Representative Bob Long, sponsor of the proposed joint session, replied that it was not for propaganda but to gain information.

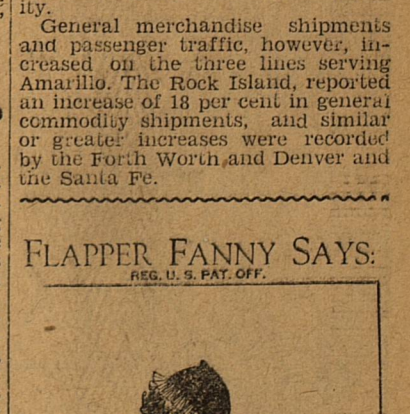

WHAT QUAIN BELIEFS HAS THIS WORLD!

It gives an American a pleasant feeling of superiority to learn that the people of Nepal, that mysterious Himalayan kingdom north of India, believe that the recent Indian earthquake was caused by the flight of three British aviators over Mount Everest last spring.

The gods of this mountain, according to the people of Nepal, are jealous of their peak's isolation, and get angry whenever presumptuous men try to climb it.

When the British airplane went sailing over the summit, the gods decided things had gone far enough; so they jarred India with an earthquake that took 15,000 lives.

This quaint tale is believed devoutly by the superstitious and unlettered people of the Himalayas, and it all sounds very childish and ignorant to enlightened folk like ourselves.

Yet we have our own troubles in straightening out matters of cause and effect, especially where great national disasters are concerned, and in some ways we don't seem to be much better at it than the skin-clad tribesmen of Asia.

We had our own earthquake, a matter of four years ago, in the form of a depression, and it jarred us clear back to our eye teeth. And if there ever was a land in which people did more frantic running around in circles trying to figure out the cause of an earthquake, the history books don't mention it.

Some of us blamed the tariff and some of us blamed the war; some of us blamed the foreign debts and some of us blamed Wall Street; some of us blamed our lack of faith in God and some of us blamed the sun spots; some of us blamed Stalin and some of us blamed Andy Mellon. And we are so far from being agreed on the cause, even now, that we can't agree on how to handle our domestic economy, our foreign trade, our currency, or our international relations, to keep it from happening again.

And there is something rather frightening in all this confusion.

It suggests, somehow, that we are, all of us, enlightened and unenlightened, at the mercy of forces which we can comprehend little better than the Himalayan peasants comprehend an earthquake. Perhaps, indeed, we shall have to accept the Himalayan explanation. We flew over a high mountain and the gods were vexed.

CHILD LABOR, STILL!

The three days from Jan. 27 to 29, inclusive, have been set aside by the American Humane Education Society as national child labor days, and, while the occasion may not get a very wide observance, it ought to be celebrated all across the country.

The NRA codes have done much to set our children free, but they have not done everything; furthermore, they are only temporary in their effect. The society points out that there are still 240,000 children under 16 years of age who are not covered by the codes, and whose protection from exploitation is only the uncertain legislation of individual states.

It still is possible to pass the child labor amendment. Substantially more than half of the required number of states have ratified it. It is high time we got busy, ratified the amendment, and gave to exploited childhood the protection of the federal constitution.

Many a professional actor in these hard days would feel he had achieved fortune, if not fame, were he to go through his performance each evening knowing that a taxi was waiting for him outside the stage door, and that he would be able to meet the charges at the end of his ride. A mere amateur in New York already has this luxurious sense of security. Having played his part, he leaves the theatre in a cab that has been awaiting him all evening. And he is not worried even about the fare. He is the driver.

Under the Dome Of the Capital

AUSTIN. (U.P.)—Recent spectacular activities of Clyde Barrow and other notorious gunmen have had an appreciable effect on reducing the number of applicants for commissions as special Texas Rangers. Some special ranger commissions are issued for real law enforcement work, but most of the seekers are on a par with those made honorary colonels in Kentucky.

Tom Mix, sure-enough cowboy, has never been a regular Texas Ranger, headquarters records reveal, according to Capt. J. W. Aldrich who was asked to settle a much disputed question about it. "Guliotine Tom" is the sobriquet given Tom Hunter by one of his possible opponents in the race for governor. He says it is not original but was overheard by him in a Pullman smoking room when uttered by a man who had just read Hunter's platform asking a death penalty for crooked officials.

Improving Federal Statutes Would Aid In Checking Crimes

FORT WORTH (U.P.)—At least four improvements in federal statutes would greatly facilitate authorities in checking crime, believes Clyde O. Eastus, United States attorney for the Northern District of Texas. These are: 1. Laws against the interstate transportation of firearms.

Prison Improvement Possible—Simmons

AUSTIN. (U.P.)—While he is proud of the record made by the Texas prison system under his management, Lee Simmons, who has charge of more than 5,000 convicts, believes there still is wide room for improvement. Simmons has done so well with the prison system that many of his friends have urged him to run for governor which he probably will not do.

Chief Two Moon Dies in Poverty

WATERBURY, Conn. (U.P.)—Chico Colon, who took the name of Chief Two Moon Meridas and established an Indian medical herb business which brought him thousands of clients, died a comparatively poor man. An inventory of his estate showed its value at \$100. A quantity of flashy jewelry, valued at \$1,255, made up the bulk of the estate. The nickel-plated car, the "Chief" usually used was put down as worth \$100. A similar valuation was placed on a second car, and a third was held worth only \$50.

BEAR CUB JOINS CCC

SEATTLE. (U.P.)—The CCC camp at Sultan, Wash., has a new member, a cub named Tillie, found when Bill Chapman felled a tree and the cub scampered out. At first Tillie was allowed to sleep in the bunks with the men, but after she sampled shaving cream, socks, boots and clothing, Tillie was quartered in the tool shed.
