GOVERNOR SIGNS RESOLUTION FOR **VOTE AUGUST 26**

Bill Introduced to Allow Votes if Poll Unpaid

AUSTIN, May 15 (UP) - Final sanction was given today to the resolution to submit the proposed \$20,000,000 bond relief issue to the voters of Texas August 26 when

Governor Ferguson signed. The sanction came after advecates of the resolution had sought concurrence of the senate with house revisions on the proposal. The house had revised it to provide that real property would not be taxed to relieve the bonds.

The resolution provides for vote by the people on the bond issue August 26, at the same time they decide whether 3.2 per cent beer is to be made legal in Texas and whether the state is to ratify repeal of the eighteenth amendment. The relief bond issue is proposed to match federal aid funds.

DEPRESSION TRAGEDY

One of the saddest of all the stories of the depression is the one about the 14-year-old Indianapolis school girl who tried to end her life because her schoolmates taunted her when they found her wearing a shabby pair of shoes which one of their number had thrown away.

The girl was one of 12 children of a jobless miner. The family had no money for shoes or anything else. She had to wear the discarded shoes, which had been found on some scrap heap, or go without.

It has often been remarked that the weight of the depression rests most heavily on the children; and this pitiful little story is a reminder that it is not only the phyical deprivation which counts. A great thing has occurred amongst us. We have made a complete turn-around, and at last America's face is toward the future.

Three years -- 1929 to 1932 -- we Americans looked backward. All our old financial and political machinery was geared to pull us out of the depression by the same door through which we entered. We thought it simply a case of going back the way we came. It failed. We now realize that the way out is forward --- through it.

Thanks for that belongs to President Roosevelt. Inauguration Day he turned the Ship of State around. Having observed the failure of sincere efforts to haul us back the way we came, he designed a new method --- new political and financial machinery --- to pull us out the way we are going --- forward.
