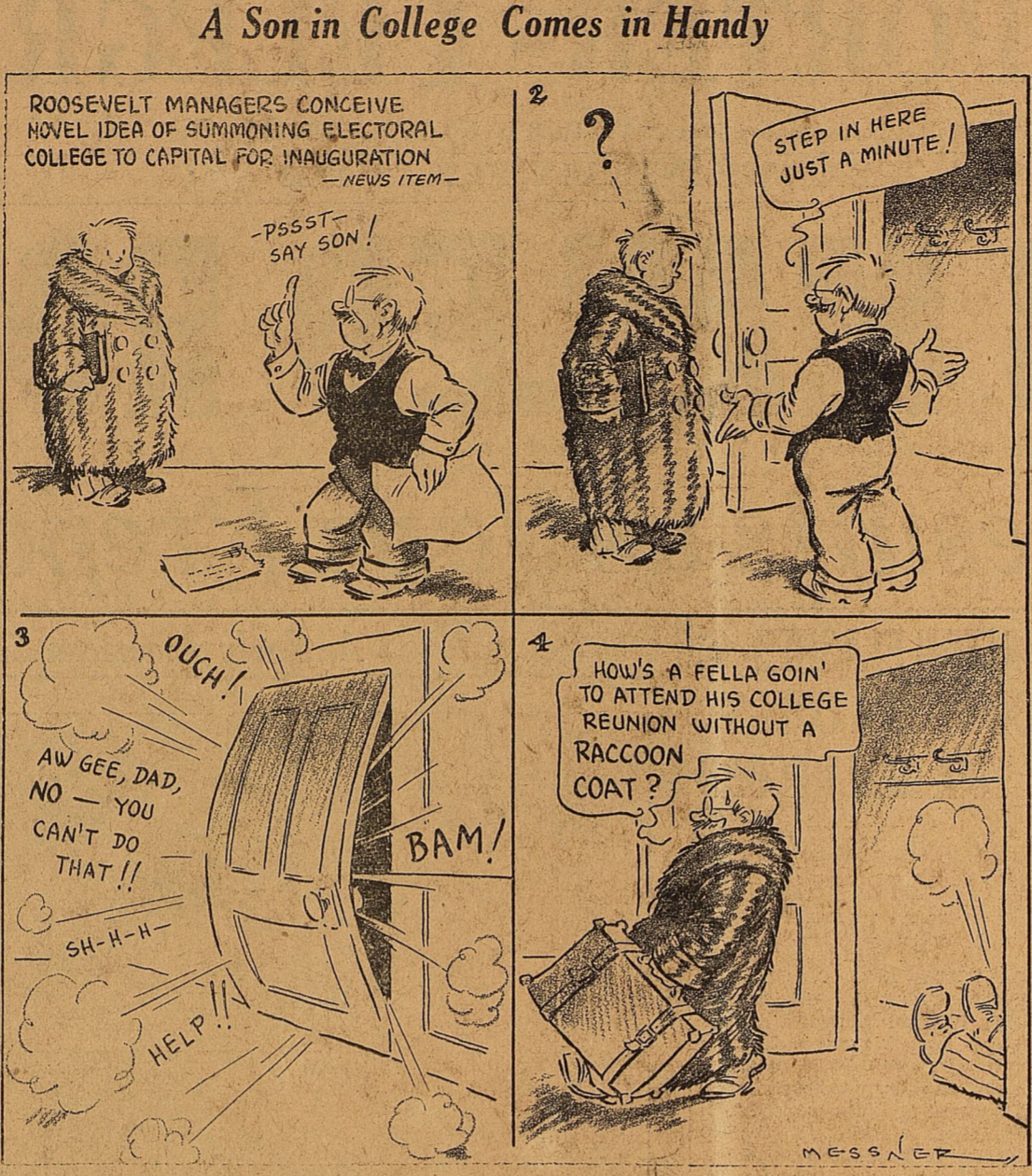

Holland to Ask 8-Semester Rule

BRECKENRIDGE—N. S. Holland, superintendent of Breckenridge schools, is a quiet, peaceable citizen. But when he gets riled up, sparks fly in every direction and it's safe for anyone that opposes him to be elsewhere when the sparks start to fly.

Nick told a reporter Monday morning that he is getting warmed up and when he gets good and warmed up, he expects to launch a campaign to get the 8-semester rule in school athletics repealed.

"I'm against the rule, believe that most of the school officials are, and believe that a vote will show it, and I expect to mail letters to every school official in the state in a short time asking their support in getting the 8-semester rule brought to a vote and repealed."

"I can't do very much unless I get all wrought up and I begin to feel something coming on, which leads me to believe I'll be in good fighting trim soon."

OPPOSES FUND PROPOSAL

HOUSTON—Opposition to the proposal of Representative Emmett Morse of Houston to redistribute automobile registration fees to the greater benefit of the state's four largest counties with a resultant loss of nearly \$1,500,000 per year in road money for the state at large, was voiced here by the Texas Good Roads association through its president, Judge W. O. Huggins.

At present, the counties keep all auto registration money up to \$50,000. Above that figure they divide equally with the state. The county has received a maximum revenue of \$175,000. And after the county attains the maximum, all the balance goes to the state.

