RIO GRANDE LEVEES BREAKING

Stanolind Ushers in Federal Supervision with Increase

15-CENT HIKE TO HIRE MANY NEW WORKERS

975,200 Barrels Is Reduced Limit For Texas

BY UNITED PRESS The Stanolind oil company ushered in federal supervision of the industry today by boosting the crude price fifteen cents per barrel, paying 97 cents for forty gravity oil in Oklahoma and Kansas and a top of 92 cents in East Texas.

The national allowable was placed at 2,400,700 barrels in effort to lift prices. Texas was placed under a federal allowable of 975,200 barrels by the state railroad commission's order for a 25 per cent production reduction.

Railroad commission members were in East Texas today with Howard Marshall, federal oil staff member. It was estimated that 250,000 extra men, hired under the NRA, will be paid by rising prices and the companies still will show profits.

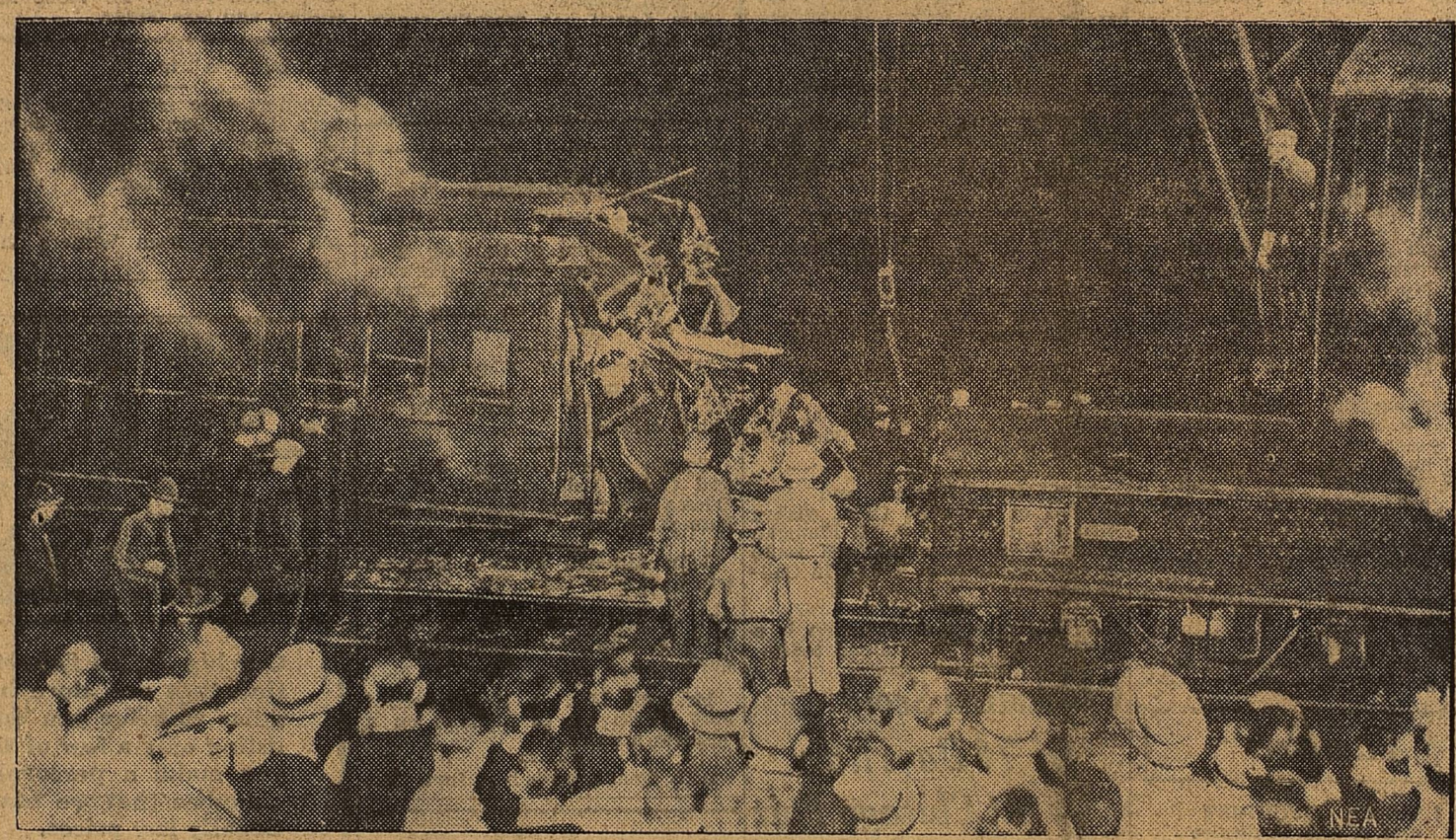

This picture shows the crumpled end of a steel passenger coach of the Erie Railroad's crack Atlantic Express, which was struck by a swiftly moving milk train on the outskirts of Binghamton, N. Y., killing 15 and injuring 20. The Express' last two coaches, both steel were catapulted into the air and thrown off the tracks on their sides by the force of the collision. The coach in front which was wooden, was smashed into splinters.

