LIMITATION BILL PUT BEFORE THE **CONGRESS TODAY**

Bankhead Measure Is Administration-Supported

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6, (U.P.)—The cotton production limitation bill, understood to have the support of the administration, was introduced in the house today by Representative Bankhead, democrat of Alabama

bama.

The house measure would limit the 1934 crop to 9,000,000 bales and place a penalty tax of 12 cents per pound on cotton produced by growers in excess of their allotments.

Reciprocal Tariff Warning Is Issued

Possibility of a reciprocal tariff agreement that will work harm to agreement that will work harm to cattlemen, is seen by E. B. Spiller, secretary of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers association. Spiller wrote W. W. Brunson and other directors of the association urging them to oppose this possibility. Brunson and other cattlemen took action at once. Spiller's letter follows:

"Red Emma" Back but She's MAY RIVAL TEA Just a Glow of Old Flame

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—The fires have cooled somewhat in the years but they still burn.
Emma Goldman still glows warmly

Emma Goldman still glows warmly with the anarchism which has guided her life. But it is a steady glow, not a blazing flame.

"I am too old to be bitter," she says. "I am beyond the reach of god and evil. I still am an anarchist; I have not changed my views. But the world has changed. That is why I didn't have to."

Her pale blue eyes peer from behind thick glasses. Her gray hair is bobbed (this was a mark of her radicalism when she cut it, almost the first woman in America to do

So).

She wears a black felt hat, and a fur-trimmed coat of a mild shade of red. Stretched on tip-toe, she would reach the five-foot mark.

She looks like a motherly housewife, or perhaps the president of the library committee of the local women's club.

Therror to Nation

A PRISON HORROR

It is doubtful if any disclosure in the long history of corrupt municipal politics has been quite as shocking as the one recently made about conditions in New York's city prison at Welfare Island.

From all accounts, this prison practically was turned over to the most vicious and degraded of the prisoners, to run as they pleased. Even England's notorious Old Newgate, in the heyday of Jonathan Wild, could not offer a spectacle to match the one presented on Welfare Island. How even the most corrupt and callous of officeholders could have permitted such a condition to exist is

Coleman, chairman, Mrs. J. G. Gemmill and Mrs. R. E. Witty, was appointed to study the milk and dairy products code, made an investigation of the dairy conditions and report to the board. We hoped that in this way public feeling would be stimulated in regard to enforcing the sanitary code more strictly. With the assistance of M. R. Hill, members of the committee with the survivance of the conditions made in the part of the basic manual official visit to he grocery stores dispensing milk to Dairyland. The pasteurization plant at the Dairyland creamery and all grocery stores dispensing milk or milk products were included in this inspection. In a highly instructive report, Mrs. Gemmill explained in detail the requirements of the milk ordinance, concluding with a thorough report of how local dairies were or were not meeting these rules. She stated that the general condition of the dairies was fair and hoped they would be encouraged to improve the conditions by the official visit from the board.
