FRANCE WON'T SACRIFICE GUNS

McCamey Woman Dies of Shock After Auto Wreck Here

MRS. ROWE TO BE INTERRED AT MARSHAL

Anticipated Reunion Cut Short by Tragedy

Without regaining full consciousness, Mrs. Etta May Rowe, 52, McCamey, died in a Midland hospital at 10 o'clock Wednesday night from shock and injuries received in an automobile accident two miles east of Midland that morning.

Her death cut short a reunion she had planned at Big Spring with a daughter, Mrs. J. M. Warlick of Dallas, and a son who is a student of Texas A. & M. college. She was en route to Big Spring to meet him, and Mrs. Warlick, wife of an official of the Cullum-Boren factory at Dallas, was flying to Big Spring in an airplane to join the two.

As Mrs. Rowe drove on the highway near the old refinery something happened that has not been satisfactorily explained. The automobile, evidently traveling 45 or 50 miles an hour, went out on control, swerved, turned over several times and stopped against a bank on the opposite side of the road, facing back westward. Mrs. Rowe was thrown through the top of the machine and was lying several yards away from it, her body partly under a fence. Efforts at resuscitation met only with evidences she was alive, and she had only momentary lapses from unconsciousness after she had been placed under the care of surgeons.

The Barrows mortuary sent Mrs. Rowe by train this morning to Marshall, where interment will be made Friday. Her first husband was buried there 30 years ago.

H. L. Rowe, the woman's husband, is an engineer with the West Texas Utility company at McCamey. Mr. and Mrs. Rowe moved there from Hamlin, where they lived for five years.

The West Texas section, with more than 100 West Texans already booked as passengers and an equal number expected to join the party, will leave Sunday morning as part of the Sunshine Special. It will unite at Fort Worth with the special train, reaching Chicago Monday afternoon at 3:20 o'clock.

Although all Midland reservations must be made through Mrs. Vickers or Sandefur and will be accepted until the train departs from Abilene, low rates comparable to those offered from Midland are available from Midland. The top fare from Midland is \$42.25, which includes berth to and from Chicago and four nights to be spent there. Use of berths in Chicago was provided for because of the glutted condition of Chicago hotels, brought about by the selection of Chicago as convention city by some 800 national organizations. Virtually all rooms have been reserved for the summer and some organizations, notably the Elks club, have been forced to seek accommodations in Minneapolis.

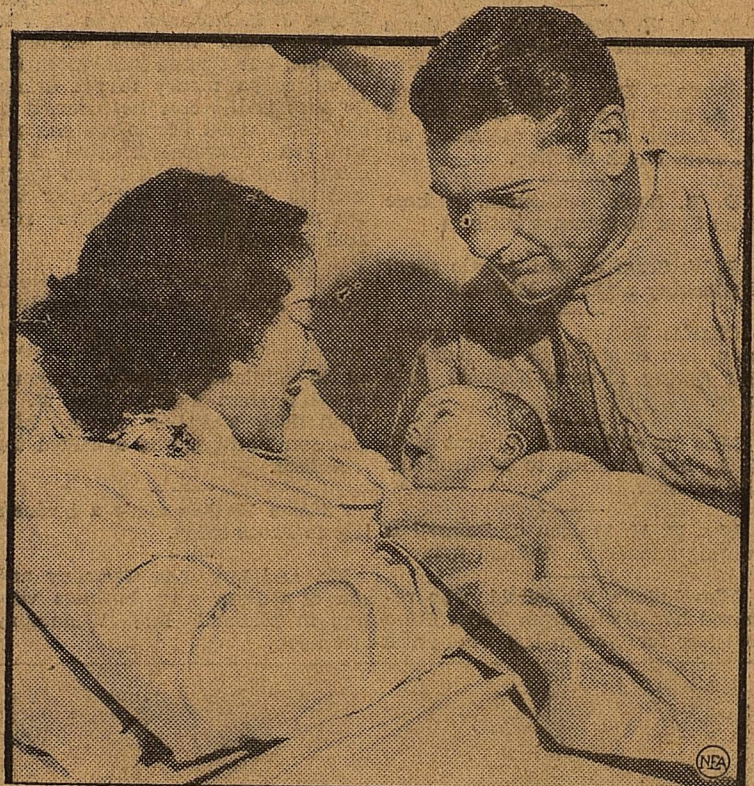
Youthful Cowboy Gets Broken Arm

VOCATION WORK IN HIGH SCHOOL HERE IS URGED

The Arizona Daily Star at Tucson said Elliott Roosevelt will go to Nevada soon to establish residence with his wife, Elizabeth Donner Roosevelt, and divorce her. She is now in Philadelphia with her parents. Elliott denied that divorce is imminent and said that he was merely vacationing. The Star said an agreement had been reached upon custody of the couple's son, William Donner Roosevelt, who is less than a year old.

