ALEXANDRIA, La., Nov. 16.—Alexander Boss, negro, who is said to be wanted in conrection with the slaying of a young woman at Van Horn, Texas, Nov. 8, was taken into custody here by police, and is being held in jall, awaiting advices from Texas authorities.

Boss, who is said to have been born and reared in Rapides Parish, has been living in Los Angeles, Cal., for several years. According to authorities he is known to have left Los Angeles Nov. 3.

Boss was taken into custody on a request contained in a telegram received by Chief of Police Clint O-Malley from Sheriff Charles P. Fox of El Paso, Texas.



CASE CONTINUED ON STATE MOTION Watkins Is Acquitted

In Assault Case Wednesday E. Hallmark took the stand in his own defense shortly after

He testified to friendly conversations he and Currie had held before that date, and expressed the opinion the trouble would have been averted had Currie not been "drinking." He said Currie was not troublesome when not drinking; but that the defendant feared the meeting the day of the shooting because Currie had been drinking and Currie had been drinking and because others had seen a gun

The case likely will go to the jury before late in the day, it was indicated.

The first two state witnesses, introduced early this afternoon when the murder trial of E. Hallmark was resumed, to stifled that Hallmark fired first when, on Oct. 20, R. J. Currie was wounded in a pistol battle in front of the Alamo filling station; and that the wound that was inflicted was a contributing factor to Currie's death at Wichita Falls Oct. 25.



"HAND OUTS" FOR TEACHERS

Chicago's school teachers haven't been paid in heaven knows when, but at least they aren't going to starve this winter. The Illinois Emergency Relief Commission has announced that it will provide them with food, fuel and clothing throughout the winter, accepting salary assignments in payment.

Right here there is an ironic commentary on the breakdown of our public school system. Suppose you were a teacher, and had worked hard to get the education necessary for your job, and had toiled for years in your chosen profession—and then, in the end, found that your reward was to get packages of groceries and bundles of coal precisely as if you were a down-and-outer subsisting

Wouldn't you, in that case, begin to feel that there was something tremendously wrong with the profession
