

DECISION MADE AFTER 5 YEARS IN THE COURTS

Suit Resulted From Turner's Filing on Oil Land

Decision in the famous "Fred Turner strip suit," involving title to oil lands valued at several millions and the payment of many additional millions tied up by pipe line com-panies, was rendered Saturday by

the state supreme court, advices received here said.

Turner. Midland oil operator, filed a suit June 1, 1927, against land owners, oil companies and royatly owners, oil companies and royatly owners, oil companies and royatly owners.

The on the 561.2 acres, filed originally in district court, Pecosomy was decided in Turner's favor on an instrudted verdict by Judge Sutfon. The defendants appeared to the civil appeals court, El Paso, that body reversing the verdict of the trial court.

Turner then appealed to the superme court in the fall of 1928 and the decision came almost five years

His suit was for the royalty under those acres, the state joining in the suit in order to receive the one sixteenth royalty.

When the original suit was filed, one producing well was on the acreage. Later, two additional producers were drilled. The decision recovers royalties paid on all production, receipts for royalties sold and also royalties on oil drained by offset wells, estimated at 6,000,000 barrels.

In the course of the suit, in its various stages, the value of the lands and royalties involved has fluctuated considerably, dependent upon the price of oil. No definite figures as to the amount involved were given Saturday but many oil men estimated that it would run into several millions.

LOW WAGES, RACKETS MENACE LABOR

American labor today presents one of the oddest jumbles the American people ever had to tackle.

And in the middle there is a vast burden of unemployment which has jarred society people who are feeling the spring almost to its foundations.

Strangely enough, this burden of unemployment is in some ways the least menacing of the three evils. Everybody recognizes it as an evil, and the strongest forces of government, private industry and organized labor are uniting to meet it. Sooner or later it will be lifted.

At one end there is the sweatshop evil—a thing which victims of post-conventionites. Drug has its roots in human greed, which helps to demoralize stores over at Big Spring are reportlabor and industry alike and which is paid for by those first and bromo-seltzer second.

least able to pay; women, children and the aged. At the other end is an evil equally disturbing; the racketeer. He has been most active in New York and Chicago, but many other cities have felt his heavy hand. In instances he has taken over whole union organizations; and he bled red blood just like the in others he has chiseled his way in from the outside; but rest of us who have been socked on the beezer. wherever he operates he has sold out the workingman, taken tribute from industry and helped to raise problems that will take years to settle.

Pennsylvania, so far, has figured most prominently in the stories of sweatshops. It is in Pennsylvania that children have gone on strike against wages of \$1 to \$5 for a 60-hour week. But there are plenty of other states that contain conditions about as bad as anything to be found in Pennsylvania.

Two potent remedies for the sweatshop evil lie at hand; the minimum wage law and the child labor amendment. Get these two adopted and have them enforced energetically and one of labor's—and the nation's—greatest handicaps would vanish.

Against the racketeer the procedure is not so clear. Federal officials in Chicago are trying to cooperate via the income tax evasion law; and Attorney General Cummings is investigating to find out if the federal government might not pass new laws to make possible a determined federal drive against racketeers on all fronts. It is to be hoped that definite action will come out of this.
