# STATE PREPARES FOR CONFORMITY TO NEW ORDERS

Showdown Is Likely Between Ickes And State

AUSTIN, Oct. 27, (UP).—The railroad commission oil and gas division was working out proportionate reductions for the state's oil fields today, preparatory to putting the 90,000 barrel reduction in effect

90,000 barrel reduction in effect Monday.

The state's daily allowable was cut to 875,000 barrels. The reduction may force a "showdown" between the state and Secretary of the Interior Ickes. The new cut was said to be the state's penalty for overproduction in September. The question being considered was whether all producers can be penalized for the violations of a few producers.

# GOVERNMENT AIDS WEST TEXAS

SAN ANGELO.—Governmental agencies designed to aid distressed ranch, farm and homestead property have been, and are being, of great assistance in West Texas.

While no loans have actually been completed by the Home Owners Loan corporation—the agency intended to aid distressed homestead owners—six of them are ready for the issuance of the corporation's bonds, two others need only the title to be examined and 283 are in the process of being completed. Another 80 or 85 are being held up for further information here or because companies, associations and individuals holding the mortgages have not agreed to accept the bonds in exchange for the mortgage liens. Federal Land bank loans have been made for years through this agency and now the loans of the



## Helpful Health Suggestions

THE EFFECT OF DIET ON TEETH

By M. Elizabeth Wilson, County
Health Nurse
While the mother can not choose the color of her child's hair nor determine whether he will have straight or curly hair she can help give him the beauty of sound and perfect teeth.
This she may do by right diet account.

This she may do by right diet, according to recent scientific research, which indicates that ninety six out of every hundred children in this country, have decayed teeth, largely lidge to average diet in scalle life.

country, have decayed teeth, largely due to wrong diet in early life.

The child's teeth begin to form somewhere between the second and third month of parential life, the first tooth being cut at six or seven months. At two years, the child should have his first set of twenty teeth. These are gradually replaced by the thirty two permanent teeth, which are complete at about the age of eighteen years.

During this period of life, there is a continuous development of the bony structure, while the body grows taller and the frame expands.

For development of good teeth, they must have the proper food elements, of which the most important

1. Calcium-Found in milk, orange and lemon juices.

2. Phosphorus—Supplied by milk, egg yolk, whole grains.
3. Vitamin C—Supplied by oranges and lemons.

4. Vitamin D—Supplied by codiver oil, egg yolk.

Oranges and lemons are the best and most concentrated sources of vitamin C, and should be eaten lib erally by all ages for their beneficial effect upon the teeth, the child should be taught the simple health rule of brushing the teeth well.

Fruit at the end of the meal helps to cleanse the teeth since it dissolves the starchy material left be-

As used today, it is brought into play when a runner is loose in an open field and likely to score.



Cook fifteen minutes, add three cups of sugar and confinue cooking until mixture is thick and clear. Pour into clean hot jars and seal. In using this conserve for sandwiches use spread on top of a thick layer of cream cheese. These are best served as open sandwiches.
