# Peters Narrowly Defeated for Governorship of Lions

# **MIDLAND LIONS MOST ACTIVE OF ALL IN DISTRICT**

Eighteen From Here Attend Amarillo Convention

Lions from Midland, who with their wives and friends were a party of 18, returned home Tuesday night without having gained the specific object for which they went-the election of Marion F. Peters as district governor-but having gained another objective which was unexpectedly successful—the characterization of Lions officials as having been the most prominent club at the convention through the two days.

"Peters will be elected district governor next year when the convention of District Two-T is held at Colorado." This was the statement made by numbers of delegates. Dell Herrington, prominent Lion and citizen of El Paso was elected. Delegates frankly stated that since Herrington ran last year and was defeated, they believed he should be elected this year, despite the fact that Marion Peters was much better publicized and was highly pop-

LONDON, April 19. (UP)— England today declared an 80 per cent embargo, effective April 26, on Russian imports in retaliation for the prison sentences given two Britishers who were convicted on charges of espion-