HIGH REFINING VALUE OF WEST TEXAS CRUDE IS CITED TO NRA

SAN ANGELO.—Data showing the high refining value of the West Texas petroleum by comparison of the recovery of gasoline and fuel oil from crude produced in the Yates field in Pecos county with that from the Joiner area in East Texas has been submitted to NRA officials by the West Texas Land Owner's and Oil Producers' association through Claude Alkman of San Angelo, association president.

The figures indicate that, after due allowance is made for pipe line transportation charges and the additional cost of treating by reason of sulphur content, West Texas crude should command a price of not less than 20 cents per barrel below that paid for 36 gravity Midcontinent oil.

Alkman's letter was sent to Harold L. Ickes, chief executive oil administrator of the petroleum industry code; James A. Moffett, chief federal spokesman on the planning and co-ordinating committee, and to each of the 15 members of the planning and co-ordinating committee. The letter follows:

"Discrimination Ruled Out. I represented the West Texas Land Owner's and Oil Producers' Association in Washington during the time that the code for the petroleum industry was being drawn. My purpose there was to try to get inserted in this code a provision that would prevent discrimination in prices being paid for oils in one area as against another. Thanks to the splendid support of the committee of 54, this was amply taken care of. The specific case in mind at the time in which this was inserted was the West Texas situation.

"The fields in West Texas occupy a unique position in the industry in that they are almost isolated from the big consuming markets. Due to this fact it is impossible for small refineries to operate, as the country is sparsely settled and the high freight rates prevent their competing in the sale of their refined products with Midcontinent refineries. The four or five major purchasers who have been taking the oil from this area have had no competition in price; hence, they have had an absolute monopoly, both as to price and output.

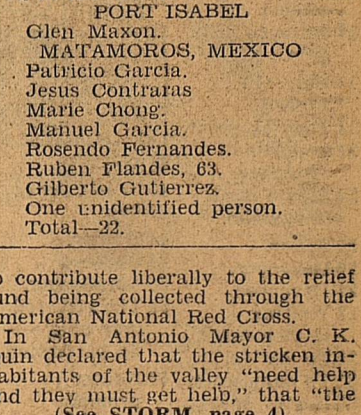

There probably is no issue in American politics more confusing than that of states' rights.

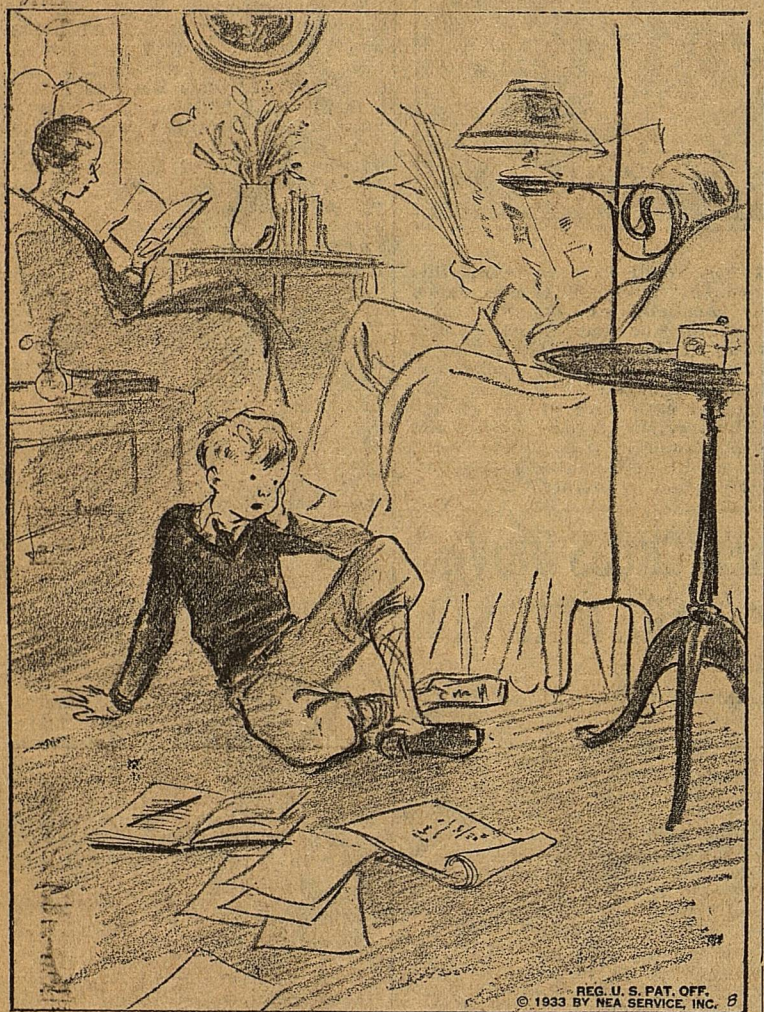
A sample of the confusion is to be had in the activities of the American Bar Association meeting at Grand Rapids, Mich.

