Why do white-collar workers get fired from their jobs? Right now, of course, the general depression is the big reason.

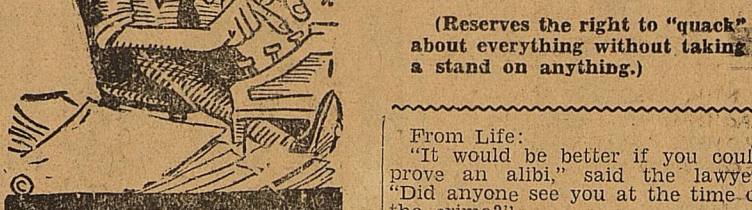
But in more ordinary times a worker can usually expect to keep his job as long as he is competent and faithful; and a recently-issued Boston University bulletin analyzing the turnover in white-collar workers contains some interesting findings.

The bulletin is based on a study of 76 business concerns which normally employ about 50,000 clerical workers, and which have to release about 4000 of them every year. It finds that nearly 90 per cent of these men are let go because they lack the proper character traits; that is, they are lazy, or dishonest, or inattentive, or disloyal, or lacking in force and ambition.

"Mourning Becomes Electra" by O'Neill

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following review was prepared by Miss Leona McCormick who read the play "Mourning Becomes Electra" at a meeting of the Readers Club at the home of Miss Stella Maye Lanham.

Eugene O'Neill has written and the Theatre Guild has produced the most extraordinary American play that has ever been seen on our stage.

The play is modeled on the Greek tragedy of Electra. The House of Atrous is in the O'Neill family, the House of Mannon.

Alice Brady played Lavinia, corresponding to Electra, of Greek mythology, one of O'Neill's greatest creations, if not his mightiest. This was the greatest triumph of her career.

In "Homecoming" we find Lavinia is of foreign parentage, and has never loved her Puritan husband, the Brigadier General. In his absence she has taken Brant for a lover. She is seduced by him, and of South Sea Isles where there is no repressive Puritanism, and where there are "the warm earth in the moonlight, the trade winds rustling the coco palms on their towers, a chip of the old Mannon block; she ferrets out her mother's romance, and, by blackmail, makes her mother promise to disown Brant and live with her husband again.

her is a lie. When Lavinia tells him Christine took Brant for a lover she drives him wild with jealous rage. Lavinia arranges for him to cavort on a tramp, between Christine and Brant, and he murders Brant.

In "The Haunted," O'Neill springs all his psychological traps. Lavinia and Orin are left to make what they can of their lives, but it is evident in advance that if there is to be a tragic denouement, their maladjustments will "get them."