The Houston lawmaker would abolish the "maximum" provision, and let state and county divide equally all of the fees above the original \$50,000.

"Only Texas, Dallas, Harris and Tarrant counties now exceed their maximum," Judge Huggins' statement said. "Only those four counties will benefit if the distribution is changed. Yes by the bill they propose to take away from the rest of the state nearly \$1,500,000 or about one-third of the state's entire share of registration money."

With the highway funds carrying greater burdens this year than ever before, and with gasoline tax income falling off through the hard times, more than 200 Texas counties find their highway problems noticeably affected by the result of this bill, if they let it pass.

The roads are the healthiest source of public revenue today, and carry a terrific burden. They are the largest helper of the school fund. This year they begin paying off county bonds. All the while they pay their own way. In addition, they are mortgaging their future to provide for Texas' destitute people, because all R. F. C. relief money is to be repaid out of future allotments of federal highway aid. "The burden is heavy enough. The road program, which is giving so lavishly from its earnings to so many other fields of public activity should not be penalized further for the benefit of only four communities. The bulk of the state should oppose this big-city measure."

A Ford naval transport piloted by Lieut. E. Chourre landed at Sloan field shortly after noon and took off 30 minutes later for San Diego.

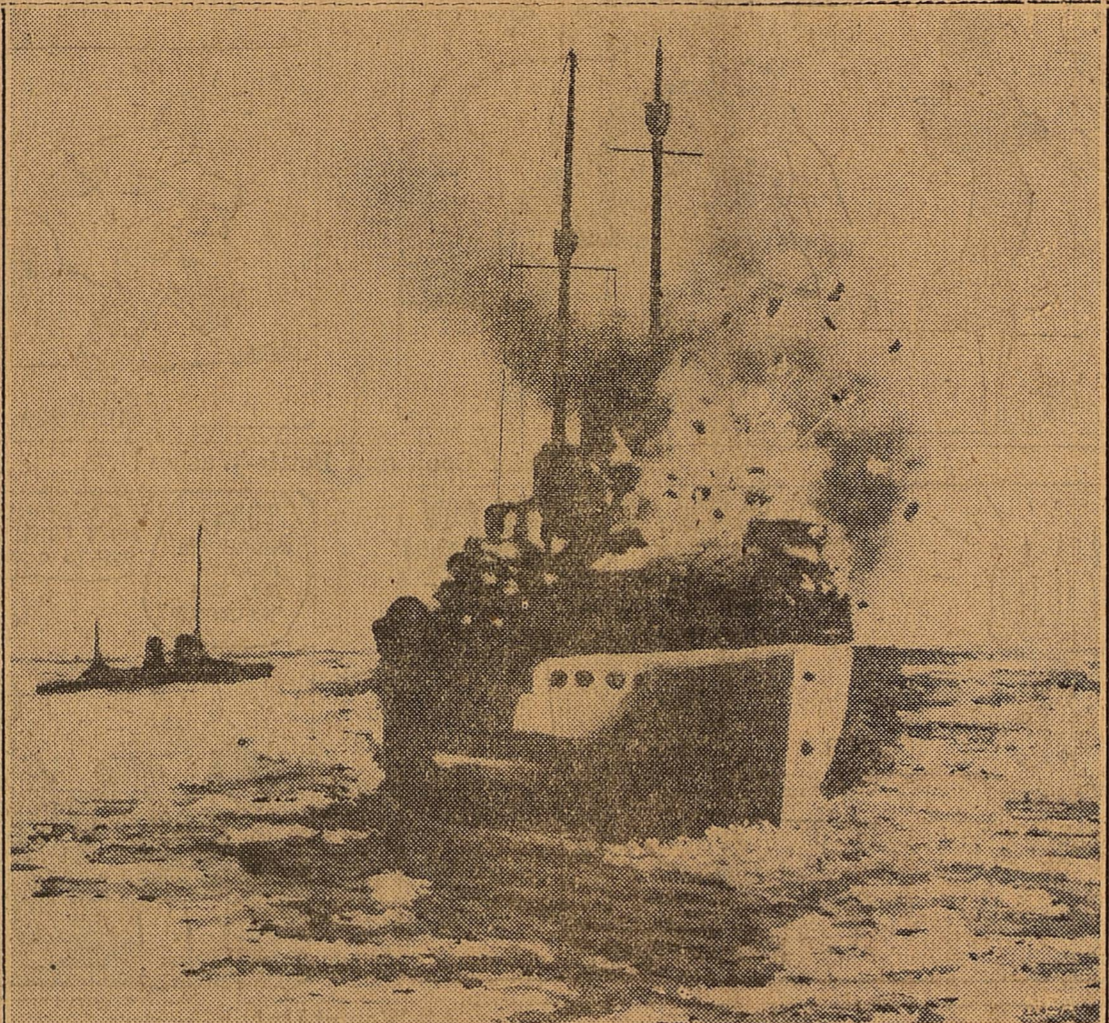
A Bellanca owned by R. C. Grinnell and piloted by Mr. C. Morgan landed from Oklahoma City en route to El Paso.
