Negroes' Attempt to Drive Spirits out Of Slain Negress' Room Starts Checkup

Newnie Ellis, mortuary surgeon, was checking up Saturday afternoon to see if any of his surgical instruments were missing, following a story that leaked out from Darktown's efforts to "drive the spirits" from the room where I. B. Sims, negress, was slain recently by her com-mon law husband, Ed King.

Negroes went in a body to Ellis' mortuary to ask for a nee-dle he uses to sew shrouds, ex-plaining that it when hung in the room where the negress died the "hants would leave."

"I been trying to rent that room ever since I. B. Sims was cut to death," one negro said, "but every body is skeered of it"

"I wouldn't live in that room for nothin'," another negro said, "with the winders rattlin' and the blinds floppin'."
The quiet that overnight settled on the superstition-ridden quarters led to a story the nee-dle was hanging in the room. Which precipitated Ellis' search to see if it were missing from his cabinet. A telephone call late Saturday



Broker's Tip had been bred, trained and schooled for the derby by Col. Bradley, Kentucky's veteran Derby winner. The colonel had sent his Boiler Maker into earlier races but had withheld Broker's Tip from the limelight, only to let him flash before the stands in the world's great mile and a quarter event, plac-ing his name on the lips of the nation. Time was 2:06 4-5.

Head Play, only a nose behind, had been sold yesterday to Mrs. Silas Mason of Kentucky. Broker's Tip was ridden by Jockey D. Meade, Head Play by H. W. Fische, Charley O by Jockey Corbett and Ladysman by Sonny Workman, outstanding jockey who was riding his first mount in the Derby.

Field Well in Hand The fourteen horses were brought from the saddling enclosure to the extreme end of the grandstand, then paraded back in front of the stands, visible to the 60,000 spectators over a distance of a quarter mile.
