## Takes Less Money To Pay Back Taxes

County back taxes were cut 40 cents; that is, reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.10 to bring needed relief to tax payers, and this was done with the hope and expectation that people would pay their taxes, officers of the county commissioners court said Friday.

The commissioners court spokes The commissioners court spokesmen said they appreciated the prompt response of citizens who are paying their taxes. The majority of citizens of Midland county apparently appreciated the tax rate cut granted by the commissioners, but failure of some to pay their taxes can seriously interfere with the people's business through their county government, it was pointed out.

when the commissioners court cut the tax rate, the budget was also cut, but when the 40-cent reduction was made, it was made on the basis and hope of good collections. 





Activities after February 15 depend on whether congress appropriates \$350,000,000 as requested by President Roosevelt.