PHOENIX, June 8. (UP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt today confirmed reports that her son, Elliott, will seek a divorce soon. She was extremely upset. It was understood that a charge of mental cruelty will be filed in Nevada.

Commander May Be Retired, But Try And Tell Him That

Although Commander L. Caussey of the U. S. navy was retired almost two years ago, playing nurse to seven children in a several-hundred mile automobile trip to his Louisiana plantation obviously reminds him he has as much work each day to perform as in 1924 when he was in charge of submarine division 19 in Honduras and charged with putting down an insurrection. His work in accomplishing his mission without firing a shot resulted in his being asked to write a lengthy article for a service magazine and earned him the thanks of high officials of the navy. He and his family, together with two nieces and a negro chauffeur, making a total personnel of 10 spent the night at Hotel Schaefer and left today in their automobiles, a Rolls-Royce and a Packard. His plantation, described as large and well improved, is at Norwood, Louisiana.

SENATORS ENDORSE SMITH FOR POST

Senators Tom Connally and Morris Sheppard Wednesday endorsed W. R. Smith, Jr., of Odessa for appointment as U. S. district attorney for the western district of Texas, including El Paso.

Smith is the son of the late Federal Judge W. R. Smith, and is 70th judicial district attorney. The term of District Attorney Hartman, the incumbent, runs through 1934. Senator Sheppard said today he did not know when Smith would take office, that being up to the administration.

Smith's successor for district attorney may be Bob Hamilton of Stanton, unofficial reports say.

SPORTS AUTHORITY PICKS DER MAX TO OUTPOINT YOUNGER, BIGGER BAER

NEW YORK, June 8. (UP)—"Probably fair weather" was forecast today for the Schmeling-Baer fight, tonight, assuring a sell-out of the 80,000 seats. Schmeling was a two to one favorite. Both fighters were in excellent condition. The German was predicting a knockout.

But, inasmuch as he lost to Risko, Paulino and Loughran, his record of having remained in a perpendicular position loses some of its luster.

Baer's ability to take a terrific punch and keep coming makes it appear that Schmeling will not knock him out. It is my guess both will be on their feet and fighting at the

TEXAS OIL MAN KILLED BY PROP OF HIS PLANE

DALLAS, June 8. (UP)—The body of Frank R. Foster, Dallas oil man, will be returned here for burial, probably Saturday, it was announced today. Foster was killed last night at the Atlanta, Ga., airport when he stepped into the propeller of a plane in which he was traveling to New York to see the Baer-Schmeling fight tonight. He was credited with developing the East Texas oil field, having drilled eleven dry holes before hitting a producer a miles west of the Joiner discovery well. He was formerly national billiard champion and a fight promoter.

SENATE VOTES \$100,000 FOR MORGAN PROBE

WASHINGTON, June 8. (UP)—The senate banking committee today voted itself the power to question Morgan company partners in stock transactions as they related to income tax payments and voted \$100,000 for expenses, to continue the inquiry during the summer. Committee Counsel Pecora drew from O. P. Van Sweringen an agreement that indirect transfers of stock of the Allegheny corporation were used "so as to avail of income tax exemptions." He charged that the Van Sweringens escaped payment of millions in taxes in this manner. Pecora said investigations of income tax transactions in the Morgan company will begin tomorrow.

LONG DISTANCE SALES

DALLAS (UP)—Prince Purachatra, Dok Mai Palace, Bangkok, Siam, apparently likes his royal dishes prepared in a pressure cooker. Recently a check from H. R. H. the Prince arrived here for delivery of the J. D. Powell Company, Automobile Canning and Sealing Equipment, McKinney, Texas. It was in payment for a pressure cooker purchased in July, 1932, and was accompanied by an order for another "nest" of cans. The draft was for \$20.90.

