SIX HUNDRED HEAR CONCERT SUNDAY NIGHT

"Star Divine," Great Xmas Cantata Is Presented

More than 600 persons, in addition to 90 in the choir and twelve in the orchestra, attended the community concert, "The Star Divine," at the First Baptist church auditorium Sunday night.

Officers Szeze 250-Gal. Still

SWEETWATER—One of the largest stills ever seized in this section, with a capacity of 250 gallons daily, is in the hands of the sheriff's department, as is 65 gallons of corn liquor and about 1,700 gallons of mash, while three persons, one of them slightly wounded, are under arrest as a result of the liquor raid by Sheriff Jess Lambert and his deputies on a ranch about 12 miles southwest of town, in the Lake Trammell section.

One of the men under arrest, who gave his name as Oral Whitefield, is suffering from shotgun wounds in both legs, officers said, as a result of his resisting arrest. When he started running officers said they commanded him to halt. When he ignored the command of officers directed a volley of shot at his legs. The injury, while not serious, was enough to stop him.

The still had not been on the place but a short time, possibly no longer than 10 days, it was estimated. A capacity of at least 250 gallons a day could be run off with the equipment, it was estimated.

The 65 gallons of whiskey seized was in half gallon containers, and is being saved in the court house vault as evidence. Officers described the whiskey as being "rotten corn."

A large crowd was attracted to the court house Saturday afternoon as the still arrived aboard a large truck, all of the equipment being more than a truck load.

The raid on the still was made Friday afternoon by Sheriff Lambert and Deputies A. E. Bland, Rip Daniels and Oran Taylor.

Two were arrested in the afternoon, including Oral Whitefield, who resisted arrest. The other gave his name as J. E. Anderson.

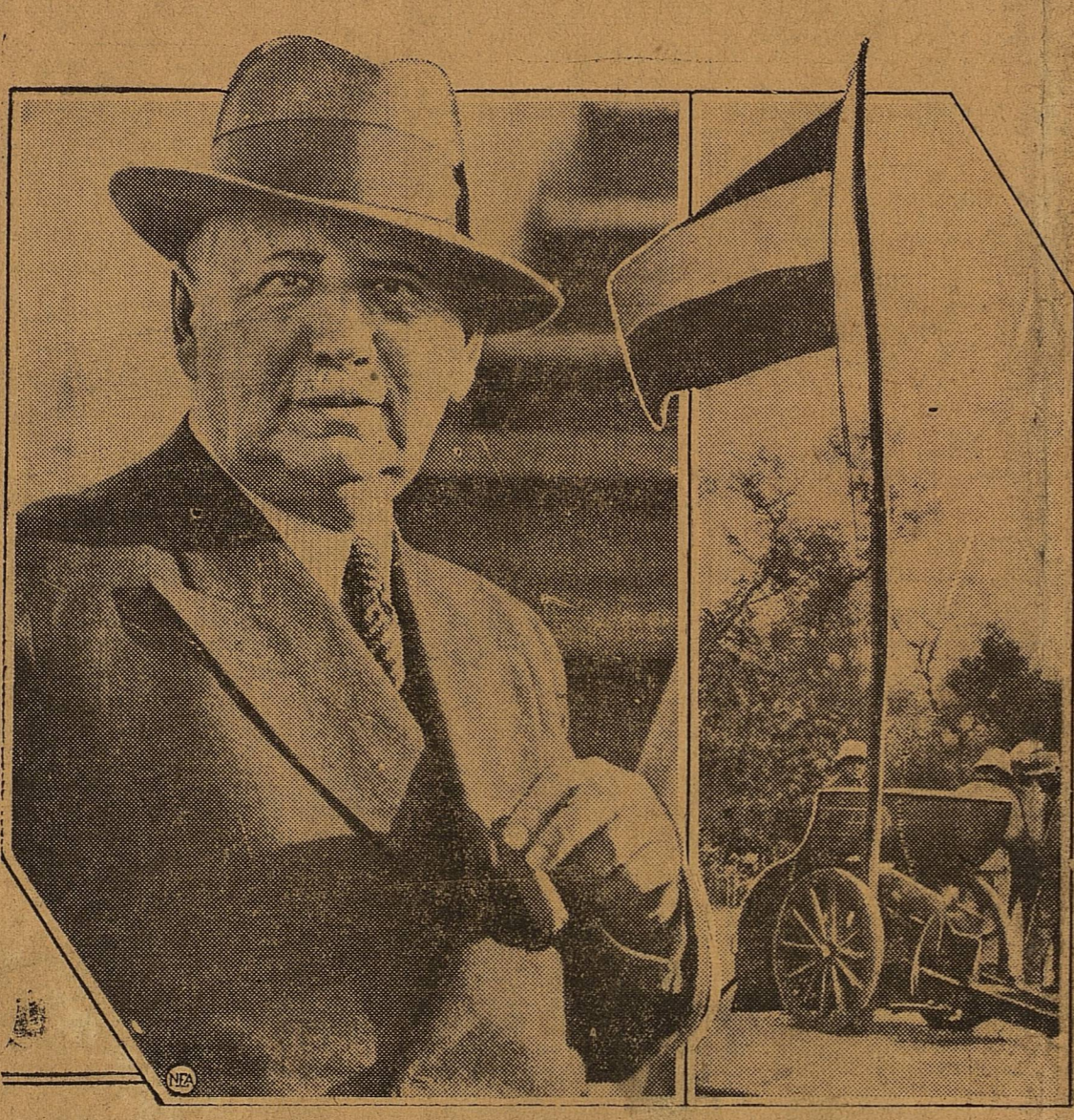
Policeman Bland and Deputy Taylor remained on guard during the night and at about 9 o'clock, they said, a person giving his name as Jake Whitefield drove up in a car loaded with supplies said to be used in the manufacture of intoxicating liquor. He was arrested and held there until Saturday morning, when he was brought to town.

