AIR OF GLOOM PERVADES CAMPUS OF BULLDOGS AS PREPARATIONS COMPLETED FOR SATURDAY TREK

A doleful atmosphere hung over the high school today on the eve of the Midland-Wink football game. The Purple and Gold, without showing coaches much improvement this week, faces its supreme test in a baptismal service marking its reentry to Class B.

Head Coach L. K. Barry sums up the situation thus: Wink has a heavier, huskier, older and more experienced squad; Wink has the advantage in games played this year, five, while Midland has played only three.

Going behind scenes for a moment, a sports writer finds that Coaches Barry, Henderson and Lingo have several serious obstacles standing in the way of a win—obstacles almost as pervasive as the great strength of the polished Wink offensive and defensive. Three men, Terrell Miles, Allen Heard and Jack Prothro may not see service because of injuries. Prothro and Heard may see service in the late periods if their support is necessary, but Miles is certain to sit on the bench throughout the evening. He is suffering from an infected arm. Heard has an injured shoulder and Prothro a sprained ankle.

Blocking and tackling departments have not considerably improved on the squad, coaches say. The mentors have drilled their charges monotonously to improve this feature, but assertedly are facing a stubborn self-preservation complex exhibited by several members of the club. Without good blocking attempted by the club as a unit it is difficult to see how Midland backs can gain more than a handful of yards over the fighting Winkler club, and savage tackling is the only recourse to caulk the rushing tactics of the oil field team.

Special offensive has been drilled on this week, designed to strike at the weaker departments of the Wink game, and some measure of confidence in its value is felt in case plays are properly called. If the Midland line holds at strategic moments the kicking of Midland backs should offset some of the weakness of other departments, fans believe.

A student body of 150 will leave Midland about 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning, including 42 gridsters. The pep squad and band will parade at the hall.

Speedy Moffett (Texas Tech) will referee, George Brown (A.C.C.) umpire, and Tiny Reed (Texas) act as head linesman.

Separate Arts United to Make Dietrich Film Which Opens at the Ritz at Preview

Seldom, if ever, has any film Hollywood has produced, represented such a union of the pictorial, historic, artistic, literary and musical fields as Marlene Dietrich's latest Paramount picture, "The Song of Songs," coming to the Ritz theatre preview Saturday night, Sunday and Monday.

Any film starring Miss Dietrich would be assured of a big headstart in pictorial quality to begin with. The flaxen-haired German star, who launched the revolutionary trousers for women style mode, never looked so lovely as she does in the flatteringly feminine clothes she wears in this film.

Directed by Rouben Mamoulian, who made Cheever's "Love Me Tonight," "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" and other highly praised pictures, Miss Dietrich is said to give an outstanding dramatic performance. This picture, incidentally, is the first Dietrich film with a director other than her discoverer, Josef von Sternberg.

She has sumac, butterfly bush, trumpet vine, ivy, tamarisk, cedar, pepper tree, coral berry, red bud, two kinds of haws, verberna, ageratum, lamsquarters, golden rod, Indian currant, elderberry, snow-on-the-mountain, and Indian blanket.
