Price Fixing Hammer Adds Its Din to Oil Stabilization

MIDCONTINENT PRICE SET ON BASIS OF \$1.11

West Texas Crude to Be Sold for 84 Cents Bbl.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17. (UP)—Price fixing was added today to control of production in the government's efforts to stabilize the oil industry.

Sale or purchase of crude, gasoline or other refinery products below the minimum levels in Administrator Ickes' order will constitute an act of unfair competition, in violation of the NRA and the oil code while the order is in effect, it was announced.

Midcontinent crude of 36 gravity was fixed at \$1.11 per barrel, slightly above the current price, with variations for different fields and different grades. The mid-continent gasoline price was set at 6 1/2 cents at the refinery. The minimums may be protested before November 15 and are subject to change by the administrative board. The prices become effective December 1, it was stated.

Midcontinent crudes range from \$1.11 down to 87 cents below 35 gravity, and up to \$1.19 above 40 gravity. The West Texas crude price was fixed at 84 cents, Elmer \$1.17, Central Texas 87 cents to \$1.19, Coreo \$1.24 to \$1.36, Tomball \$1.30, South and Southwest Texas 83 cents, Panhandle 85 to 97 cents, Gulf Coast 99 cents to \$1.19, Gray county 95 cents to \$1.07.

Another Special Session Hinges on Relief Factors

Possibility for another special session of the Texas legislature may hinge upon the ease with which the recently voted \$5,500,000 relief bonds sell, or the extent to which moneys created by the bonds alleviate suffering in sections affected by a pronounced economic ebb, according to Rep. Frank Stubbeman, who has returned to Midland from Austin.

Loses Blue Eagle



First employer to lose the Blue Eagle on charge of violation of an NRA code was Theodore Rahutis, above, operator of a restaurant at Gary, Ind. Rahutis, twice summoned before the Gary advisory board, failed to appear. His employees charged that he violated the hour and wage provisions of the restaurant code. Rahutis denied these charges when Gen. Hugh Johnson withdrew his right to the insignia.

Newspapers of the state have reacted on the immediate necessity for convoking another special session to provide revenue necessitated by voting the bonds. Some believe the general fund must carry a substantial balance before bonds will be bought. However, the fact the bonds are the first ever issued by the state cause others to believe investors will quickly subscribe to the 4 per cent, non-taxable issue.

Rep. Stubbeman, who was a member of the legislature for the first time, having been elected to fill the place vacated by the late Rep. B. Frank Haag of Midland, explained that the special session was called for a three-fold purpose: to vote a relief bond issue; to amend the anti-trust laws; and to place before the law-makers a proposal to put a refrigerator in the governor's mansion.

All were attended to. The first house bill that passed provided for \$5,000,000 for relief bonds; the first senate bill was for \$3,000,000. The difference was split in free conference committee, and the conference bill adopted in both houses. The anti-trust bill was adopted to provide that defendants in the U-schel kidnapping today. Mrs. Shannon was sent to the penitentiary here and Mrs. Kelly to the women's prison at Cincinnati.

As to refrigeration, solons agreed that "the governor's beer must be kept cool," and so provided for \$150,000 for the purpose of installing an electric refrigerator. A committee appointed to make an inspection of the governor's kitchen reported that an old ice box which subsequently had been refitted with an electrical unit, was inadequate; on a test, they tried to freeze ice cubes, and an entire day failed to convince them the box would do. The original appropriation asked was \$2500. The old box is especially large, the committee reported, about the size of those once used in butcher shops.

On the 10th and 11th committee there was a bitter fight conducted as regarded the bonds. One faction wished to leave to the 10-member commission the right to issue the bonds, and another desired that the legislature alone issue them as provided in the state constitution. Eventually it was settled that the legislature must control the issue, but that the committee might be in charge of selling the bonds. The provision was further made that needs for money brought by the bonds must be estimated for six months or through the winter months. Should more be necessary it is believed the legislature will be called into session again. The people of the state in the last special session empowered the legislature to vote bonds up to \$20,000,000 with the understanding that whatever the lawmakers deemed logical to vote up to that amount be matched dollar for dollar by the federal government.

