





THE WHY OF LOST JOBS -

Why do white-collar workers get fired from their jobs? complete a round-the-world tour,

Right now, of course, the general depression is the big reason. But in more ordinary, times a worker can usually faithful; and a recently-issued Boston University bulletin analyzing the turnover in white-collar workers contains some interesting findings.

The bulletin is based on a study of 76 business concerns which normally employ about 50,000 clerical work- jobs. ers, and which have to release about 4000 of them every year. It finds that nearly 90 per cent of these men are let go because they lack the proper character traits; that is, they are lazy, or dishonest, or inattentive, or disloyal, or lacking in force and ambition. The other 10 per cent of discharges arise because of lack of specific skills among the men released.

Every young man setting out to get a job could study that little list to a very good advantage.