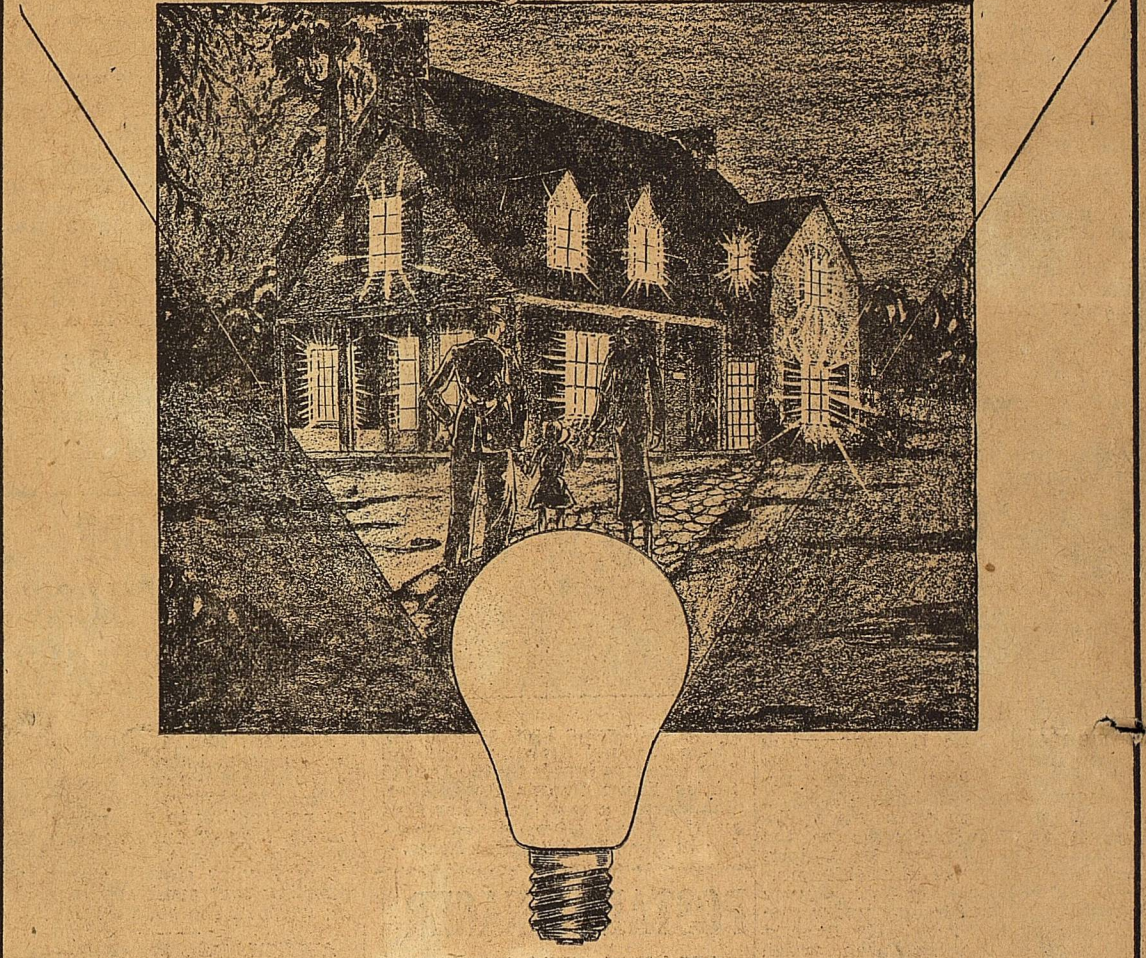

REGARDING POSTMASTERS

From the large number of requests for application blanks for postmaster examinations, it is evident that there is a widespread impression that the commissions of all postmasters appointed by the president subject to confirmation by the senate will automatically expire or be revoked when a change of administration takes place March 4, according to postal officials at Washington.

Postmasters at first, second and third class offices are by law appointed for a four-year term. There is no uniformity in the dates of their commissions, and, of course, the dates of the expiration of the commissions vary accordingly. A postmaster may be commissioned through nomination by the president and confirmation by the senate. When a new appointment is to be made, the post office department calls upon the civil service commission to announce an open competitive examination unless it is desired to fill a vacancy through the promotion of a commissioned employe in the class.

Persons interested in applying for a position should apply to the nearest post office. Applications will be received until the 15th of the month.

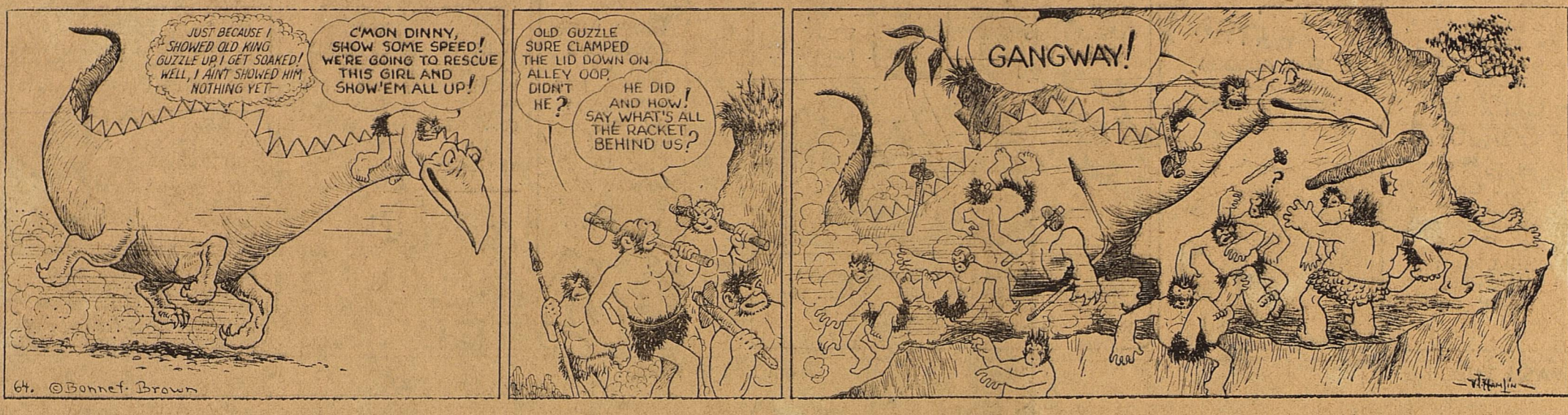