Two charges of manufacture and possession of intoxicating liquor have been filed against each of the trio, and it was indicated Saturday afternoon that their examining trial would be held today.

Bitter New Battle Looms in Gran Chaco

The bitter, undeclared war that has been raging for six months between Bolivia and Paraguay is approaching a climax. Arrival of General Hans Kundt, at La Paz, Bolivian capital, to take charge of their campaign in the Gran Chaco, may well mean a break in the stalemate where the two armies die glaring at each other before Fort Saavedra across no-man's land strewn with dead.

Peace machinery also has been speeded up as the climax approaches, and the Bolivian foreign office has at last agreed to send a military mission into the Chaco to try to settle the long-standing feud. This move comes as a result of action by the commission of neutrals (of which the United States is one). The league of nations has also applied to both belligerents to stop fighting.

Already, according to the best estimates available, the war has cost at least 5000 casualties in dead, wounded and missing, more than the Battle of Bull Run. The armies have steadily grown until there are on the actual firing line some 20,000 troops, almost a war-time American division. Heavy artillery, fighting planes, and the most modern post-World war equipment is being brought into play.

General Kundt has apparently brought new life to the German-trained Bolivians, as he really created their army when he went to Bolivia 12 years ago.

General Kundt was a German major-general, aide to the brilliant Meckensen. After the war, like a lot of professional German military men, he found himself out of a job. In 1920 he got a job drilling Bolivian's army, made good at it, and became one of Bolivia's big men.

When President Siles was deposed by a revolution in 1930, the German hurriedly left the country. But from Berlin, South America called him back, and from Rio de Janeiro he was heard announcing a grandiose scheme to bring a million German immigrants to the Amazon valley.

WRONG DIAGNOSIS?

The place of the old familiar "family doctor" in the general scheme of things would seem, off-hand, to be almost beyond the reach of change. But the final report of the Committee on the Costs of Medical Care, recently submitted, makes suggestions which might eventually replace the family doctor with something like the "family health and disease prevention center"—if you can swallow so cumbersome a title.

Surveying the whole field of medicine in the United States, the committee recommends that medical service be furnished largely by organized groups of physicians, dentists and nurses, set up around a hospital or clinic. Costs should be placed on a group basis, with tax funds used where necessary. Public health service should be extended, and the medical profession should devote increased attention to the prevention of disease.

In all of this, obviously, there is something very like an approach to state medicine; and it is a little bit hard to see just what place would be left for the old-style general practitioner, who knows the names, case histories, dispositions and family skeletons of his patients and who is to them a sort of combination of healer and old family friend.

Indeed, the American Medical Association has already criticized the plan as an approach to socialized medicine. Spokesman for the association have said that the proposal would "substitute mass production for private practice," to the harm of doctor and patient alike.

Back of it all, of course, there lies a fundamental economic problem. Many, many people cannot afford the medical care they need; at the same time many, many physicians are not making a living wage. This report seeks to find a way out of these difficulties.

But it is just possible that the real cure lies deeper than a mere reorganization of the medical profession. The wage-earner's inability to pay for the care he needs, and the doctor's inability to get the income he deserves—aren't these a part of a larger problem whose solution depends on a restoration of economic health to the whole community?

In the long run, what we need to aim at is a restoration of prosperity on a broader and firmer base than we have ever had it before.

Stanley Baldwin is quoted as declaring that what the world suffers from is a sense of fear. And love is the un-failing remedy, he might have added.