FOR SALE—CHEAP

MARSHALL, Tex. (UP)—The Harrison county sheriff's office has 2,752 empty pint 3.2 beer bottles it will sell for \$24, just what recent raid cost in which 550 gallons of liquor was seized near the Gregg county line. The bottles are all that remain of beer seized by officers in Harrison county since 3.2 brew became legal in Louisiana. It was estimated the beer was worth \$402, the whiskey \$2,189. Both beer and spirits were poured down the sewer by two janitors and four jail trustees taking three and a half hours for the job. REJECTS ANGLO-AMERICAN PLAN TO SAVE PARLEY

Refuses to Make Any Concession Trade With Germany

PARIS, June 8. (UP)—France today rejected the American-British proposals made to save the disarmament conference, refusing to sacrifice more heavy guns and to suppress tanks in return for Germany's concessions. Premier Deladier emphasized the need for control of Germany's manufacture of arms and munitions which were endangering the "whole European security."

LONDON EXPECTS TO PAY INSTALLMENT

LONDON, June 8. (UP)—The cabinet tomorrow will approve a settlement offer for the June 15 American debt payment, expected to be \$49,000,000 in silver. Approximately \$76,000,000 in gold is due. HULL SAYS TALK TO BE MUZZLED PLYMOUTH, Eng., June 8. (UP).—Secretary of State Hull, arriving here today en route to the world economic conference, declared that war debts will not be discussed and also that disarmament talk will be excluded.

Earle has leased the Harry Hinkle ranch 25 miles southeast of Pecos in the Crystal Water vicinity and is stocking it with cattle. FORT WORTH (UP)—Somewhere southeast of Texas the freighter S. S. Cripple Creek plowed through the open sea today carrying George Haddaway, 23, out to see if the Royal Road to Romance is in need of repairs. On the ship's papers Haddaway is an able-bodied seaman. But if you should meet him strolling around the Ringstrasse in Vienna this summer, Haddaway will tell you he's continuing his study of internationalism, languages, and to keep a date with Lester Hamilton of Palestine, Texas. He plans to meet Mamilton in Germany and go with him on bicycle trip to the Rhineland, and perhaps later a rowboat journey down the Danube to Budapest. 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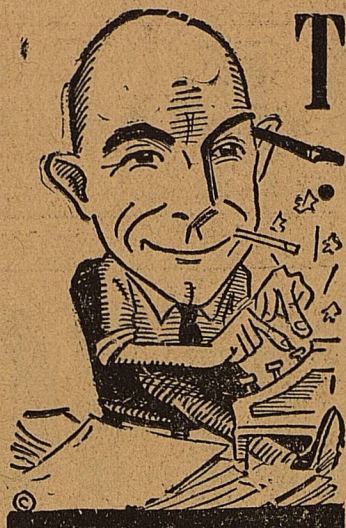
## LLOYD GEORGE CHANGES

It is interesting to note that David Lloyd George, England's war-time prime minister, recently made a speech in London demanding fair play for Germany and denouncing the treatment given Germany under the treaty of Versailles.

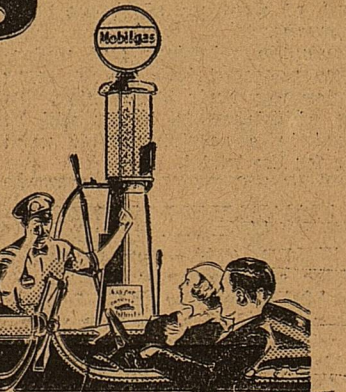

"Get below!" Knowlton ordered the gun crew. All but two of them left at once and followed the Captain down the conning tower hatch.

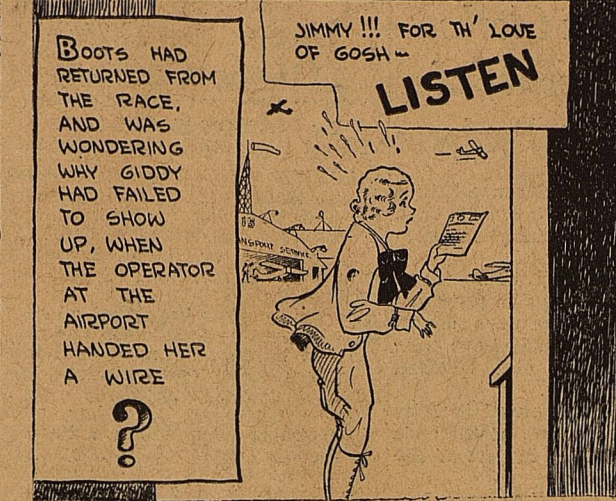
