Taylor remained on guard during the night and at about 9 o'clock, they said, a person giving his name as Jake Whitefield drove up in a car loaded with supplies said to be used in the manufactur of intoxic cating liquor. He was arrested and held there until Saturday morning, when he was brought to town.

Taylor Reports Times Are Better

FORT WORTH. (UP)—With cash from cotton, grain and turkey crops West Texas today was putting its financial house in order.

From Panhandle to Rio Grande were signs of awakening industry, new credits, a new stability.

Nearly 60 per cent of West Texas' cotton crop has been marketed, reported O. L. Taylor of the West Texas chamber of commerce, after a tour over the area. Over half of the region's turkey crop moved to Thanksgiving markets, and the remainder is being shipped for the Christmas season.

West Texas produced 1,720,000

West Texas produced 1,720,000 bales of cotton, or 30 per cent of the entire state crop and 10 per cent of the national yield, last year. At an average price of 4½ cents, the crop meant \$38,500,000 in cash returns

Despite the vagaries of the cotton market, this year's crop is selling for more than anticipated when the farmers planted last spring. Ranges are covered with grass and barn lofts are filled with feed for vast herds of cottle. The regional credit porporation has extended nearly a half-million dollars to innance cattle holding, with \$1,000,000 ready if needed.

Increased freight car loading during the fall, particularly in commodities, indicate industrial activity and purchasing power.

Increased power consumption also testifies to increased movement of industrys wheels.

WRONG DIAGNOSIS?

The place of the old familiar "family doctor" in the general scheme of things would seem, off-hand, to be almost beyond the reach of change. But the final report of the Committee on the Costs of Medical Care, recently submitted, makes suggestions which might eventually replace the family doctor with something like the "family health and disease prevention center"—if you can swal-

low so cumbersome a title.

Surveying the whole field of medicine in the United

States, the committee recommends that medical service be

furnished largely by furnished largely by organized groups of physicians, dentists and nurses, set up around a hospital or clinic. Costs should be placed on a group basis, with tax funds used where necessary. Public health service should be extended, and the medical profession should devote increased attention to the prevention of disease.

In all of this, obviously, there is something very like an approach to state medicine; and it is a little bit hard one: to see just what place would be left for the old-style general practitioner, who knows the names, case histories, dispositions and family skeletons of his patients and who is to them a sort of combination of healer and old family friend.

Indeed, the American Medical Association has already criticized the plan as an approach to socialized medicine. Spokesman for the association have said that the proposal would "substitute mass production for private practice," to the harm of doctor and patient alike.

Back of it all, of course, there lies a fundamental cconomic problem. Many, many people cannot afford the medical care they need; at the same time many, many before his alarm clock goes off, he physicians are not making a living wage. This report seeks feels like he has captured a trench. to find a way out of these difficulties.

But it is just possible that the real cure lies deeper than a mere reorganization of the medical profession. The wage-earner's inability to pay for the care he needs, and the doctor's inability to get the income he deservesaren't these a part of a larger problem whose solution depends on a restoration of economic health to the whole community?

In the long run, what we need to aim at is a restoration of prosperity on a broader and firmer base than we have ever had it before.

Stanley Baldwin is quoted as declaring that what the world suffers from is a sense of fear. And love is the unfailing remedy, he might have added.
