









### Fear of Ghosts Is Felt in Rooms of League of Nations

PARIS, (U.P.)—The United States and France share feminine aviation honors for 1933.

Amelia Earhart still is queen of the air, holding first place in the records of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

Worthy rival of the American flyer is Maryse Hilsz, "Earhart of France," who holds the women's world altitude mark.

Fastest woman in the sky is Mrs. May Haislip. Most renowned at present, though, not holder of exceptional records, is perhaps Mrs. Amy Mollison.

The records as they stand at the end of 1933 are:

Straightline distance: Earhart, Los Angeles-New York, Aug. 24-25, 1932.

Altitude: Hilsz, Villacoublay, Aug. 19, 1932.

Speed (over closed circuit): Haislip, Cleveland, Sept. 5, 1932.

Speed (over 100 km.): Earhart, Detroit, June 25, 1930.

Less spectacular, but equally important from the view point of aviation and certainly no less difficult for the pilots are the two records for light planes—distance and altitude—which are classified by the F. A. I. Both are held by Frenchwomen.

One June 28, to 30, 1931, Maryse Bostie from the Midi performed the unusual feat of flying 2,796,910 kilometers from Le Bourget to Urino, Russia, in a light plane. No other woman has equalled this performance.

Helene Boucher, not yet 20, but one of the world's best acrobatic women flyers, rose from Orly airport to an altitude of 5,900 meters in a light Mauboussin-Peyret plane Aug. 2.

One more feminine record listed by the F. A. I., that for high flying seaplanes, is held by Mrs. Marion Eddy Conrad, who on Oct. 30, 1930, reached 4,103 meters at Port Washington, L. I.

### Under the Dome Of the Capital

Data gathered by the Relief Commission shows that 58.3 of the approved project for men's relief work are road building ones. They led all others in the swing of relief work from a dole to a job basis.

Repairs to the state capitol, now planned as a public works relief measure, will make up for neglect to care for the building as its architect's advice. A computation shows that less than one tenth of the amount estimated to be necessary for upkeep has been expended upon it since its dedication in 1888.

At that time it was the seventh largest building in the world—its 311 foot dome and its south entrance arch are its main architectural features. The dome is higher than that of the national capitol. The arch is the masonry arch standing. It had no cost in dollars and cents. But the 3,000,000 acres of land deeded in exchange for it today probably are worth \$30,000,000. At one time the estimate was double that.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson warned Ed Husson that she would bring rain to the opening of Epsom Downs race track. When the invitation to attend was extended by Husson, she said:

"Every time I go to Houston, it rains."

With a gallantry equal to Sir Walter Raleigh, Husson replied: "I think a little rain would improve the track."

It didn't rain, although there was a two minute sprinkle.

The strange parallel between the political lives of former Governor Dan Moody and Attorney General James V. Alfred continues. Both struggled on their own to get law educations. Both were picked by Gov. Pat M. Neff for their appointments as prosecutors in their home districts. Both later were in position to return the favor and both did it. Moody appointed Neff to the State Railroad Commission. Alfred has appointed Pat M. Neff, Jr., an assistant attorney general.

"We didn't expect to see you come back alive," members of the Texas Relief Commission jocularly told R. L. Holliday of El Paso, whom they designated to harmonize conflicting factions in Hidalgo county. "It's hopeless," he admitted.

Mrs. Ouida Ferguson Nalle, daughter of Governor Ferguson, represented the Governor at the annual University of Texas-A. & M. College game at Kyle field, Thanksgiving day.

**MONTREAL WOMEN TO VOTE**

MONTREAL, (U.P.)—For the first time in the history of the city, women will vote in the next Montreal civic elections. After years of persistent petitioning and argument, the Quebec legislature last year granted married women, who are separated from their husbands as to property and who have the necessary property qualifications, or conduct businesses on which they pay taxes, a voice in the choice of the city administration. Several thousand women are planning to exercise their newly-won right at the polls in April, 1934.