In all, the house had about 250 bills introduced. At first, in order to get the governor to submit petitions, the legislature would pass around a petition in both houses. If a majority of the membership of each house signed the bill was put on the register, signatures were not required. When the bill was on its merits, however, before the session was over, the governor seeing that the requisite number of names could go on the petitions for almost any bill, signed through courtesy, submitted bills without requiring the formality of getting the petitions properly filled.

Then came the scramble to get bills read, engrossed and the final vote taken. Fearing to put the matter up in the house before the senate took a vote, the sponsors of the pink bill worm bill, the most important piece of legislation to West Texas with the exception of the relief bonds, waited for the senate to pass the measure, then when the first opportunity to get a vote on the bill in the house during a night session on the last day before strictures were into effect, there was no quorum present. When the bill was passed to engrossment only a bare majority was in favor of it. Needing a four-fifths vote during the closing days of the session to permit the bill to come up for final consideration, telling them that they could vote as they saw fit on the final vote on the bill on the 10th of the month, the sponsors of the four-fifths vote to suspend the rules and permit the bill to come up for final passage was obtained.

The rest is well known. East Texas as legislators strove endlessly to track on tick and milk riders; sev-

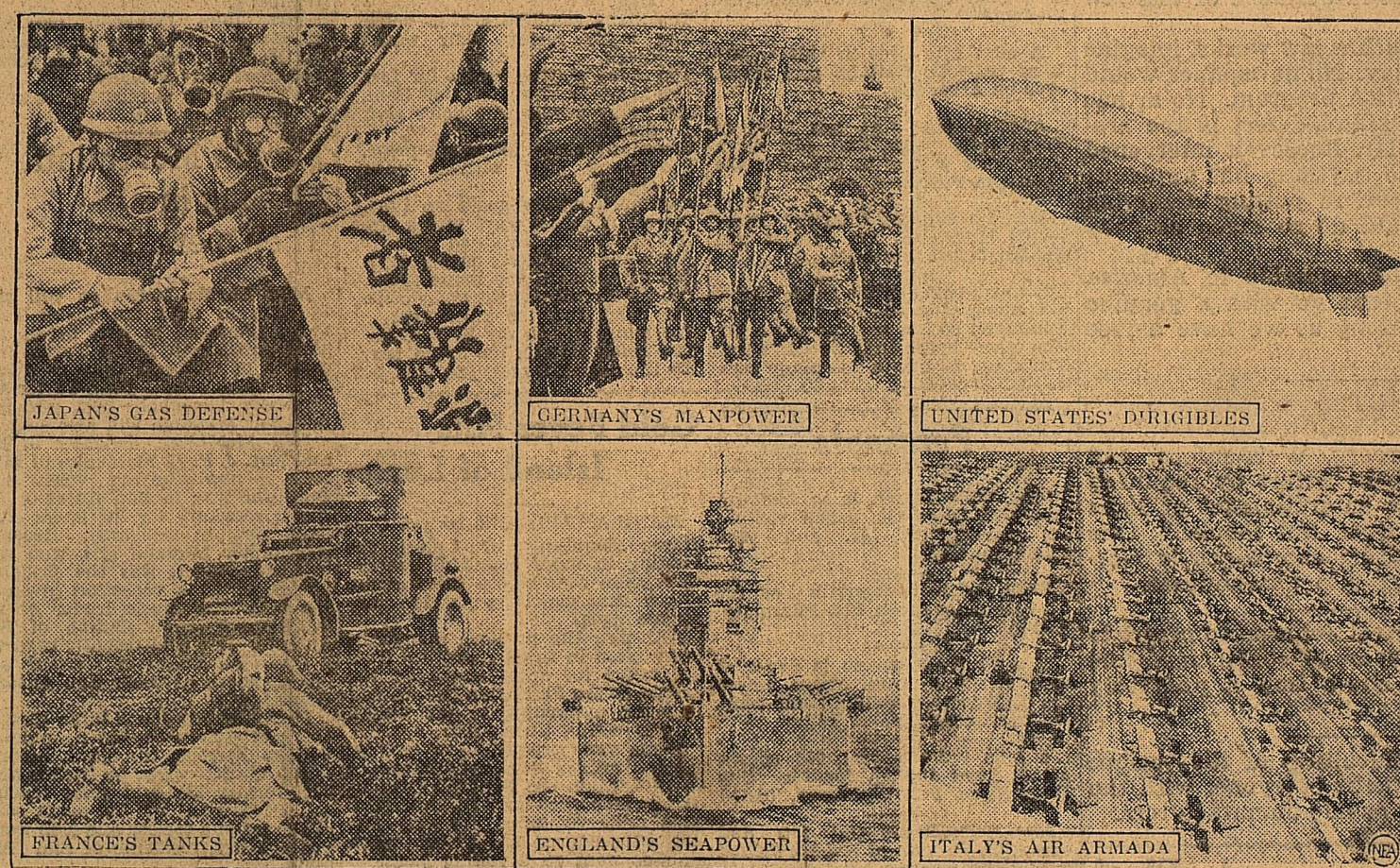

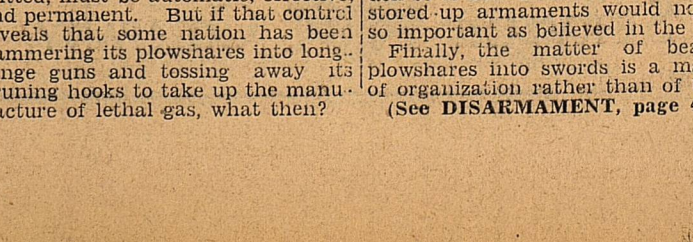

A DICTATOR'S SECURITY

Those who say we have a dictatorship in America might ponder about the things that go with a genuine European-style dictatorship. As long as we have a free press, we are safe.

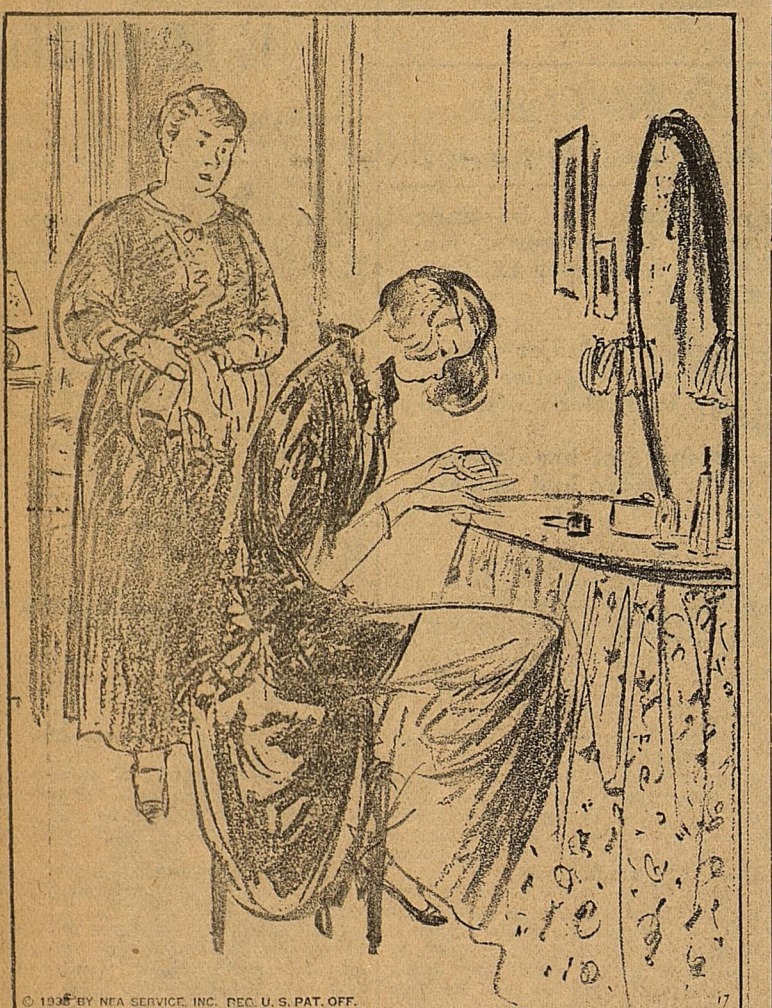
EDITORIAL NOTES
