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

He went to the job during the McKinley administration and has served every president since. For 36 years important secrets have been clicked into his ears, and world-stirring decisions have been transmitted by his chattering key. Doc remembers being tremendously excited by the news of the sinking of the Maine, but the World war didn't feaze him. He is the man who hooks up the famous gold key by which presidents initiate such projects as the Worlds' fair and the Golden Gate bridge.



The three ways of making pickles are (1) fermentation by the use of brine; (2) vinegar where there is no curing in brine; (3) combination of salt and vinegar. To make pickles of a keeping quality, they first should be cured in brine before treated with seasonings and vinegar.
