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"HAND OUTS" FOR TEACHERS

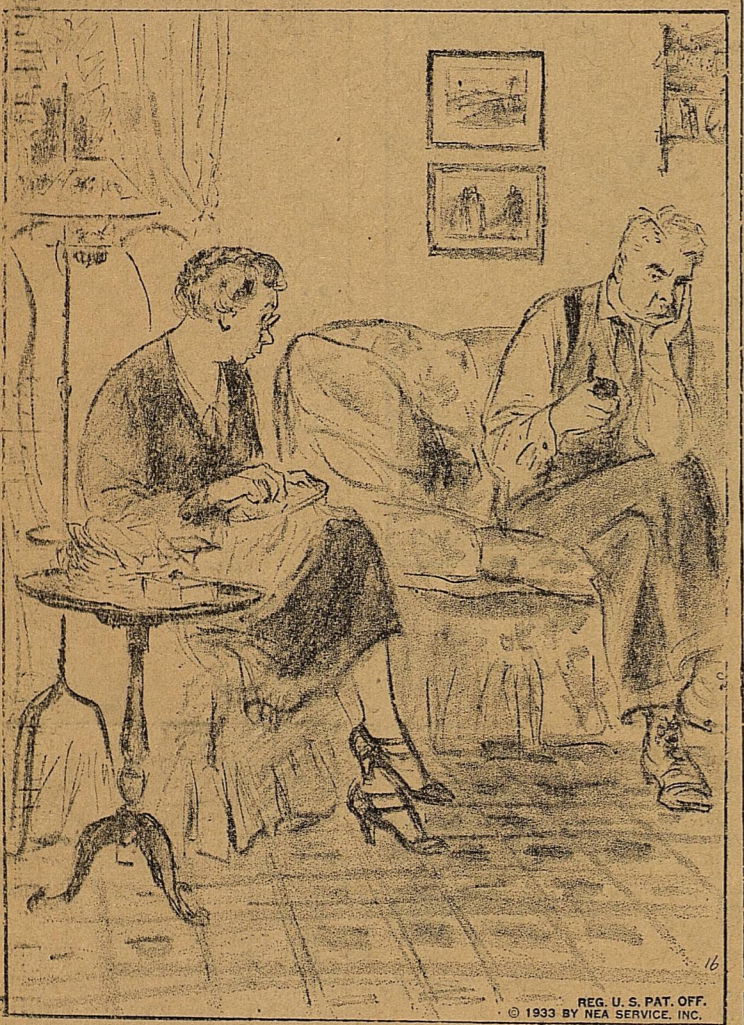

Twenty-three Visitors Hear Address by Miss Evelyn Davis, National Executive Director of Health Work, Here Wednesday

Twenty-three visitors from Sweetwater, Ballinger, Miles, Winters, McCamey, Panhandle, Conway, Lamesa and Rankin were here Wednesday afternoon to hear the address of Miss Evelyn K. Davis of New York City, who is national executive director of public health work.

Following a brief business meeting of the local health board, during which Mrs. J. W. Day was appointed chairman of a committee in charge of selling Christmas seals and John P. Butler was elected treasurer, Mrs. E. E. Witty, secretary, read minutes of the last meeting.

Mayor Leon Goodman briefly welcomed the guests.

Mrs. Sloan also introduced Miss Davis, who spoke on the membership, organization and education of the county health board committee. The committee is the most important factor in the health program, Miss Davis said, as it helps to interpret problems of the professional nurse or worker will meet in its community and to interpret to them what is happening around them.

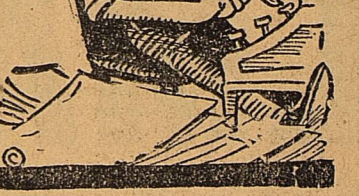

Now that this country is being fenced for sheep to the south of Midland, many of our readers should be interested in this clipping which came from one of our "area" papers about a new type of livestock:

Some call it the "Geet." You can call it what you want to. It is a cross between a Billy goat and a not too self respecting ewe. It is about a year old, lively and ready for anything.

T. D. Wood, whose ranch lies between Ozona and Sonora, has led in experimental cross-breeding of goats and sheep and has successfully raised forty of these animals. It grows both mohair and wool, but that doesn't mean anything for mixing them makes both practically worthless. So the "Geet" is of no commercial value from that standpoint. The wool grows to about the length that you will find it on the ordinary sheep while the mohair fibres grow faster and push ahead of the wool.

The "Geet" might be good eating. We've never tried a "Geet."