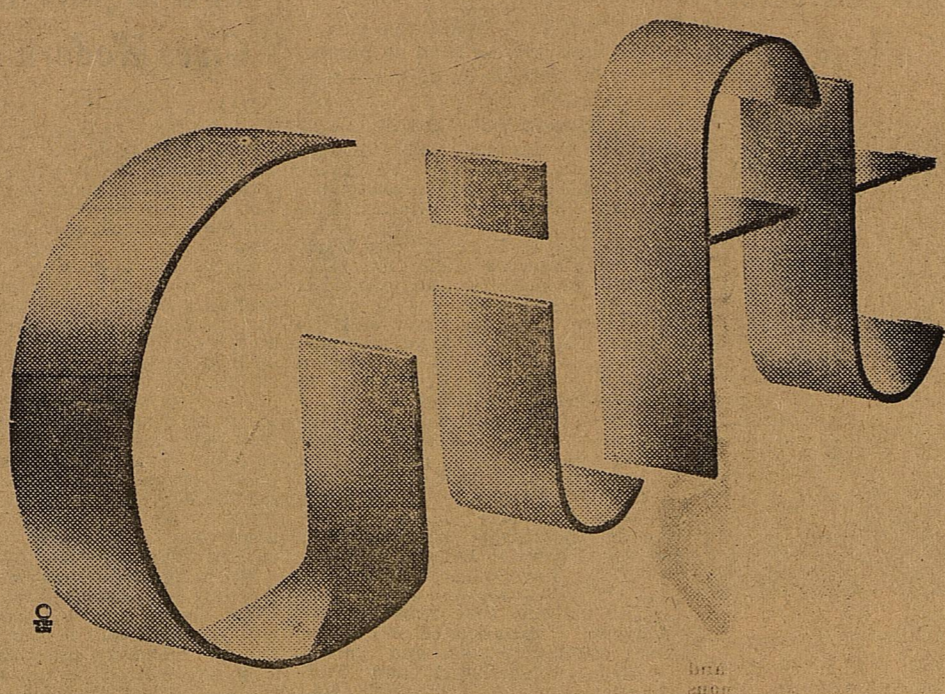
**GIRLS TO ENTER ARMY**

**Hitler Plans Goggle Water for the Masses**

BERLIN. (UP)—"Champagne for the masses" is the thought behind a new law just approved by Adolf Hitler's Cabinet, abolishing the tax on sparkling wines.

Hitherto there has been a tax of 24 cents on every bottle of champagne sold within Germany, whether made within the country or imported. The tax was the same for all qualities. In cabarets and night clubs, it was exacted over and above the regular 10 per cent tax on all beverages. This had led to the classification of champagne as a luxury, it was announced, but against this viewpoint placed the argument that more jobs can be created if consumption of champagne is increased. The industry expects to hire 4,000 additional workers based on increased consumption stimulated by the tax repeal.

The value of the pantries were \$98.90 and \$70.16 and \$70.00 respectively. Plum pudding, whole grain wheat, sandwich spread, candied products and pie molds, in various combinations added to the variety. The following recipe was used by Mrs. R. T. Kingfield in making plum pudding:

English Plum Pudding 3 cups flour 1 tsp. salt 1-2 tsp. all spice 1-2 tsp. cinnamon 1-2 tsp. nutmeg 2 cups stale bread crumbs 2 cups seeded raisins 2 eggs grated rind of one lemon 1 cup currants 2 cups brown sugar 1-2 cup chopped figs 1 cup shredded candied grapefruit peel, citron, orange and lemon mixed 2 cups chopped beef suet 1 cup grape juice or sweet pickle syrup.

Sh: together the flour, salt and spices, add the bread crumbs, the raisins, cut in halves, the currants, sugar and suet very finely chopped, the shredded candied peel, the figs and lemon rind, mix thoroughly, then moisten with well beaten eggs and grape juice. Turn into well oiled molds or tin cans. Steaming in molds: Line with oiled butter paper. Fill 2-3 full, cover with brown heavy paper, oiled. Fasten on tightly. Decorate with candied fruits. Steam 1-1 1/4 hours with pitococo slightly open. Seal.

Agent Hostess To 55 Saturday

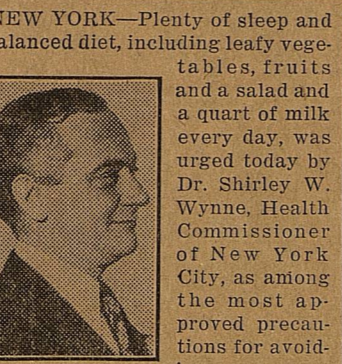

Ten Commandments Given For Avoiding Winter Colds

NEW YORK—Plenty of sleep and a balanced diet, including leafy vegetables, fruits and a salad and a quart of milk every day, was urged today by Dr. Shirley W. Wynne, Health Commissioner of New York City, as among the most approved precautions for avoiding common winter colds. He called his list "keeps for keeping clear from colds," and declared if everyone would follow a few simple rules, less suffering from colds would result, as well as fewer cases of pneumonia and influenza, and fewer deaths from those diseases. Prompted by increases in pneumonia cases and deaths and in influenza cases in the last few weeks as compared with the same period last year Dr. Wynne made public a "code" for the avoidance of colds.