Assistant U. S. Attorney General Pat Malloy told the assembled lawyers that police powers must be centralized in the federal government if the war on racketeers is to succeed. He urged that county prosecutors, sheriffs and state police be sworn in as federal deputies, so that the war on crime could be pushed forward in a unified manner.

And the same convention which applauded this speech approved an executive committee report opposing the federal child labor amendment on the ground that the problem should be left to the states.

A truly consistent attitude on states' rights is pretty rare.

Barrymore Heads Brilliant Group In Yucca Picture

Lionel Barrymore and Miriam Hopkins are co-starred in "The Stranger's Return," which opens at the Saturday night preview at the Yucca theatre as a Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production of the currently popular Phil Stong novel of rural life, which follows its recent best-seller, "State Fair."

As the 85-year old patriarch of a farm founded and pioneered by his family, Lionel Barrymore is said to have one of the most interesting characterizations of his brilliant career. His histrionic power is declared by preview critics to have attained new heights in the climactic scenes.

Miss Hopkins among the most popular feminine stars on the screen today, is afforded the best opportunity she has had in her role of the city girl who goes to her grandfather's farm and finds there the peace and contentment she couldn't get in the city. Here is a role of exacting demands and she is said to have exceeded in power the strength written into the original part.

Stong, the author, is quoted as extremely pleased with the film version of his book. He assisted on the adaptation and served in an advisory capacity on details of farm life, having been raised in the Mid-West. He is the owner of two farms in Iowa, the scene of the current story.

King Vidor, one of the screen's foremost directorial minds, was in charge of the production, most of which was filmed on a location representing the Iowan countryside. An entire farm was reproduced for the appropriate setting for the dramatic action. Vidor, who directed "Big Parade" in the silent days, has such talking pictures as "The Champ," "Street Scene," "Bird of Paradise" and "Cimarron" to his credit.

Franchot Tone heads the supporting cast in the role of the college-bred farmer with whom the city girl falls in love. The fact he already has a devoted wife and baby son serves to dramatize a hopeless romantic situation that turns into small-town scandal. Tone, a comparative newcomer to the screen, was a Broadway sensation in the stage and scored equal success in his first pictures, "Gabriel Over the White House," "Today We Live" and "Midnight Mary."

Stuart Erwin fills a featured spot as Simon, the corn-lickered farm hand who knows more than he appears to. This is by far Erwin's most important role in many months. He recently played in "Hold Your Man." Irene Hervey is Hettie, the farm wife; Beulah Bondi is cast as Beulah, the sold; and Grant Mitchell plays the part of Allen. Tad Alexander is the boy and Allen Carlyle plays the role of Thelma.

The pictorial beauty of the picture cannot be too greatly stressed. Camerawork by William Daniels is the most effective; the screen has offered out-of-doors lovers. A number of the farm scenes are breathtaking in sheer rural grandeur.

Old Indian Scout Of '76 Days Now At Chicago Fair

CHICAGO—Indian scout, stagecoach driver and mule skinner out of Deadwood, S. D., in the wild, wild days of 1876. Witness of the shooting of Wild Bill Hickok, and acquaintance of such renowned characters as Bat Masterson, Calamity Jane, Poker Alice and Potato Hill John, Rough Rider with Roosevelt and showman for many years with Buffalo Bill. These and a lot of other things are old Jim Moore.

You may find old Jim almost any day lounging around the "Days of '76" wild west mining camp at A Century of Progress—the Chicago World's Fair. There are many bearded old veterans at the '49 camp, but Jim's growth is the most remarkable of all. He wears a broad brimmed felt hat in the best tradition of the West, and a red flannel shirt. Jim is a wild west character, and he looks the part.

Jim can tell you stories by the hour of the old days in the West, and they all have the ring of authenticity. He can tell you how he ran away from his Pennsylvania home and went west in 1875, eventually reaching Deadwood. There he saw Jack McCall kill Wild Bill Hickok and he attended Hickok's funeral. So far as is known, only one other man now alive saw Hickok killed.

Jim arrived at the scene of the Custer massacre a day after it occurred. He did a lot of other things in those days, for events came fast and furious, and he finally went with Buffalo Bill in his wild west show, besides riding with Roosevelt in Cuba.

He saw all the famous old gun fighters, but the fastest man with a gun he has ever seen is none other than Texas Jack Sullivan. Texas Jack is giving gun demonstrations in the '49 camp this summer.