- 1. Keep fit through the balanced diet; include leafy vegetables, fruits and a salad; drink a quart of milk every day. 2. Keep far away from persons who have colds. 3. Keep your mouth shut; breathe through your nose. 4. Keep good hours; sleep eight or ten every night. 5. Keep clean; take a bath every day. 6. Keep comfortable; dress according to the weather. 7. Keep the house and your office at a temperature of between 68 and 70 degrees. 8. Keep the body exercised; walking in the open is the best form of exercise. Walk briskly, your head erect, swing arms and breathe through your nose. 9. Keep away from patent medicines and nostrums; if you have a cold get to bed promptly and call the family doctor at once. 10. Keep the house well aired; windows in every room should be opened for a time each day, and all night in sleeping chambers.

Chinese Linens To Be Sold Here

Those who admired the recent display of handmade Chinese jewelry at the library will have the opportunity of seeing a collection of hand made and woven linens from the same source. Mrs. Preston, Chinese missionary, sent them to Mrs. L. G. Lewis who will have them on display and for sale the week at her home, 714 West Kansas.

Mrs. Preston's note of explanation said "The linens are made from hemp woven in Hunan province and spun in the homes. We buy bolts of the grass cloth and the women come to the mission for the material. It is given them along with foreign thread and they make it up in their homes. There is nothing finer made. We follow up these women with the Bible teachers, nurses, teachers, etc., and thus we reach their poor homes with the Gospel. We have built a girls' school and changed many lives and communities through the years. Mr. Preston was in China thirty-six years and has a sister there now. He is a native Texan and we have always felt that Texas was the place for us to sell some of these linens. I hope your people enjoy seeing them, as I am sending you some of my finest linens."

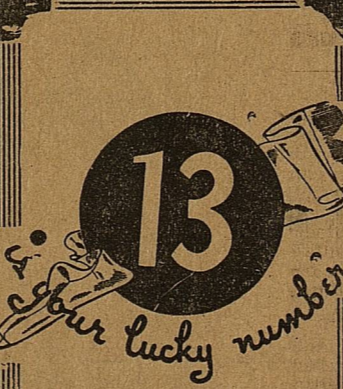
Repeal Saves Stave Mill Business in Ozark Hills

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (UP)—The stave mill industry, which sprang up in the Ozarks with legalization of beer, is proving more flexible than the stout white oak product it turns out. Overproduction of beer barrel staves was threatened in recent months, but repeal of the 18th Amendment stepped in to save the situation. Today, the demand for staves exceeds the supply.

Beer barrel staves are made thick at the ends, to stand heavy handling, and thin in the middle, so they will bend considerably. They are turned out on a stave dressing or planing machine. Whisky barrel staves, however, are sawed out on cylinder saws. They are of uniform thickness, since they do not travel from consumer to consumer like beer barrels. O' Kill No More; Huntsmen Mourn KOUNTZE (UP)—Deer hunters in the big thicket country of East Texas wander aimlessly through unfamiliar tracts this season for O' Kill isn't there to guide them. O' Kill, who was John Williams negro, went on his last hunt a year ago. He died a week before last Christmas and sportsmen throughout the state mourned the old negro's passing. He was known as the best deer driver in the B.E. Thicket.

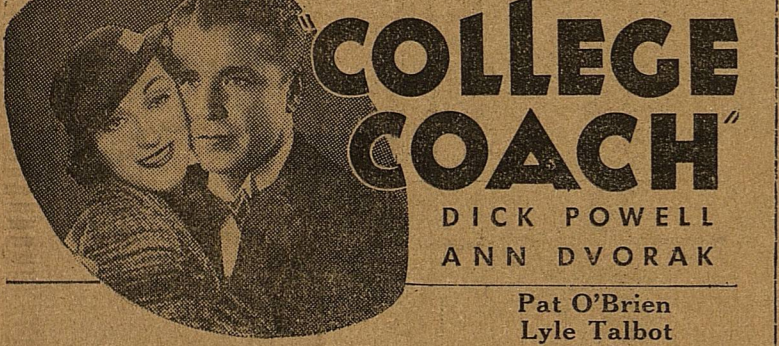

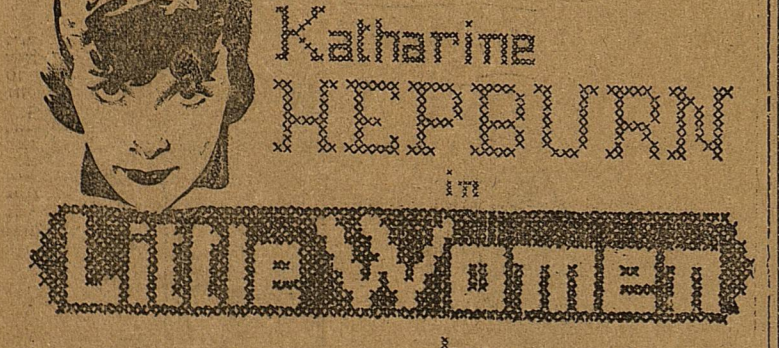
